ISLAND TRIP INVESTIGATION POSTPONED

The investigation into the death of Sergeant Hunter, of the Maryland State Police, who froze to death while with a group of volunteers walking across Tangier Sound carrying provisions to people living on that island, has been postponed until next week.

The investigating committee, headed by General Milton A. Reckard will inquire into the wisdom of the trip which was headed by Major Geary, head of the State Police.

The following statement appeared in a Somerset County paper: Wednesday morning Clerk of the Court J. J. Millard Tawes, chairman of the lower county Red Cross Chapter, visited both of the ice-bound islands, by plane, carrying medical supplies and other necessities, which had been gathered by the Red Cross and members of the State Police.

Mr. Tawes states that upon his arrival at Smiths Island he was made welcome and invited to partake of a fine roast duck dinner. Upon investigation he found that the stores were practically filled with merchandise, the people were happy and there was no shortage of food or fuel, as the citizens had prepared for the severe winter, which they were expecting.

He also found considerable sickness on the island and a shortage of medicine, but with the medicine and supplies he took over all are expected to recover. Mr. Tawes called on Mrs. Eva McCreedy, at Ewell, who was badly burned on Sunday when her dress was ignited by a kitchen stove.

GRANTED LEAVE OF ABSENCE

WHEAT PAYMENTS ASSURED

The Congressional appropriation bill, which was passed this week and now awaits the President's signature included the payment of the wheat and corn-hog contracts made by farmers with the former A. A. A.

These payments mean \$125,000 to Kent County farmers, although some of the payments are not due until next year.

The new agricultural act which will be based on soil conservation is expected to be passed by Congress shortly.

It will act similar to the former contracts.

M. P. CHURCH TO BUILD SOCIAL HALL

The price paid for the property was \$10,000. Mr. Henry Hopkins, architect, will meet with the Trustees today in reference to plans for the building.
