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A BIG DAY IN EASTON.

THE Hon. Robt. M. McLane's Advent in Talbot county.

Thursday last was a big day in Easton, the people of that town and surrounding country witnessing the grandest political demonstration ever held there. It was an old-time, all-day Democratic gathering, and great party service was done.

Gen. Bradley T. Johnson, one of the most brilliant orators of this country, spoke in the morning. His speech, occupying an hour and a half, filled the town with enthusiasm and delighted all his hearers.

At 2 o'clock a grand public dinner was served on the Court House square, at which probably a thousand Democrats and several hundred dissatisfied and hungry Republicans were bountifully fed.

In the afternoon the increased and enthusiastic throng listened for two hours with earnest attention to the speech of the Hon. Thomas F. Bayard, the best, the purest, the most renowned living American statesman.

Mr. Bayard's speech made a deep impression upon the minds of the people. The last speech in the afternoon was made by our noble standard-bearer, the Honorable Robert M. McLane.

The people were deeply and intensely pleased with his address, but because completely enraptured at the prospect of having so splendid a man for their next Governor.

The following gives but an imperfect abstract of his remarks. MR. McLANE'S SPEECH.

Mr. McLane said, in the making of the canvass he could not fail to note that our opponents present but one issue, to wit: That the Democratic party in the State and in the country at large had lost all title to respect because of corruption and fraudulent methods, whilst they, the Republicans, offer on the contrary the only spectacle, and he was challenged to meet and discuss the relative merits of the two parties in this connection.

This obliged him to refer to the past, when the Republican party was in power in this State and to review the history of the Republican party in the national administration. They do not desire, indeed they protest against such reference, but their own mode of attack renders such reference an absolute necessity.

He then sketched the history of the Republican party from its origin in 1811 to 1867 in the State of Maryland, stating that it consisted of only one-fifth of the State; that it conspired with the Federal army to overthrow the laws of the State, setting up in their stead the regulations prescribed by the commanding general, and seizing upon all the municipal and State administrations and forming a new constitution, disfranchising four-fifths of the population, the old Whig and Democratic parties.

For six years this minority had possession of the State, wasted the public treasure, and finally two years after the termination of the war, petitioned the Federal government to interfere with military force and Republicanism in possession of their ill-gotten power.

Conspicuous among them in all this vicious, scandalous work was the honorable gentleman nominated by the Republicans as their candidate for Governor. He not only took a seat in the State Senate to which he was not elected, but being there and having sworn to support the constitution and laws of the State, actually petitioned the Federal Congress, as late as March, 1867, to destroy the State constitution and subject our people to military rule; in all of which proceedings he was in perfect harmony with the Republican party of the United States; for this was the period when State after State was invaded and trampled upon by military power, and when honorable judges on the bench, even in this State of Maryland, were brutally assaulted, torn from the bench where they were administering the law, and incarcerated in prison.

Fire at ANNA POLIS.—Annapolis sustained a heavy loss by fire on Monday. Twelve houses in the business part of the city were destroyed, eight of them valuable brick stores and dwellings, and four frame structures. The loss is estimated at \$90,000, partly covered by insurance. A sad feature of the disaster was the loss of two lives, one of them a young man, who perished in the effort to rescue an aged female relative, who was also burned to death.

A BROTHER OF A LOVER.

THE marriage of Miss Rebecca Williams, of Baltimore county, daughter of the Hon. George H. Williams, President of the Maryland Senate, and the Hon. Henry A. Herbert, member of the British Parliament, owner of the Mackeress estate—Lakes of Killarney, etc., is off. Although the fact of the engagement was not announced by the family, it was currently reported in society circles that they were to be married on Tuesday.

The evening passed and there was no wedding. The family has now declared that the marriage is indefinitely postponed.

Miss Williams has, it is understood, \$300,000 in her own right, and this, it seems, was the cause of the misunderstanding. The Hon. Mr. Herbert, who is Mr. P., wanted to have control of this property together with his wife, but her father was determined that the property should be secured in his daughter's name so that her husband could not touch it. This, according to report, is the cause of the postponement of the wedding, and in effect the annulment of the engagement.
