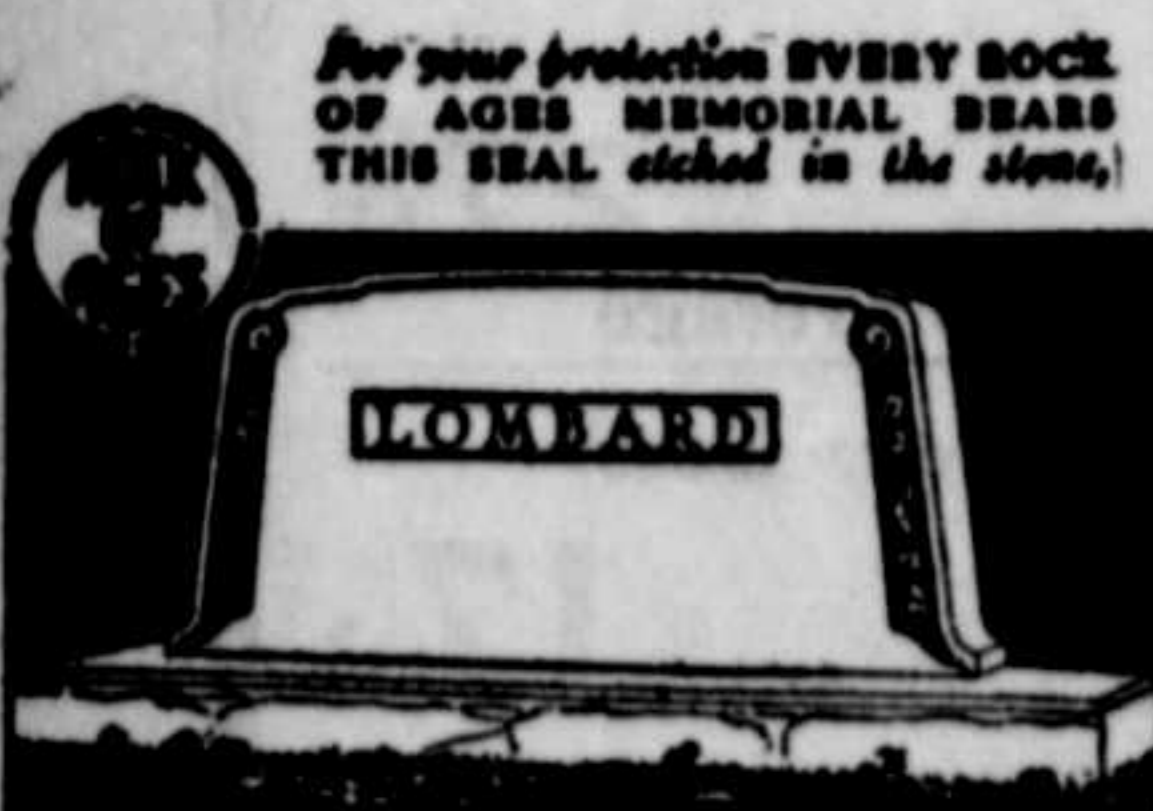

Telephone service between the United States and Puerto Rico was inaugurated recently by Secretary of the Interior Harold L. Ickes, Paul A. Walker, chairman of the telephone division of the Federal Communications Commission, Resident Commissioner of Puerto Rico Santiago Iglesias and Ernest Gruening, United States director of the division of territories and island possessions of the Department of the Interior, and K. S. McHugh, assistant vice-president of the American Telephone and Telegraph Company, who was master of ceremonies. Secretary Ickes talked from Washington to General Blanton Winship,

governor of the island at San Juan. With this extension of telephone service in operation more than sixty-five countries and geographical locations may now be connected with any Bell or Bell-connecting telephone in the United States. The telephone link between the two countries is operated over a short-wave channel between the radio telephone stations of the Bell System at Miami, Florida, now handling service to South and Central America and other West Indian islands, and the radio telephone stations of the Puerto Rico Telephone Company near San Juan.

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# AT THE MOVIES NEXT WEEK

"The Story of Louis Pasteur," Paul Men's new starring vehicle for Cosmopolitan Productions has been booked as the feature attraction at the New Lyceum on Monday and Tuesday, May 18 and 19.

Muni, who had won fame by his stage characterizations, has made one smashing, artistic success after another since he began motion picture work, including such outstanding attractions as "Scarface," "I Am a Fugitive from a Chain Gang," "Black Fury," "Border-Town" and "Dr. Socrates."

Now, in a sensational screen drama, he is a role that is heralded as the greatest work of his career.
