Democratic Conservative Ticket.

The Delaware State Temperance Alliance has addressed letters to the legislative candidates of both parties asking them if they will advocate local option if elected.

The recognition accorded Caroline county last Wednesday by the election of Hon. George H. Moore president of the Chesterton convention is gratifying to our people.

It is said that Mr. Jay Hubbell's assessment committee has had the best season the committee ever had. The crop amounted to over \$400,000, which is in addition that voluntarily contributed by prominent politicians who did not need an assessment notice to make them do their duty.

COMMENTING ON Speaker Keifer's Ohio telegram—"the reports from the State are not encouraging, but, as for myself, I will certainly be elected," the New York Herald wittily says, by way of illustration: "The mother and child both are dead, but we have strong hopes of saving the old man."

By the laws of 1882 the time for opening the election polls has been changed from 9 A. M. one hour earlier. If this enactment had been carried to accommodate the stirring farmers, the polls would be opened by sunrise, when he could cast his intelligent ballot and then serve his country better than many who remain by attending to his work in the field.

The Post Office Department is endeavoring to stop the practice of a large number of postmasters of using the own business, while reporting to the Department that they have the stamps on hand. One postmaster stamped \$1,200 in stamps and sold almost immediately \$900 worth, but he reported to the department that he only sold about \$200. Eventually all the money is turned over to the government, but the postmasters manage to get the use of the funds for their private business for the greater part of the year. The special agents of the department are now hunting up such cases.

MR. ALBERT CONSTABLE, leader of the Cecil county delegation to the judicial nominating convention at Chestertown, in the part he took in its proceedings, made an impression upon the representatives of the lower counties of the district which cannot fail to be helpful to him should he ever have aspirations for their support in future political contests. He addressed the claims of Mr. Cruikshank with unsurpassed earnestness and ability, presenting his arguments most logically and with the skill of an accomplished orator, but the result of the convention being announced adversely to his candidate, he accepted the situation and promised not only to vote the ticket nominated, but use his influence to elect it, and his influence in Cecil is great.

FROM ALL ENNY, hatred and malice, good Lord deliver us.

Because of our earnest advocacy of the retention of Judges Robinson, Wickes and Stump by the Democracy in convention assembled, a publication in this county alludes to us as "a so-called newspaper" attempting to man a ticket and "crum it down their throats."

The reference to the JOURNAL as "a so-called newspaper" is a puerile attempt at belittling an institution for which our contemporary has seemed to entertain an envious hatred; simply that and nothing less.

If we attempted to cram a ticket down the throats of the convention, it is a dose that is wholesome, having been prepared by the people; and we commend to our contemporary an adherence to that kind of a prescription in all matters political.

The Duty of Maryland Democrats.

The Baltimore Day notes the New York Times as urging the Republicans to give their closest attention and fullest energies to securing strong candidates for Congress in order that the party shall be able to maintain its present proportion of the New York delegation in the House of Representatives. National questions alone should control the choice of Congressmen, and the Republicans of the State owe it to their party in the country at large to take care that their differences over State and local matters shall not weaken its strength in the Federal legislature. The same principle, says the Day, holds here in Maryland, where a majority of the people unquestionably disapprove of the course of Robeson and Keifer's House and Mahone's Senate and desire that the party they represent shall be compelled to loosen its hold on the Federal government. Though no such differences exist among Maryland Democrats as those which divide the New York Republicans on State questions, nevertheless there are

differences amongst us concerning certain local nominations which might, if men were different to their professed principles, cause a falling off in the Democratic vote for members of Congress. This should not and will not be the case if our Democrats remember their principles and meet their obligations toward the Democratic party of the whole Union. The next House will probably be Democratic; but it will not become such without a struggle. Our brethren in Pennsylvania, New York and Ohio promise to accomplish something, and even in Massachusetts Democrats hope to win a few seats. This is no time for a lull in the Democratic State like Maryland to lag and waver in the good fight, and if its politicians of any or all factions value the good opinion and influence their steadfastness has brought them in their party's councils they will forget local jealousies, ambitions and dislikes and join with vigor to send a solid Democratic delegation from this State to the next House of Representatives.

The Old Bench Entire.

The Democracy can well congratulate itself and the whole people may well feel proud at the work of the Chesterton Convention. The party is placed on record as in favor of preserving the dignity, purity and intelligence of our court, and it will remain safe at the moorings of popular confidence, while a guarantee is given that justice shall be administered "freely without sale, fully without denial, and speedily without delay, according to the laws of the land." The great blessing of honest judges which the people of the Second Judicial Circuit judge will be fully maintained; for the "Old Bench" will be re-elected. The farmer, the mechanic, and citizen's high and low feel secure when their rights of property and of person are to be adjudicated by the same unswerving impartiality that has marked the rulings our courts for the past fifteen years.

It is a good Democratic doctrine that of rotation in office, and that may be some advocates of this belief even in the present instance who are disposed to dissent from the action of the convention, and think others should have been given a chance to wear the ermine. Party services may demand recognition, but the very respect due the office of the judge would be perverted or at least embarrassed by giving a place on the bench as a reward for political services. Therefore the matter of the selection of the judiciary should be an exception to the general rule of rotation. Not that a politician cannot be honest, however; we believe the noblest field for patriotic endeavor to be in the political arena; but in later day politics services are come to be known as the quality that commands the offices rather than the qualifications and ability of the official aspirant. And if the Convention had given out the judgeships to professional politicians, that action would have been traced in a line wanting in that respect before the public which the high positions ought to have.

It gives us pleasure to say that the nominations are not in the least attributable to the plans of any man or set of men; but as if by one voice the people of the Second Judicial Circuit arose and through their chosen representatives declared for the Old Bench.

A WATERLOO IN OHIO.

From the New York Sun. The news from Ohio is very rosy. It turns out that Democracy there have overwhelmed their adversaries, winning a great victory. They have carried the State ticket by a majority that is put at 35,000, which is far beyond the most sanguine predictions sent from their headquarters prior to the election. The gain in Congressmen is still more remarkable. In the present House there are from Ohio but 5 Democratic members, or one-fourth of the delegation, while on Tuesday last 15 or as surely 14 of the Democratic candidates were elected from the Congressional districts, and at least one of the districts claimed by the Republicans is yet doubtful. The Republicans, who have now three-fourths of the Ohio members of Congress, will in the next Congress, have but one-third of them, or less.

In some of the Ohio districts the Democratic majorities ran beyond all expectations, and to show how great is the change that has been wrought in the public sentiment by the outrageous corruption of the Republican party. We notice that Benjamin Butterworth of Cincinnati, the four-mouthed Republican member from the First district, has been defeated; that the Democrats of the Tenth district have put in Frank H. Hurt; and that the Republicans of the Eighth district have characterized themselves by re-electing the fool Keifer, Secor Robinson's tool.

The most astonishing change to be seen in any part of the State is in Hamilton county, which contains Cincinnati. The Democratic majority of Tuesday on the State ticket, in the vote of that county for Secretary of State, was over 10,000, while last year the Republicans carried the county by a majority of 3,451.

The Republicans now say they have lost the State through the timidity of their leaders over the liquor question, and undoubtedly that question influenced the vote on the State ticket in some localities; but it is evident from the great Democratic gains in Congressmen throughout the State that other and far graver questions were uppermost in the minds of the people.

It is evident from Tuesday's election that the Democracy are to control the next Congress. In the present Congress the Republican majority is but 14, and Ohio has shown how easily that majority is to disappear. It looks as though Tuesday's Ohio elections were the first have of another tidal wave that is soon to be felt throughout the country, breaking up the rotten old Republican hulk which has been so long in the hands of buccaners. Now for New York and Pennsylvania, Massachusetts and Connecticut!

The new steamer Enterprise, built for the Chester River Transportation Company, arrived at Chestertown on Wednesday of last week. It will be placed on the line between Chester river and Baltimore as a night boat.
