Athletics in the

Navy Stress Good Sportsmanship

You wouldn't think that Uncle Sam's men who go down to the sea in ships would have much time for sports—but they do. The Navy considers athletics to be an integral part of a well-balanced Naval life. George Pratt, director of physical education of the Centreville High School, explains how the Navy teaches teamwork, individual resourcefulness, and good sportsmanship.

"Nearly every popular American sport is played in the Navy," says Mr. Pratt. "There are football, baseball and basketball teams. Boxing, wrestling, track and field and swimming meets are enjoyed. Every ship and station has an officer in charge of athletics. He, in turn, has several assistants. All work together in producing winning teams, building competitive spirit between ships and fleets."

To play on Navy teams, a man must be physically fit for every contest. Boxers and wrestlers are examined carefully before every match to make certain they are "in the pink."

Each ship has its own baseball and football teams and when a ship comes into a Naval base a series of games are arranged with the teams of other naval units. Spirit runs high and rivalry is keen. During baseball season, when the ships are at anchor at sea, the sailors rig up large nets on deck and stage batting practice just as easily as if they were on a baseball field. Some bluejackets even take their golf clubs along and practice driving into the nets.

"Healthy athletic competition puts a never-say-die spirit into the men," adds Coach Pratt. "It tends to develop efficient units, just as it welds unity in high schools and colleges. It develops an esprit de corps that is remarkable."

Mr. Pratt recently ran across an excerpt from the Battle Fleet Athletic Rules reprinted in the U. S. Navy Bluejacket's Manual. "It could well serve as a guide for our own school and town", he said. It reads as follows: "The commander in chief desires to urge upon all that athletic competition unless it is characterized by clean sportsmanship, free from any taint or suspicion of sharp practice, and free from any unfriendliness, is not the spirit of true Americanism, which is to play fair and give a square deal. Winning or losing, the main thing is to show yourselves good and clean sportsmen—modest winners if the breaks are with you and good losers if the breaks are against you."

Duck Family

On Increase

Hunters will be glad to know that everything will be perfectly lucky this fall, and if they don't bag their quota it will be because they took a flagon on liquid courage into a blind and sat until they got that way.

Ray Benson reports that all it will be necessary to do is aim in the general direction of the sky and let loose. There will be about 85,000,000 count 'em) ducks, and a fellow who can't hit one of them has no business toting a shooting iron.

Benson is executive secretary of Ducks Unlimited, Inc., the organization which takes an annual census of the duck population and always arrives at a pretty accurate figure, give or take a few million.

Last January the Department of the Interior took its winter census and estimated the crop at between 70 and 75 million. Ducks Unlimited now has completed its summer pond-to-pond survey in Canada, and allowing for ducks not at home estimates a 10 to 15 per cent increase, which leads to the final estimates of close to 85, 000, 000.

This is the highest total in seven years. In 1934, when the dust bowls were filled with dust and rain fell as if squeezed out of an eyedropper, there were only 30,000,000 ducks left on the continent.

Every year since then has shown an increase in the population, due to more favorable weather conditions and steadily improving conservation efforts, for which Ducks Unlimited can take a bow.

Last year the population had increased to such an extent that the season was increased from 45 to 60 days, the same as it is this year.

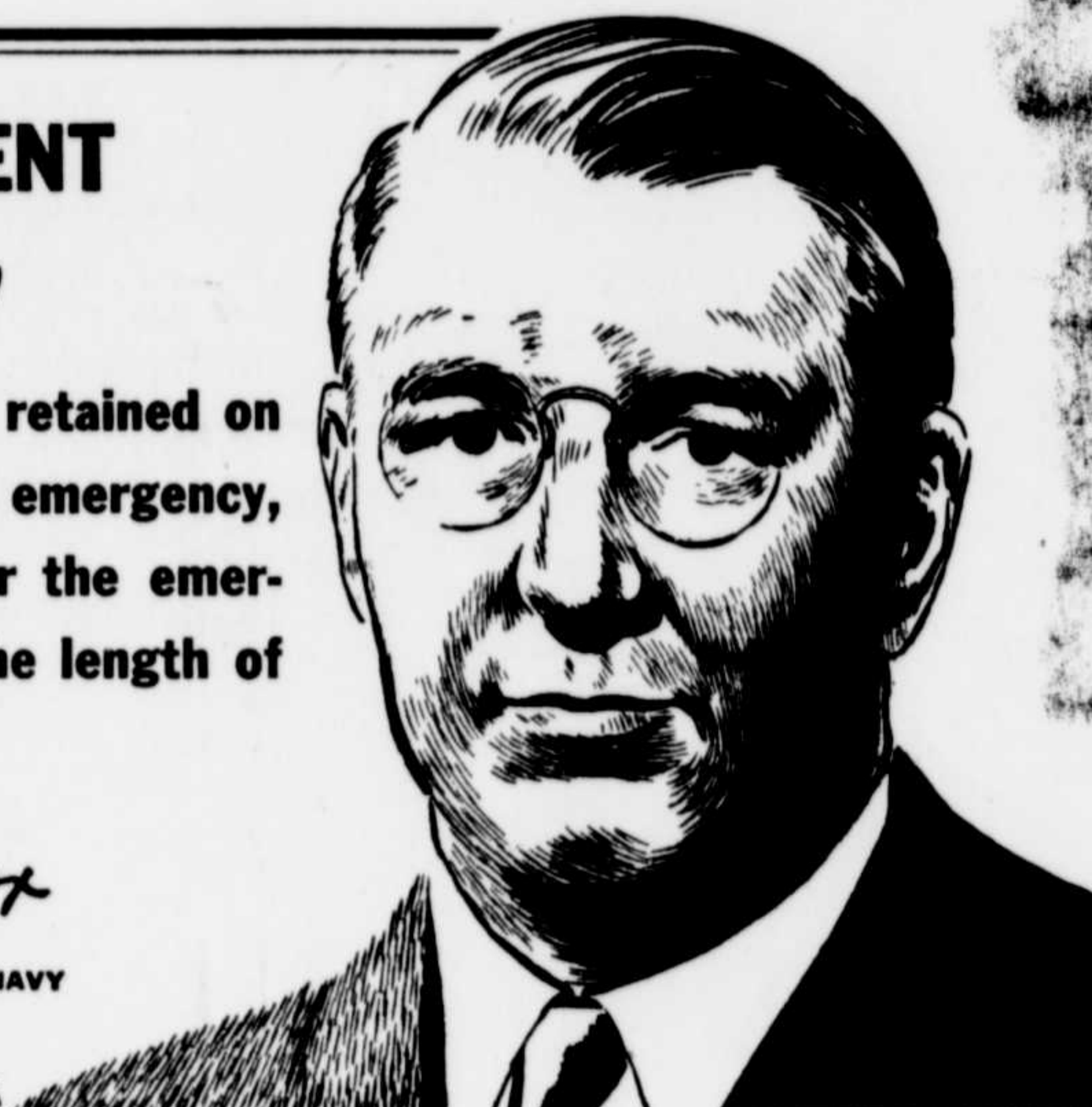

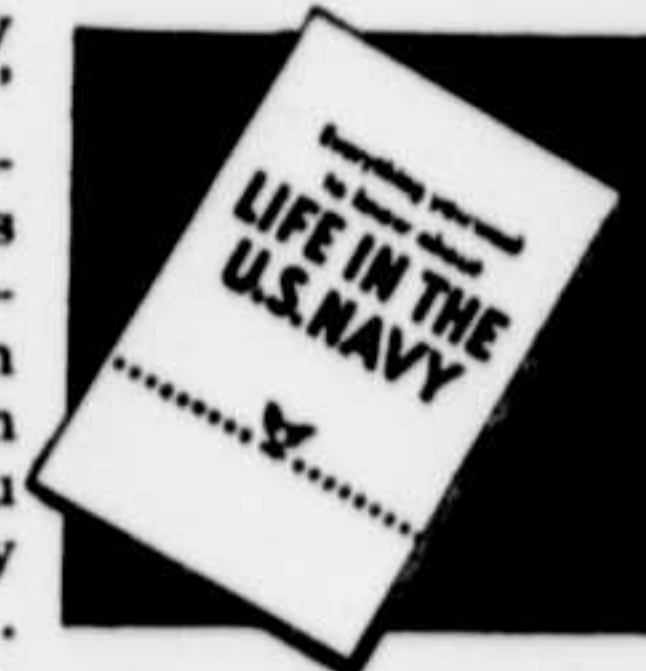
