

The Clerk shall not issue license to any person to sell spiritous and fermented liquots from whom the grand jury has recommended a license to be withheld, or to a person whose license had been suppressed by the Court, without a special order of the STALLIONS .- The owner and keeper of every receive for the seeson for one mare; and the receipt of the said Clerk, with the seal of his Court attached thereto, for said sum, shall be the license for

the Code of Public General Laws, entitled Licenses, so as to empower a trader to sell the license to trade with the stock of goods: Sec. 1 .- Be it enacted by the General Assembly of Article fifty-six of the Code of Public General Laws ¶_. And be it enacted, Any trader who has taken beer, in this State, shall have the privilege to sell of goods, and purchasing or renting his place of business, and the party so purchasing may continue to sell under the license of his predecessors in busi-

ness until the expiration of said license.
