Mr. McLane's Speech. We give the speech of the Hon. R. M. McLane, delivered before the State convention at the Masonic Temple in Baltimore. It is a plain, matter-of-fact setting forth of the course he intends to pursue.

"MR. PRESIDENT AND GENTLEMEN OF THE CONVENTION."

Naturally the first thing I have to say is to make you my grateful thanks for the honor your nomination confers upon me. Although I appreciate it fully I had no aspiration, no inclination which impelled me to desire it or to seek it—none whatever. Whatever political ambition I may have had has been in another direction, and it has not been satisfied by the suffrages of the people of this State. Nevertheless I am fully sensible of the obligation imposed upon me by my past life in the Democratic party, and there is no service, none whatever, that the party could call upon me to perform that I would not cheerfully perform at my sacrifice. [Applause.] I do not consider it to be in good taste in accepting your nomination to qualify my acceptance in the least degree by preference to any personal inconvenience that it may occasion me, and I only refer to it that I may be at liberty to say that I accept it as my duty.

"Of course I cannot fail to note certain incidents—let me call them, if you please, incidents of discontent in the Democratic party. I cannot fail to note them because they have been presented to my attention in every conceivable form, in private current life, in the most formal manner that public men could select to make known to the Democracy of the State the existence of disagreeable incidents calculated to weaken the party, if not to secure its defeat, but in nothing that I wish you, Mr. President, to notice them only as considerations to excite me to the fullest possible performance of my duty. In so far as these incidents have reference to rivalries between public men of the State they ought not, and as far as I am concerned, they do not excite my regret. What ought to be the effect of rivalry and contest between rivalries? If they be honorable rivalries, they ought to stimulate them to greater exertion; if they be selfish and passionate rivalries, personal in character, they are creditable to the rivals, and cannot do injury to the Democratic party."

"I refer to them again only for the purpose of bringing to your attention the fact that I am not unmindful of the difficulties suggested to me by my political brethren, nor am I unmindful of the use that is made of them by my political opponents. They are the ammunition given to charge the weapons of the enemy, and it is because they constitute ammunition given to charge the weapons of the enemy that I feel at liberty to refer to them, and to invoke you, as my political brethren, to exert your influences with the brethren themselves to cease this wrangling and to take the word of an honorable gentleman who becomes your candidate that he has no other interest in the world in the candidature than the welfare of the State of Maryland and of the Democratic party. What higher motive could I have in accepting your nomination than to contribute in my best degree, and according to the ability which I may have, to the welfare of the State and of the Democratic party? More than forty years ago, side by side with the honorable president of this convention, I enlisted in the service of that party, and has never been a day in which I have not experienced anything but satisfaction and success. As a candidate, I cannot recall defeat in the ranks of the Democracy. It has been my good fortune to be associated with that party in its day of triumph and victory, when Maryland and the entire country felt their obligations to the party which secured their welfare. [Applause.] Therefore, I accept this nomination with no misgiving, because if defeat and disaster should come I feel that in the company of that party I can bear disaster and defeat, if I carry its banner honorably to the front and vindicate its policy."

"But although I am thus to encounter the full measure of responsibility which belongs to the nomination, I beseech you, Democrats, not to linger on the way; I beseech you not only to press forward, and to give me all the support in your power in planting that banner on the outer walls, and above all things, and for your own sakes, do not commit the yet greater fault of wandering away and taking service in the ranks of the enemy, because there you add to the first crime a greater one; and yet that is the natural result of a resolution to linger by the way. "Why should I not deal as frankly with this as the occasion requires? These griefs, these difficulties that have been spoken of, with what do they associate themselves? Not with the policy of the party, because upon that we are all agreed; it must necessarily be upon details. Well, now, in all frankness, fellow-Democrats, what matters the difference of details? "Who is so presumptuous as to suppose himself right and all the rest wrong? If in good faith we mean to have a governmental policy of reform and progress; if in good faith we apply ourselves to that, what matters

Reflex Opposes McLane.

Although the issues are framed and there is little left for the JOURNAL, but to publish the news of the day, "sitting nothing down in malice or aught extenuating," I trust its columns are still open for a Democrat to justify the withholding of his vote for the Hon. In voting for Ring Tyrants that aggrandize the few at the expense of the many, and bid all good citizens contribute their might in moving from place and power the real enemies of Democratic liberty. 5th. Under Ring rule the party is disfranchised. It is a Ring candidate to represent Democratic principles, when in reality they only represent the principles of a combination of ring men. 6th. Useless offices for the benefit of the Ring must be continued, and the revenues from the people expended to keep in power an organized band of rascals and politicians. 7th. The good of the people on economical administration of State expenditures is disregarded, that party manipulators shall flourish at the expense of the taxpayer. 8th. That the voice of the party is silenced in selecting the best men for office, when not in accord with the wishes of the ring manipulators. 9th. That talent, worth and character are without influence in the party, unless subservient to the dictation of the State and county bosses. 10th. That the continuation of the Ring rule in politics is detrimental to the best interests of the State. 11th. Because bold and designing men have captured the Democratic party in Maryland and are seeking by custom and fear to coerce every voter to sustain their will against the true interest of the party and the State. 12th. Because ring rule degrades the office and positions of honor, and thus degrades the people of the State in their eyes. 13th. The platform adopted by the Ring convention at Baltimore, and the Ring rule of sincerity—a series of false pretences dishonoring to every honest Democrat in the State. Our country is not to be held responsible for the doings of the State Ring. A common soldier, he ever so brave, may have a traitor or a general. REFLEX.

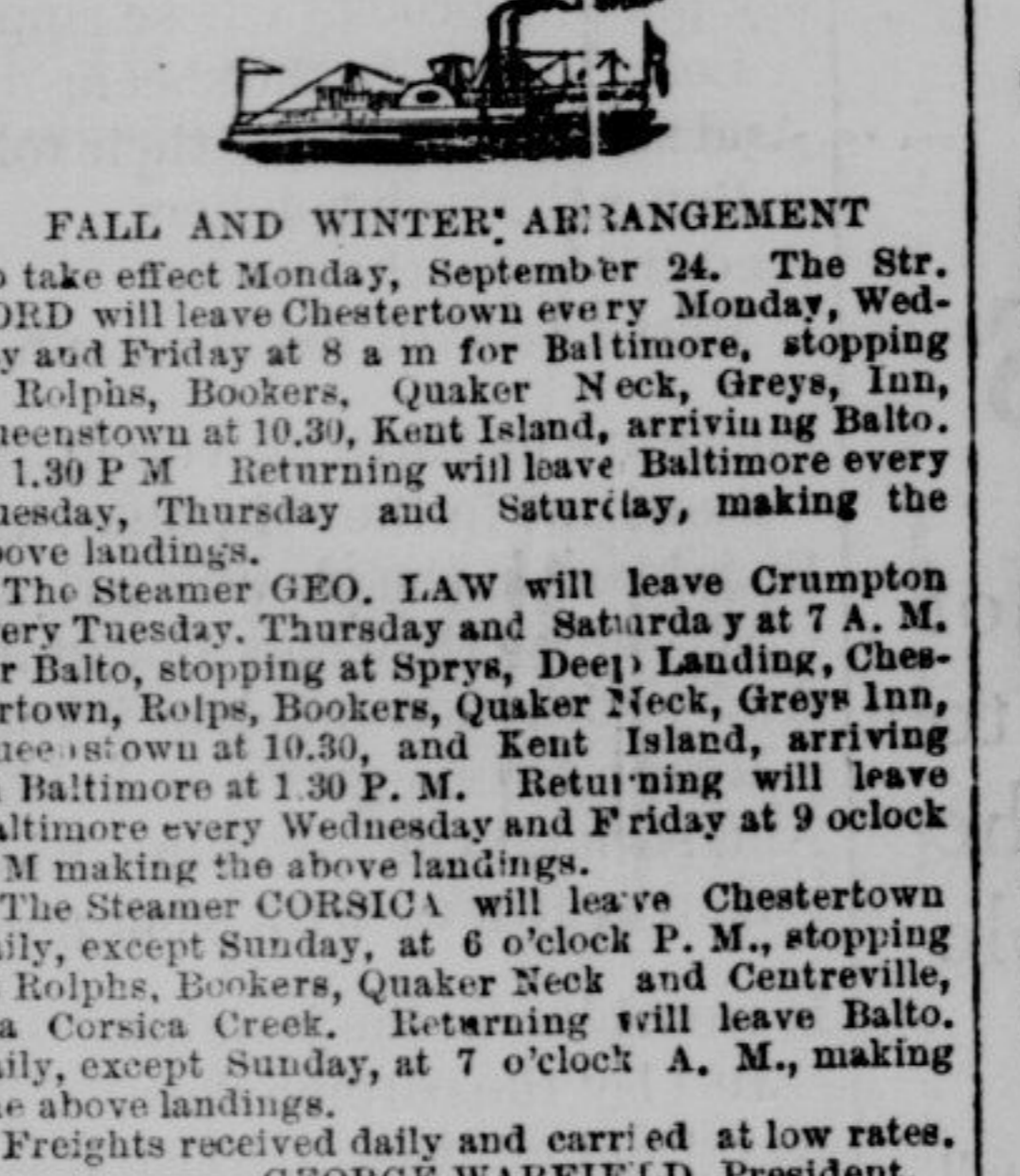

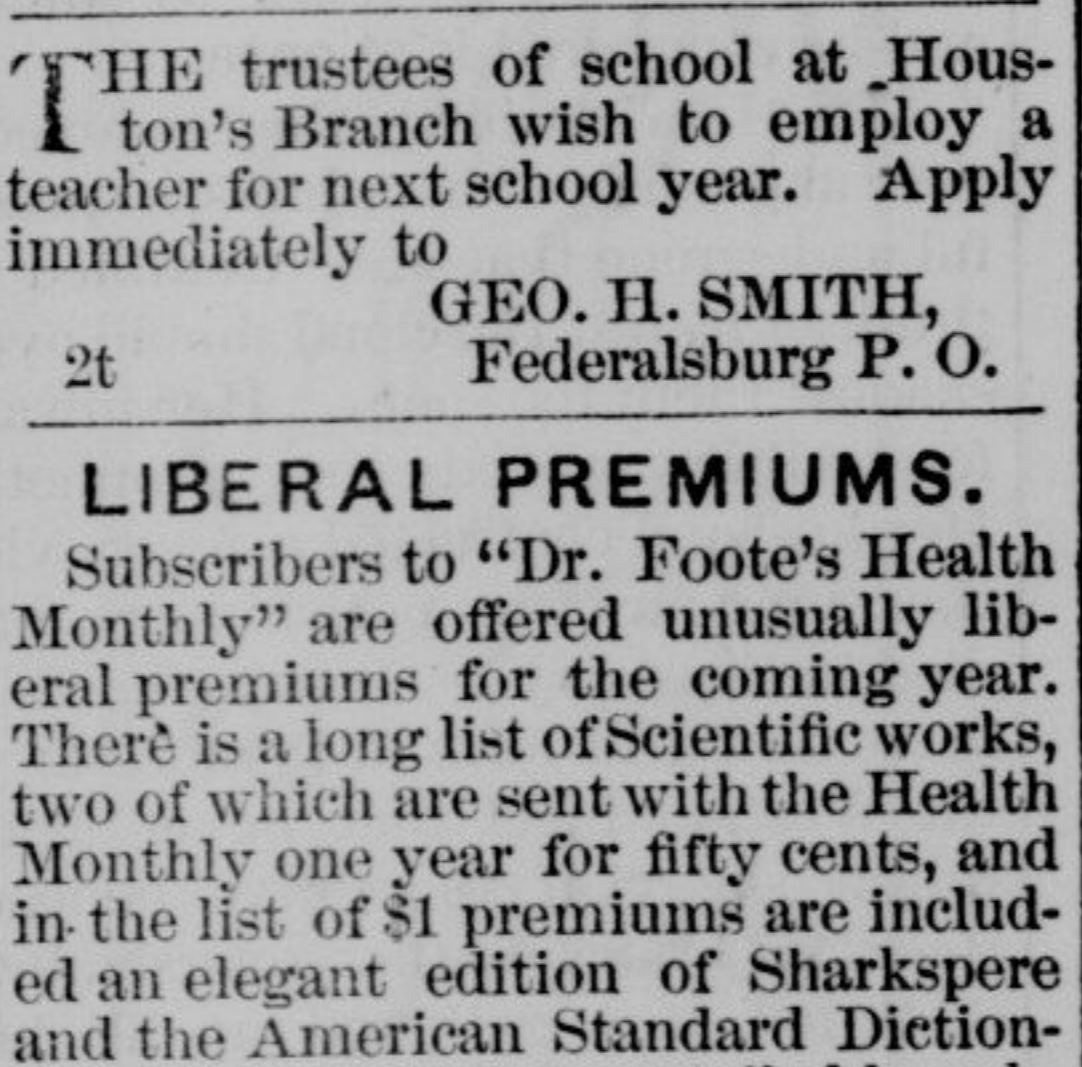
