

Your Old-Age Check Will be Late

Beginning with the September check, monthly payments of old-age and survivors insurance benefits will reach beneficiaries one day later than before, according to an announcement made today by Mr. N. P. Foster, manager of the Social Security Board office in Salisbury. "We make this announcement," Mr. Foster explained, "so that people who have been receiving benefits will not be worried because the September check did not come on the day it would otherwise be expected. Under a new arrangement between the Social Security Board and the United States Treasury," Mr. Foster continued, "all monthly checks hereafter will be dated the first of the month following the month for which the payment is certified—September checks will be dated October 1 and marked 'for September'; other checks will be dated November 1 and marked for October' and so on. Instead of mailing each month's checks in time to reach beneficiaries on that day of the month, they will now be mailed to reach beneficiaries on the first of the following month."

Richard Groves

Funeral services for Richard Groves, 95, Chestertown's oldest citizen, retired commission merchant and prominent Democrat of Kent county, who died at his home in Chestertown Thursday evening, were held Sunday afternoon.

For many years he was engaged in the commission merchant business in Baltimore, specializing in buying peaches from the Eastern Shore orchards when the peach was in its heyday. Later he moved to his farm near Chestertown which he operated until his retirement a number of years ago because of advancing age. During his younger days Mr. Groves was one of the most influential district leaders of the Democratic party in this county.

Besides his widow, Mrs. Mary Groves, he leaves a son, Dean Groves, of Philadelphia; also a large number of relatives living in Kent county.

Mr. Groves was well-known in Queen Anne's county as he leased the Wye Hall farm, now owned by Mr. Stillwell, and planted over two hundred acres in peach trees, which was considered one of the finest orchards on the shore.

Ban on Strikes

Maryland's Legislative Council is considering sponsoring a bill at the next General Assembly session making it unlawful for State, county and municipal employees to strike or join outside labor unions.

Thomas H. Conlon, council chairman, advanced the proposal and the council instructed its research division to study it and prepare to draft legislation.

It would outlaw strikes like those recently declared by State employees of the Claiborne-Annapolis Ferry Company and by municipal employees of the Baltimore city garbage collection department.

Senator Dudley G. Roe, majority floor leader in the upper house, said the proposed bill would "make it impossible for employees to hold up the functions of the State, county and municipal governments."

ORDER OF PUBLICATION

HARRY L. COULTER, Plaintiff VS. FLORENCE H. COULTER, Defendant

In the Circuit Court for Queen Anne's County, In Equity. Chancery No. 3293

The object of this suit is to procure a Decree of Divorce A Vinculo Matrimonii by the Plaintiff, Harry L. Coulter, from the Defendant, Florence H. Coulter.

The Bill of Complaint recites that the parties were married on December 24th, 1928, in Centerville, Maryland; that they lived together at Chester, Md., Queen Anne's County, until the first part of November, 1938; that though the conduct of the Plaintiff towards his wife, Florence H. Coulter, has always been kind, affectionate and above reproach, Florence H. Coulter, on or about the first day of November, 1938, without any just cause or reason, abandoned and deserted the Plaintiff in Chester, Queen Anne's County, Md., and that such abandonment has continued uninterruptedly for at least eighteen months, to wit, from about the first day of November, 1938, to the present time, and is deliberate and final and the separation beyond any reasonable expectation or hope of reconciliation; that no children were born as a result of this marriage; that the Plaintiff is a resident of Queen Anne's County, Maryland, where he has resided all his life; that the Defendant, Florence H. Coulter, is a non-resident of the State of Maryland, and when last heard of was living in Detroit, State of Michigan; and the Plaintiff prays the Court that he be divorced A Vinculo Matrimonii from the Defendant, and that he have such other and further relief as his case may require.

It is thereupon Ordered by the Circuit Court for Queen Anne's County, in Equity, on this 17th day of September, 1941, that the Plaintiff, Harry L. Coulter, by causing a copy of this Order to be inserted in some newspaper printed and published in said Queen Anne's County, Maryland, once in each of four successive weeks before the 25th day of October, 1941, next, give notice to the said absent Defendant, Florence H. Coulter, of the object and substance of this Bill of Complaint, warning her to be and appear in this Court, in person or by Solicitor, on or before the 15th day of November, 1941, next, to show cause, if any she has, why a Decree should not be passed as prayed.

Annual Examination Of Oyster Bars

The Commission of Tidewater Fisheries began the 1941 inspection of Bay oyster bars on October 9th. It is the practice to obtain the services of one of the Bay dredgers to duplicate commercial oyster dredging operations. Captain Bill Carroll Todd has been employed to use his dredge boat for the work.

The inspection of the oyster rocks serves several useful purposes. The Commission, as a result of these yearly surveys, can advise the shippers and packers of the supply that they can expect when dredging season opens November 1, can estimate the number of marketable and under-sized oysters present for the immediate and future production of the bar; and can check the supply of cultch to learn whether it is adequate or whether additional shelling is necessary. A detailed report of the condition of the bars will appear in the next issue of this paper.
