### INFORMATION FOR BENEFICIARIES UNDER THE MARYLAND UNEM-

January 1, 1938

After January 1, 1938, employers of 4 to 7 workers will become subject any of these workers until after July 1, 1938.

Summary of Benefits Only those unemployed workers get benefits who have worked in insured employment some time since January 1, 1937, and are otherwise eligible.

Types of work that are not insured are:

agricultural domestic

governmental

work done for certain charitable, educational and religious institutions, or

by an officer or member of the crew of a vessel on the navigable waters of the United States, or by an individual in the employ of son, daughter or spouse.

How Can a Worker Tell Whether He is an Insured Worker? Employers whose workers are insured must display a poster in a conspicuous place in each place of business. Look for the poster with a red

border. Ask your employer if he is insured under the Maryland Unemploy- in any one quarter are counted. ment Compensation Law. Insured workers eligible for benefits are those who are partially or

totally unemployed, have served a waiting period, and are not disqualified. An insured worker is totally unemployed for the seven-day week in which he is not working and has no earnings except \$3.00 or less for odd jobs or subsidiary work.

AN INSURED WORKER WHO EARNS NO MONEY FOR THE WEEK EXCEPT \$2.50 FOR ODD JOBS IS TOTALLY UNEMPLOYED. AN INSURED WORKER WHO EARNS \$3.50 A WEEK FOR ODD

JOBS IS NOT TOTALLY UNEMPLOYED. A week of total unemployment begins with the day on which the worker

registers at the State Employment Office. An insured worker is partially unemployed for the week in which:

(1) His hours have been reduced because of lack of work. (2) His earnings (not including odd jobs or subsidiary work earnings of)

\$3.00 or less) are less than sixth-fifths of his Weekly Benefit

An eligible unemployed insure dworker does not get benefits for partial or total unemployment until he has served a waiting period of two weeks of total unemployment for which he gets no benefits.

Two weeks of partial unemployment equal one week of total unemploy-

THERE IS NO DIFFERENCE BETWEEN THE WAITING PERIOD FOR BENEFITS FOR TOTAL AND THE WAITING PERIOD FOR BENEFTS FOR PARTIAL UNEMPLOYMENT.

Waiting weeks needs not be served one immediately after the other, but the waiting period must be served within the thirteen (13) weeks immediately

preceding the week for which benefits are paid. A worker's Benefit Year is the fifty-two (52) week period beginning the

week for which a worker first receives benefits. To get benefits for total unemployment, a worker must take his Social Security Account Card or Number to the nearest State Employment Office. For every day the worker delays, his benefits for total unemployment will be

delayed one day. The worker must take his Social Security Account Card or Number to the State Employment Office because the number enables the Board to find his record.

At the State Employment Service, the worker registers for work, accepts suitable employment if such is available, fills out an orginal claim for benefits, obtains an identification card (Form Md. UC-51) and is assigned a day for reporting to the same Employment Office during the next week.

The benefits for partial unemployment in any week are the difference over those made during November of between the Weekly Benefit Amount and five-sixth (5/6's) of all earnings last year. for that week.
