BERGH'S DAILY WORK.
A BUSY DAY WITH THE AN-
IMALS' BEST FRIEND.

How the Founder of the Society for the Pre-
vention of Cruelty to Animals is Wont to
Conduct His Business--Queer Letters--Odd
Cases--Other Incidents.

If all the animals of this country were to
hold a grand charity fair and vote a gold-
headed cane or a silver water set to the
most popular man in the world, there is no
doubt that regarding their choice.
They would unanimously bestow that to-
ken of their regard upon this dignified gen-
tleman who sits behind the desk in a
handsomely furnished office on East
Twenty-second street. He is Henry Bergh,
and he has come down to his office per-
sonally attended to that portion of the work
of the Society for the Prevention of Cruelty
to Animals which his age and long
years of arduous labor leave him strength to
do. Mr. Bergh is slender, of medium
height, and carries himself erect and with
dignity. His face would command
respect in any assembly. His most
distinguishing characteristic is his firm
head, which is massive in breadth and
height and protrudes almost to the line
of his resolute chin. In spite of his years
and busy life, his eyes retain their bright-
ness and his voice is pleasant and cheery
softness. It is a voice that is always under
its owner's perfect control. Its tones are
the same in their quality when he ad-
dresses a court to secure the conviction of
some ignoble brute who has raised his
hand against his more noble but less for-
tunate fellow, as when he comments upon
the play of his companion between the
acts of some notable theatrical first night.
For twenty-two years, and even longer,
Mr. Bergh has devoted his energy and
wealth to the amelioration of the condition
of the dumb creation. Since that time he
has seen the saddest state which he
founded, and of which he is still the proud
founder, become one of the strongest be-
nevolent organizations, not only in this
city, but in America, for there is now
hardly a State in the Union which does
not contain a kindred organization. In
thirty-seven States and Territories laws
forbidding the ill-treatment of animals
have been passed, and in thirty-four of
them societies to carry out their provisions
have been organized. Canada, Mexico,
Cuba, and several South American coun-
tries have added the good work by or-
ganizing societies, and the passage of laws
certain to follow. Very few men have ever
lived to see the work which they started
grow to such colossal proportions, and
there is no other reformer now living who
has witnessed the spread of his ideas over
so vast a territory.

Mr. Bergh is not able to devote each day
to his work in his arduous duties, but
fortunately I found him at a time when the
air was sharp and crisp and the sun shone
brightly. Mr. Bergh carries himself on his
feet. He leaves his home on Fifth
avenue about 8:30 o'clock.
The Forth Avenue car which he boarded
stopped at the corner of Twenty-second street
and Mr. Bergh alights and at once makes
his way to his commodious office on the
second floor. A moment later the door
opens and the superintendent enters. The
work of the day is now officially begun.
The president gives him a few instructions
regarding the disposition of a case which
was related to him by a gentleman who
rode down with him on the car, and which
Mr. Bergh has not time to give his per-
sonal attention. A brief report of the more
important cases for the day is pre-
sented, and the superintendent starts to
leave the room.

"One moment, Mr. Harkinson," and the
superintendent returns to the side of his
chief.

"I received a visit from a lady at my
house before breakfast today. She lives
on West Twenty-ninth street, between
Tenth and Eleventh avenues. She is a
washerwoman, and has no time to call
at the office during the day. She wanted me
to see that the boys in her house were pro-
tected from the torments of a cat which be-
longed to a woman living on the floor above
hers. Yesterday they drove the poor ani-
mal upon the roof, and its cries kept her
awake all night."

"Yes, sir."

See that those boys are arrested, if you
can learn who they are, and they must be
punished. Such wanton cruelty must be
stopped."

After getting down the woman's address,
the superintendent for the second time
starts for the door, and the president turns
his attention to his voluminous mail, which
half covers one end of his desk. No other
man in New York receives so many letters
concerning persons and their affairs, in
which he can have no possible interest, as
Mr. Bergh. There is something about a
public benefactor which specially attracts
those correspondents whose sole purpose of
living is apparently to burden the mails
with worse than useless epistles.

Here are a score or more letters from
persons in this city who have seen abuses
which they deem worthy of correction. Some
of the writers are business men who
have no time to visit the office in person
to lodge their complaints. Here are other
letters from those who fear to sign their
names. They are clerks who inform
against their employers, or servants against
their masters. There are other letters, also
anonymous, but from a far different class.
They are agents of spite and are written to
make trouble for innocent persons. But
whatever may be the writer's purpose, the
complaint is handed over to the superin-
tendent, and should an abuse be found, it
is speedily and effectively corrected. Now
we come to the foolish letters. There is
in Iowa who does not live with his two
second husband writes to ask Mr. Bergh's
advice. She thinks that a man who is so
kind to quadrupeds must have a soft place
in his heart, and his brief answer is to her

a new farm where he will have better
accommodations for his live stock than he
now has. He asks Mr. Bergh for a loan of
\$25,000, offering a mortgage upon the prop-
