**Your Income Tax**

To make it easier for taxpayers to meet the increased taxes required by the National Defense Program, the treasury Department is offering for sale two series of notes, both dated August 1, 1941, and maturing August 1, 1943.

In January of each year two new series will be provided so that a taxpayer can always purchase notes during the entire year in which he is receiving his income for use in payment of taxes due the following year. The reason for the two-year note is to permit a taxpayer, if he so desires, to begin saving in January of one year and continue thru that year to save for his taxes due the following year.

All notes are sold at par and accrued interest. When presented in payment of income taxes they will be received at par and accrued interest up to and including the month in which such taxes are paid. Interest will not occur beyond the maturity of the notes. If not presented in payment of income taxes, they will be redeemed for cash under certain specified conditions at the purchase price paid for the notes. In other words, the taxpayer, if he redeems the notes for cash, gets back just the amount he paid.

Complete information about these Treasury notes, will be found in a Treasury Department Circular available at local banks, Federal Reserve Banks and branches, or Treasury Department, Washington, D. C.

**Meeting Announced for Tomato Growers**

A meeting for the discussion of the handling and care of southern tomato plants has been scheduled for Friday, February 6, in the Ballroom of the Wicomico Hotel, Salisbury, Md.

To facilitate handling of the large crowd expected, county agents and their farmers are asked to attend the morning session at 10 a. m. Canners, their key production men, and their key farmers are invited to attend the afternoon meeting at 2 p. m. Interested persons may attend whichever of the two meetings is most convenient, but it is asked that where possible they attend in the morning.

Dr. W. D. Moore, Plant Pathologist for the State of Georgia, and D. F. Farlinger, Chief Inspector of the Georgia Board of Entomology, will be present at the meeting. They have prepared colored slides, which, accompanied by a lecture on the handling of southern plants, should bring much important information to growers and canners of tomatoes.

With tomatoes one of the most important foods in our national diet, and with the U. S. Department of Agriculture asking for a tremendous increase in the production of tomatoes for 1942, farmers and canners in this section should be interested in producing a maximum crop of tomatoes from every plant set out this year. The information obtained at this meeting will be of considerable help toward attaining that goal.

**Governor Names Taxes to Handle Defense Equipment**

Governor Herbert R. O'Connor announced today that he has selected State Comptroller J. Millard Tawes, to act as a representative of the State of Maryland in connection with the distribution of auxiliary fire fighting equipment, medical supplies, protective clothing, and other articles to be sent to this State by the Office of Civilian Defense in Washington, Mayor LaGuardia, as United States Director of Civilian Defense, requested Governor O'Connor to name a State Officer, through whom the material and supplies could be distributed. Under measures now adopted by the Office of Civilian Defense, this supply of equipment and clothing will be sent to the States for the protection of persons and property from bombing attacks.

Inasmuch as Maryland is in the "target area" with other States on the Atlantic Seaboard, it is expected that this section will receive the first allotments to be made from the Office of Civilian Defense.

In selecting Comptroller Tawes, Governor O'Connor pointed out that the Comptroller's experience in accounting work would facilitate the work. Furthermore, the Governor emphasized, a large portion of the equipment and supplies will be for fire protection. Comptroller Tawes was formerly the President of the State Volunteer Firemen's Association and is well informed on all questions pertaining to fire fighting operations, Governor O'Connor declared.

Migratory labor follows a regular pattern, according to David L. B. Fringer, director of the Maryland Employment Service, which will handle the placement of the migratory and other available farm labor. Migratory labor falls into distinct groups, each group following a certain crop from the time the harvest begins in the South until the last of the particular crop is harvested in the South.

**Moves to Boost Defense**

**Bond Sales to Employees**

The State of Maryland will initiate promptly a system whereby State employees will be encouraged to the fullest degree to purchase United States Defense Bonds and Stamps, it was announced today by Governor Herbert R. O'Connor.

Under the plan to which the Governor has given his approval, an employee will be designated in each State department and agency to promote the sale of bonds and stamps to handle all collection, purchases and delivery of the stamps or bonds for the convenience of the other employees.

"In view of the urgent need for the participation of everyone of our citizens in defense activities of some kind," Governor O'Connor declared, "many of our State employees, as well as of our civilian population generally, who are not physically or otherwise available for active civilian defense or military service, now have the opportunity to assist in the financing of the huge war operations necessary by buying United States defense bonds and stamps.

"It must be borne in mind, however, very definitely that this is not the 'Christmas Fund' type of saving by which a few dollars for which we may have no immediate need, is put into bonds. When our soldiers and sailors are giving up occupations of life-time, and may have already made the supreme sacrifice, it isn't asking too much of State employees, or of any American citizen, that they do without luxuries, and even some necessities in order that they may make generous purchases of bonds towards the financing of our war activities.

**Migratory Labor Pools**

**Planned for the Shore**

Migratory labor pools are being planned for the Eastern Shore to help truck farmers harvest the record-breaking cannery crops asked for by the Government.

These farm-labor pools will be in the form of four mobile migratory labor camps under sponsorship of the Farm Security Administration of the United States Department of Agriculture.

Three of the camps will be established before the picking season opens on the Eastern Shore. The fourth, according to present plans, will be moved in from North Carolina about June 1. They are among eighteen such camps to be established along the Eastern seaboard from Florida to the upper end of the Connecticut River Valley.

Several shore counties will be served by the four camps, which will be established in Worcester, Somerset, Dorchester and Wicomico counties.

If suitable locations are available the Somerset county camp will be located near Westover, the Wicomico one near Hebron, the Worcester one near Beaver Dam and the Dorchester one near Hurlock.

All tentative locations have been planned so as to make the labor supply available to other regions as well. The Dorchester camp, for example, will be placed so as to be available to Talbot and Caroline counties and also to Sussex county, in Delaware. The Wicomico site also has proximity to Delaware. Beaver Dam, in Worcester, also would serve a portion of Somerset.

The Dorchester county camp will be the one to arrive from North Carolina.

Aside from sociological aspects, officials say the camps are being established for a number of reasons among them to:

Provide essential labor in the face of an acute labor shortage.
