By all means sow, as recommended last month, in Grain, Wool, Fruits, &c., respectdrills, that the cultivator may pass through the rows, and that the sun and feb22.y. air may have free access to ripen and elaborate the juices of the plant.

If the ground cannot be got in good condition, better give up the idea of planting corn. It is a crop that requires too much labor to make its culture profitable except under favorable conditions.






