Great Caesar! What Permissims! The Baltimore American of Thursday last says: "President Smith, of the Maryland Agricultural College, brought yesterday a large persimmon of the Japanese variety, to the American office."

Charles Lanman, of Washington, President Smith had exhibited it to the students and brought it to the city to show to some friends.

The specimen was about the size of a large apple, and was as luscious as an orange. One variety of this persimmon grows to an enormous size, and each fruit will weigh as much as a pound.

It was shown in the open air by Mr. Lanman. President Smith intends to cultivate this fruit at the college, and hopes to develop important results therefrom to the public."

We thought that Baltimore county would hardly be behind in such a small matter as a persimmon, even if it was as big as your fist. The Baltimore Sun of Friday published the following: "Franklin Davis & Company have shown at the State office a basketful of Japanese persimmons, some of which were eight or nine inches in circumference. In appearance they much resemble a large, round, tomato, but in taste they are delicious, having the flavor without the stringiness of the American persimmon."

The Japanese variety may be said to rank with the peach in its sweet and luscious taste. Dried and preserved it is as fine or finer than the fig or date. The specimens brought to the Sun office were from some trees imported in the spring of 1882 by Messrs. Franklin Davis and Co. Some enterprise and the expenditure of a considerable amount of money were required to put the business on a firm footing, but now that some 100,000 have been planted and their merits have become known, the demand for them is increasing. They flourish finely in Maryland and the States further South, but in Pennsylvania and States North they have not been found to grow well."

New Standards of Time. Twenty-two o'clock sounds strange now, but the public is likely to become familiar with such an expression during the next few years. Railroads, especially, have always felt the inconvenience of different standards of time, based upon the various meridians, and now many of the most important lines have decided to number the hours from one to twenty-four, and beginning at the Atlantic Ocean, to divide North America into four time belts. All the railroads now using Boston, New York, Philadelphia, Baltimore, Toronto, Hamilton or Washington time as a standard, based upon meridians east of these points, or adjacent thereto, will be governed by the 75th meridian or Eastern time, which is that of Philadelphia. The next division will be called central, or that of New Orleans; the time of the 105th meridian or "mountain time" will be about that of Denver, and "Pacific time" or that of the 120th meridian, will coincide with the local time at Reno. Each standard will prevail over a belt of territory extending North and South indefinitely and reaching 71 degrees East and as many degrees West of the meridian by which it is governed. Companies representing some 80,000 miles of road have adopted this scheme of standard "time belts," and will run their trains by it, commencing Nov. 18. Standards of time are arranged to take the place of fifty or more that have been puzzling travelers so long, necessitating the setting of their watches in every town they stopped at. It is expected that eventually the general public will follow the railroads in adopting so convenient a scheme for securing uniform time within wide areas.
