## Sheriff's Notice

**NOTICE** is hereby given to all persons and bodies, corporate or politic doing business in Kent County, and requiring a State license to obtain a license or renew the same on or before

### THE FIRST DAY OF MAY NEXT

A failure on the part of persons now engaged in business to renew their licenses by the first day of May next, will subject them to a fine. Clerk James T. Dixon will be ready to issue licenses on or before the first day of May next at his office in the Court House.  
Those interested are notified of the following requirements of the license laws:  
If applicants stock in trade does not exceed \$ 1,000..... \$12 60  
" over \$ 1,000 and not over 1,500..... 15 60  
" 1,500 " 2,500..... 18 60  
" 2,500 " 4,000..... 22 60  
" 4,000 " 6,000..... 30 60  
" 6,000 " 8,000..... 40 60  
" 8,000 " 10,000..... 50 50  
" 10,000 " 15,000..... 65 60

The applicant must either make oath, as heretofore, before the Clerk of the Circuit Court of the county where he is engaged in business of the amount of goods kept on hand at the principal season of sale, or the oath may be administered by a Justice of the Peace when the person wanting a license applies through an agent.  
**STALLIONS.**—Any owner and keeper of every Stallion or Jack shall before being permitted to stand or station such animal pay to the Clerk of the Circuit Court of some one of the counties of the State the highest sum that he intends to receive for the season for one mare, and the receipt of the said Clerk, with the seal of his court attached thereto for said sum, shall be the license for standing or stationing such a stallion or Jack for one year from the date thereof; provided that in no case shall the sum directed to be paid by this section for such license be less than ten dollars, and that every stallion or Jack upon which the said tax is paid, shall be exempt from all other State tax.  
Any owner or keeper standing or stationing any stallion or Jack without a license shall forfeit and pay twice the sum authorized and required to be paid in the last preceding section, one half to the State and the other half to the informers.

## Wires Ground—Two Men Shocked.

With the electric wires of his store grounded, Mr. John V. Kilbourn, of Centreville, attempted to turn on the lights in his establishment Wednesday evening and was severely shocked, the force of the voltage knocking him to the floor. Mr. Frank Jones, of Centreville, an electrician, was called in and turned on the lights. Mr. Jones then went into the cellar below the building to discover where the wires were crossed. Feeling along with his bare hand it came in contact with a place where the insulation had worn off, and Mr. Jones was knocked to the floor unconscious. Three fingers of his hand were burned to the bone, but beyond that he does not feel any ill effects from the occurrence.  
Shortly after the accident fire was discovered about the store in seven places, where the insulation of the wires had worn through. The flames were quickly extinguished, however, with but little damage.

## MR. WIGGINS IN FLORIDA

Winter Garden, Orange Co., Florida.  
March 28, 1911.

*Editors Kent News:*  
Thought you might care to hear of my peregrinations through Florida. We are now located for a short time at what the people here call the garden spot of the State, they seem not to be void here of the religious predilection God gave to Man. But instead of worshipping God, the automobile appears to have the pre-eminence. This is truly a great community for truck growing and orange and grape fruit growers. The town is one mile from lake Apopka, this lake is 26 miles long by 6 miles wide and lets out into St. Johns river. There are plenty of fish in the lake such as trout or bass, large catfish, speckle perch and brim or sunfish, but the sunfish here grow to weigh as much as 4 pounds. When we look on these fine fish and the brawny fishermen our minds run back to the sea of Gallilee, where Jesus called a number of his apostles, in order that no flesh should glory in his presence, instead of going to the Jewish Sandekrin where he could find education and the like he called the poor ignorant fishermen. We see here great groves of oranges and grape fruit the season for packing is about over, except a few later varieties. We see great quantities of cucumbers growing some are marketing them now. Owing to the very dry season, many crops are behind only the ones who irrigate are up-to-date. They irrigate for almost everything here. One man has 30 acres of cucumbers alone here. There are fields of lettuce growing but most of it is also harvested. Cabbage and cauliflower is looking good. There is also a large bee farm just out of town. Watermelons have runners on them about 12 inches long. The weather here this spring has been very changeable, some cool spells. We are holding a Tent meeting here and the people come far and near to it, big audiences, and the Lord is blessing, only been here a few days. We will probably go to Taylorville next about 20 miles west of here on same road.

## JOHN WANAMAKER FIFTY YEARS A MERCHANT.

Fifty years ago Saturday John Wanamaker opened a small clothing store in Philadelphia. This was the beginning of a mercantile career that has few parallels. Almost the entire system of selling goods has changed, and Mr. Wanamaker himself has had no small part in improving the American store. He was one of the first to realize the potent power of advertising in the newspapers to attract customers, and he attributes his success largely to liberal and intelligent advertising.

Mr. Wanamaker has tried almost all methods, and he has concluded that the daily newspapers is the only medium through which all the people can be reached. He has proved his faith by his works and is probably the largest retail advertiser in the world.  
He made a fine Postmaster General in President Harrison's Cabinet; he could have achieved prominence in almost any line; but he found his field in business, and his long career as citizen and merchant has been crowned with notable success.

## THREE COUNTIES GAIN

### Allegany, Garrett And Caroline To Have More Delegates.

A proclamation will be issued by Governor Crothers increasing the representation of Allegany, Garrett and Caroline counties in the House of Delegates by one additional member and reducing by one the membership of Harford and Queen Anne's counties.  
This readjustment of the legislative representation is made mandatory by the State Constitution, which provides that it must be done after each census taken by the Government. The Governor has no discretion in the matter and is compelled to issue the proclamation before the Legislature subsequent to the taking of the census.  
By the provision of the Constitution Baltimore city has six representatives from each of the four legislative districts, making 24 members of the city delegation at Annapolis in the lower branch of the Legislature. The counties get their representation by population. Each county has two representatives regardless of how small its population might be. Those having 18,000 or over get 3; over 28,000 get 4; over 55,000 get 5, and 6 is the maximum.

While many of them did so, there were only three which increased to the point of gaining an additional member. These were Allegany, Garrett and Caroline. Allegany passed the 55,000 mark and will now have six members instead of five, Garrett passed the 18,000 mark and will have three instead of two and Caroline will also have three instead of two.

Harford county formerly had four representatives, but dropped below the 28,000 mark, where it was previously, and its representation is cut from four to three, while Queen Anne's dropped below 18,000, and will now have only two instead of three. In the case of Harford county the Representative was lost by only 35. The figures showed 27,965, while it requires 28,000 to retain its four members.
