

Salisbury to Get A New Airport

Congressman David J. Ward announces that Salisbury, Maryland has been selected by the Civilian Aeronautics Administration for improvement projects on 288 airports, 149 of which are new locations, have been approved by a Board consisting of the Secretaries of War, Navy and Commerce, as necessary to national defense.

Mr. Ward further states that an allocation of \$380,000 by the CAA has been made for the Salisbury Airport, and it is expected that work will be completed sometime shortly after the first of the year. Labor will be furnished by the Works Projects Administration.

Seven hundreds acres will be purchased, costing approximately \$20,000, the cost to be borne jointly by the City of Salisbury and Wicomico County, each to pay half the cost as well as half of the up-keep.

The airport is to be located within four miles of Salisbury about a half-mile off the Mount Hermon road. It will lie between the Mount Hermon road and the old road from Salisbury to Snow Hill.

The Federal Government will construct NE-SW and NW-SE Landing Strips, 500 by 5000 feet, and pave runways, 150 by 5000 feet thereon, including incidental field grading and drainage; and install basic lighting and contact lights on both runways.

The airport is listed as Class "4", which is the classification for the largest airports. Class ratings of airports are by runway lengths, ranging from Class "1", having runways 2500 feet or less to Class "4", having runways of 4500 feet or more.

The airports, said Brig. Gen. Donald H. Connolly, head of the CAA, "have been selected to meet defense requirements", but he added, "every effort has been made to select sites offering future value to commercial and civil aviation, thus insuring a permanent return from this defense investment."

Farm Bureau Membership Drive

Simultaneous drives to boost Farm Bureau membership opened Wednesday in Caroline, Kent, Queen Anne's and Talbot counties.

The four counties have a quota of 880 members, or 10 per cent above last year's quota, said Martin L. Sutton, of Ridgely, field representative of the Maryland Farm Bureau for the Eastern Shore. County quotas are: Caroline, 260; Kent, 235; Queen Anne's, 235; Talbot, 150.

Lack of Farm Labor Raises Wages

Delmarva farmers this month are paying a higher wage level for labor since the same period in 1930, and the supply of farm labor to meet the demand is only about 62 per cent of normal, a record low, while the demand is 98 per cent of normal.

The entire Peninsula is in about the same general situation, a report of the U. S. Department of Agriculture Marketing Service said, although in lower counties conditions were a little better where migratory labor is more prevalent.

SAMPLING SEED

When seeds are sampled from a bin it is important to take samples from all points in the bin so as to get an over-all average. It is pointed out by Forrest Holmes, Head of the Seed Inspection Laboratory at College Park. He states that seed taken off the top of a bin may show much higher germination than seed from the bottom and in the center. The former have had a better opportunity to dry out and keep cool.

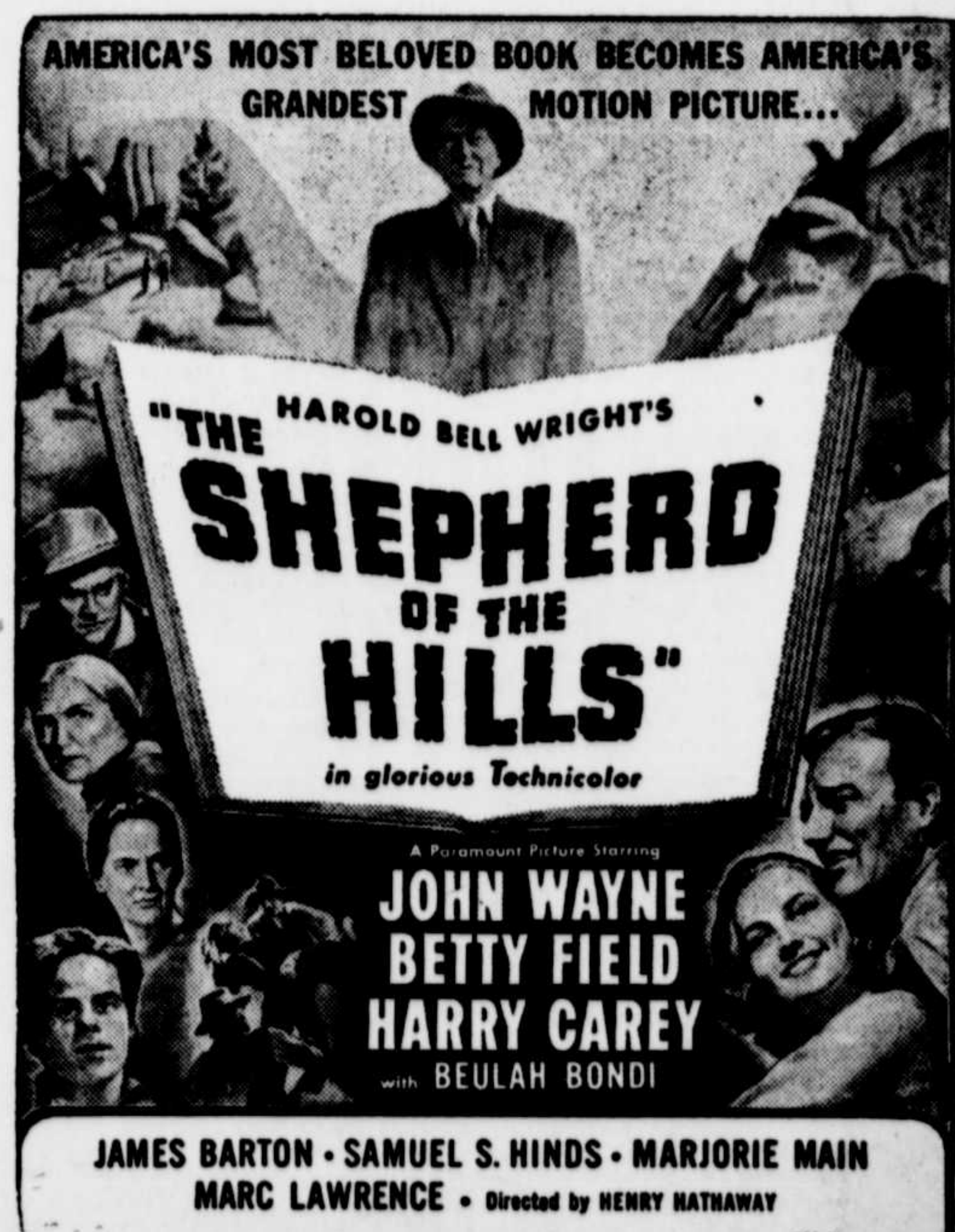
