School Will Have Lunch Program This Session

Dr. Thomas G. Palmer, State Superintendent of Schools, was notified last week by Governor O'Connell to arrange for Maryland's participation in the national school lunch program. "Provided that there is no interference by the Federal Government" in the conduct of the state school system.

Under the proposed program, \$200,000 annually is expected to be brought into the State for school lunches. Governor O'Connell said he believes considerable benefits will be afforded through the wide adoption of the program and that he will make provision for the administrative costs.

Four children will benefit from this proposed system. Under the system, however, the children receiving food will not be identified as a school system makes it possible for this fact to be confidential.

One of the greatest aims of the program is the nutritional value of it. In addition to this, the children will be taught selection in their own choices.

Cole's Circus Billed To Exhibit on Shore

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BOILED ROCK FISH—WITH EGG SAUCE

Sauté in a 4 to 5 lb. fish, wrap in a scalded cloth and cook slowly for 20 minutes. Place on a hot platter and pour the following sauce:

Mix two level tablespoons of flour with a little water. Add the yolk of two eggs and beat well. Stir into a pot of boiling milk and cook until thickened—beet of all adding salt, pepper and lemon juice to taste, and two or three chopped hard-boiled eggs.
