

tween nature's storehouses of food to make food out of raw materials. Plants make many uses of the products they manufacture, the uses varying greatly with the kind of plant. The foods may be made into wood, gums, resins, flowers, fruits, or seeds. They may be stored away as starches or sugars to serve some future need of the plant or to be

used in the growth of new plants. Ten chemical elements are required by plants in this process, notes a writer in the Chicago Tribune. They are carbon, oxygen, hydrogen, nitrogen, calcium, sulphur, iron, potassium, phosphorus, and magnesium. A few others usually are found, but most plants seem to grow without them. Nature makes ample provision for the two that come from the air-carbon and oxy-Soils often are deficient in sium and sometimes calcium and These are added to the soil in fertilizers.





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Lesson for January 16 BEGINNING A LIFE OF SERVICE

LESSON TEXT-Mark 1:14-28. GOLDEN TEXT—The time is fulfilled, and the kingdom of God is at hand: repent ye. and believe the gospel.-Mark 1:15. PRIMARY TOPIC-Jesus' First Helpers. JUNIOR TOPIC-Why the Fishermen Followed Jesus. INTERMEDIATE AND SENIOR TOPIC-Serving Now. YOUNG PEOPLE AND ADULT TOPIC-Adjusting Life to Service.

The public ministry of our Lord was not begun with any great fanfare of publicity. Leaving Judea where the entrenched forces of formal religion had joined the forces of sin and degradation in opposition to him, and which had brought about the imprisonment of John, our Lord appears in his home country, Galilee.

I. Preaching the Gospel (vv. 14, 15, 21, 22).

His first activity is worthy of careful note, for it is not exactly what one might expect in this Gospel of Mark, which we have already characterized as the Gospel of mighty deeds rather than of words. Jesus came to work miracles, and he did work them, and continues to do the miraculous even in our day. It is therefore significant that his first recorded work was that of preaching, his second that of calling and preparing fellow workers, and last of all the miraculous healing of the demoniac.

From a human viewpoint one would think that the opposite order would prevail. First let the Master do some mighty miracle to catch the attention of the people, then organize a great "party," and then preach. Much of the so-called evangelistic effort in our day follows that human formula and fails of lasting results. Observe the man who magnifies preaching and gives the Word of God pre-eminence, and you will see real spiritual accomplishments. Notice also that when Jesus began his ministry in Capernaum (v. 21), it was by teaching, essentially the same as preaching. There is no

The other thought is also of vital import. The demons recognized Jesus, they knew that he was "the Holy One of God" (v. 24), and they bore public testimony of that fact. And yet they were demons, the enemies of God. Saving faith in the Lord Jesus Christ is more than a knowledge of his claims, a pious repetition of his name even though it be done in public. Let us make sure that we have a living faith in the Son of God.

Our final observation is that our Lord did not permit the demons to testify concerning him. Christ and his church do not need the flattering words or the financial support of unbelievers. Every time we accept them we weaken our testimony and make ourselves ridiculous before the world. If unbelievers think well of Christ let them show their sincerity by seeking him as Saviour . Then both they and their gifts will be acceptable and to his

The earliest missiles were arrows padded to fit the bores of the weapons. Gunpowder was first used about 1331 to fire cannon, but the hand gun did not exist until almost a hundred years later. The early hand gun consisted of a short iron tube prolonged behind into a rod. This rod was hitched under the arm when the gun was fired. The charge was inserted from the muzzle. It was ignited by a wick match applied to a touch-hole on the side of the iron tube. The match was held in a hinged fork mounted on the stock, enabling it to be brought into contact with the gunpowder in the WNU-4 priming pan. This match lock, so arranged, was called the "harquebus." The early hand gun was

called an arquebus. Charles VIII set out for Italy in 1494 with 140 heavy cannon and with one-tenth of his infantry armed with hand guns. Before the year was over his victorious army had entered Rome.

The hand guns probably frightened more people than they killed. The smouldering wick match and the powder in the firing pan were exposed to rain so a gun often misfired.

However, the new weapons were effective and Charles VIII entered Naples in May, 1495, in great pomp and splendor to claim the kingdom of Naples which his father had inherited. Charles planned to conquer Constantinople, but he died three years after his famous conquest of Italy, at the age of twenty-eight.
