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The Republican convention for the first Congressional District of Maryland, will meet at Easton on the 13th of September.

No decisive movement has yet occurred between the British and Arabi Bey's forces in Egypt, although intelligence to the effect that a serious encounter has commenced is daily expected.

The September registration began on Tuesday the 5th, and will continue on the 6th, 7th, 8th, 9th, 12th, 13th, 14th, 16th and 16th days of said month.

The Oyster Commission, appointed under a law passed at the last session of the General Assembly, to investigate how best to secure an increase and perpetuation of the oyster beds of Maryland, met Friday afternoon at Barnum's Hotel, in Baltimore, for the first time, and organized.

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The Judge Question.

In Cecil county, a white-hot campaign has been maintained between the friends of Judge Stump and Mr. Cruikshank. As the time for the judicial convention approaches, there is no sign of abatement in the fight on the part of the friends of either gentleman.

The four other counties are as quiet on the question as summer duck-pools. There is no apparent opposition, south of Cecil, to the old bench. All three of the judges are recognized in every county, as possessing a high order of judicial ability, and as having been upright and impartial in their decisions. The old bench possesses the highest confidence, and the highest respect of the people of all the counties, and this not the shadow of a doubt that Judge Stump shares equally with the other two judges, this respect and confidence of the people. It is tacitly admitted that it is a bench that could not be bettered. But notwithstanding these facts, suppose a delegation favorable to Mr. Cruikshank should be elected in Cecil county. What then? Will the convention ignore the expressed will of Cecil county, and nominate the old bench in the face of opposition from the Cecil delegation? Will the convention acquiesce in the choice brought forward by the Cecil delegation and nominate Mr. Cruikshank? Will one of the lower counties, that have been laying quiet on the judicial question, suddenly strike fire, and bring forward a shining candidate for judicial honors?

The Times' does not wish to be understood as equivocating. It believes it impossible to place in the field a judicial ticket that shall equal the bench as it now stands. At the same time it is but proper to place before the people a contingency that is liable to arise,—the contingency of the present Judge from Cecil county not being presented as a candidate by his county. It is a contingency, however, that we hope and believe will not arise. The probability is very strong that Judge Stump will carry his county, in which case of course there will not be a ripple of division in the judicial convention. But, whatever shall be the result in Cecil, the Convention that meets in Chestertown on the 11th day of next October, should be careful that no small man is placed on the ticket. A high degree of legal ability, and characters of scrupulous integrity should mark the nominees. The present bench measures up to the standard. If any new man is put on, the convention should be sure that he measures up to the standard.
