

Don't Buy Batteries

Unless Needed

"With the motoring public jittery because of restrictions on tires and tubes, the tendency to 'stock up' on other accessories important to motor vehicle operation is understandable the Keystone Automobile Club says. "But," it adds, "the temptation should be strongly resisted in the matter of batteries."

Quoting as its authority the United States Rubber Company, the Club in a statement by Manager Matthew P. Hanley, advises motorists not to buy batteries unless they are needed, for the following reasons:

1. Storage batteries deteriorate as fast (or faster) when not in use as they do when installed in a car. A battery if stored away for a couple of months will be found to be entirely useless.

2. Use of two batteries alternately in a car will result in the unnecessary expense of frequent recharging because it is impossible for the car generator to keep either one properly charged or to "pick up" a battery which has become partially discharged while idle.

3. Motorists who buy an extra battery and ask the dealer to keep it charged until called for will involve themselves in extra expense and at the same time keep useful material out of circulation.

"The Club is informed," the statement continued, "that there are plenty of batteries assured 'for months to come,' and that there should be no scarcity if motorists buy only as needed."

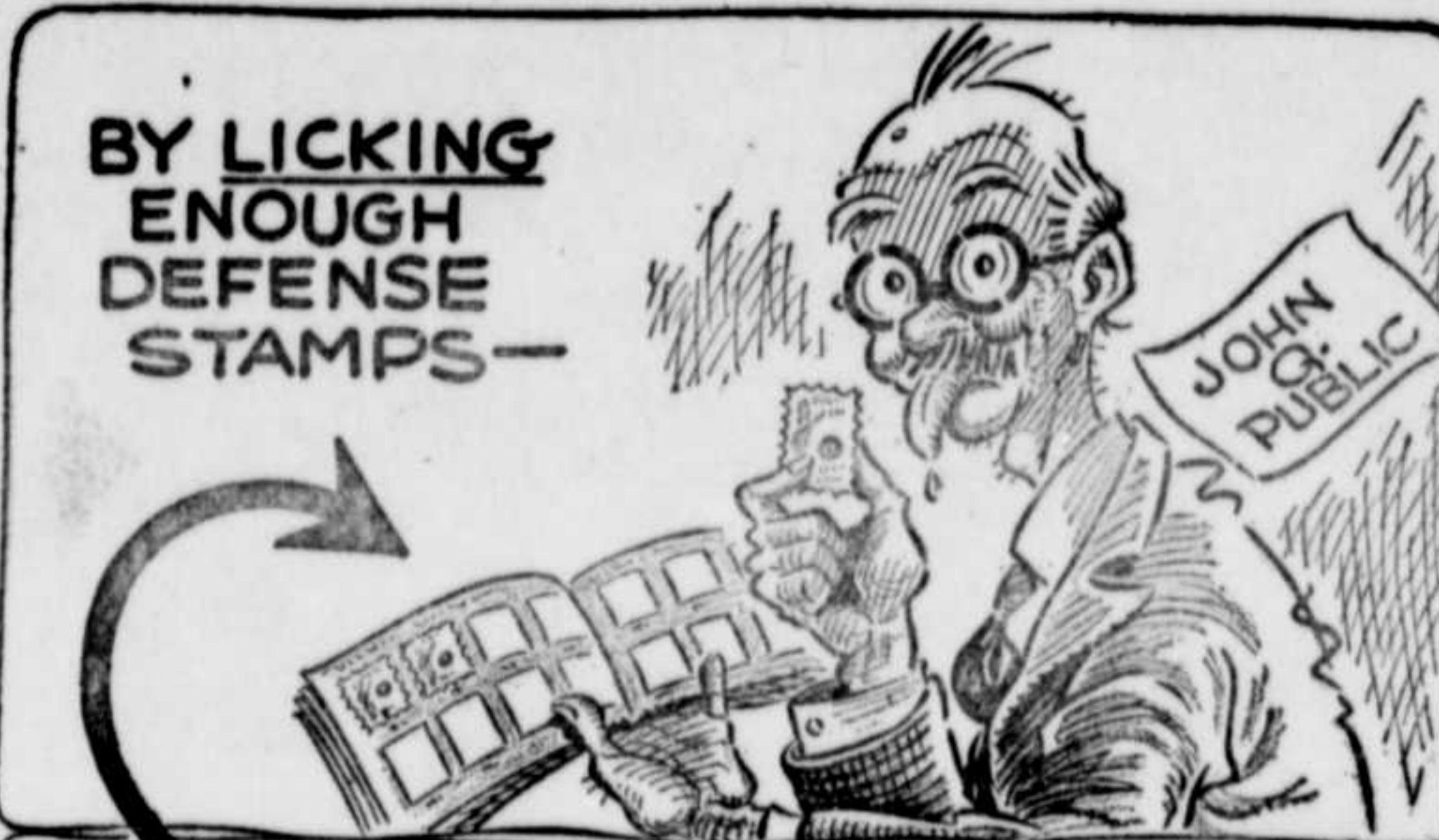
