Lucy King's sire was the renowned Mambrino King, sire of Lady of the Manor 2.04 1/2, world's champion at that time; Heir-at-Law 2.05 1/2, Lord Derby 2.05 1/2, and 1 others in the 2.10 list. Mambrino sired the dams of the ex champion, The Abbott 2.03 1/2, Shadow Chimes 2.05 1/2, The Monk 2.05 1/2, The Abbe (8) 2.10. Lucy King's dam was Lucy, by Hamlin's satchel, he by George M. Patchen 2.25, the one-time champion stallion of the world. Lucy's dam was Bay Hambletonian, dams of 3 and the grand dam of 5. Bay Hambletonian was by Hambletonian 10.

Some Important Changes—Next Conference at Federalsburg.

The committee on moral reform, in its report to the Maryland Annual Conference of the Methodist Protestant Church, in session in Broadway Church, Saturday afternoon took an advanced stand on the liquor traffic question, in that it practically recommended that the acceptability of members of the church should be judged by their attitude on this question. The report was adopted unanimously. Dr. Lewis' report showed the following amounts raised for the superannuate fund: The 2 per cent. of pastor's salaries amounted to \$1,829.35; the Sunday School contributions \$807.64; from Ladies' Aid Societies \$293.50; from congregations \$5,628.84. A total with Mr. Baker's collections, of \$10,319.33. This brings the total fund up to \$107,000. By unanimous vote Federalsburg, in Caroline county, Md., was selected as the place of meeting next year. A resolution was introduced by Dr. E. T. Little and adopted, abolishing afternoon sessions on Friday and Saturday at future conferences, and setting aside that time for delegations to see the president relative to appointments.

One of the most interesting features of the session was the reading of the statistical report of the conference, which showed that there are 13 less un-stationed ministers than last year, the present number being 71. There are now 1,416 probationers on the roll—a decrease 346, while the full membership of the conference is 27,306, an increase of 211. Two hundred and fifteen adults were baptized, the number having been less than that of last year by 162; 1,595 children were baptized, a decrease of 157. Conversions made numbered 2,245, less by 1,924 than last year. The number of Sunday-school officers and teachers—3,636—remains unchanged, while the number of new scholars—4,130—is increased by 54.

The value of Church property now is \$2,073,800, the increase over last year having been \$80,150. The value of parsonages is \$297,735 an increase of \$33,710.

TO TRADERS AND OTHERS

NOTICE is hereby given to all persons and bodies corporate or politic, doing business in Kent county, and requiring a State license, to obtain a license or renew the same on or before

THE FIRST DAY OF MAY NEXT

A failure on the part of persons now engaged in business to renew their license by the first day of May next, will subject them to a fine. Clerk James T. Dixon will be ready to issue licenses on or before the first day of May next, at his office in the Court House.

Those interested are notified of the following requirements of the license laws:

Table with 2 columns: If applicant's stock in trade does not exceed \$ and amount of goods kept on hand at the principal season of sale, or the oath may be administered by a Justice of the Peace when the person wanting a license applies through an agent. Rows include: If over \$1,000 and not over 1,000 (\$12.00), 1,500 (15.00), 2,500 (18.00), 4,000 (22.00), 6,000 (30.00), 8,000 (40.00), 10,000 (50.00), 15,000 (65.00).

The applicant must either make oath, as herebefore, before the Clerk of the Circuit Court of the county where he is engaged in business, of the amount of goods kept on hand at the principal season of sale, or the oath may be administered by a Justice of the Peace when the person wanting a license applies through an agent. STALLIONS—Any owner and keeper of every Stallion or Jack shall before being permitted to stand or station such animal pay to the Clerk of the Circuit Court of some one of the counties of the State the highest sum that he intends to receive for the season for one mare, and the receipt of the said Clerk, with the seal of his court attached thereto for said sum, shall be the license for standing or stationing such a stallion or jack for one year from the date thereof; provided that in no case shall the sum directed to be paid by this section for such license be less than ten dollars, and that every stallion or jack, upon which the said tax is paid, shall be exempt from all other State tax.

Any owner or keeper standing or stationing any stallion or jack without a license shall forfeit and pay twice the sum authorized and required to be paid in the last preceding section, one-half to the State and the other half to the informers.
