Attorney General Williams and President Grant, in a purely partizan spirit, supported Durell and his creature Gov. Kellogg, who represents a minerity of the people of Louisiana and is obnoxious to a large majority of her citizens. Gov. McEnery and his followers refused obedience to Grant's bayonet Governor. whose minions, chiefly negroes, terrorized the people of Colfax, inducted themselves into offices, and by threats and violence drove many of the white citizens away from the parish, who fled for safety to other parts of the State .-Then it was, that the citizens of adjoining parishes, hearing what had been done by the negroes of Colfax, tallied to recover the town from the possession of the negroes. A fight ensued, 150 trenched around and within the Court a flag of truce, and when the white be-And said 'twould burst and kill us all, siegers approached, under that flag of truce, the pegroes treacherously fired upon them. Then came the deadly. struggle in which 100 negroes are said

to have been killed. And this is termed a "massacre" by every negropholist in the land. It was no massacre to fire upon the unexpecting white men, after a flag of truce had been displayed, but when the retaliatory vengence of the whites had been provoked by such treachery, then it was "massacre."
