ASSOC. SETS DATE FOR ANNUAL KENT CO. HORSE SHOW

Location Not Yet Determined

Officials of the Kent County Horse Show Association have set the date of September 12 for the fourteenth annual Kent County Horse Show.

One of the outstanding accomplishments of the association has been to create interest among the young boys and girls of the county in horsemanship. For years they have been the principal riders in the various events and a number of them have been outstanding in horse shows in this section of the county.

Another accomplishment of the association has been to create interest in the breeding of fine horses which at one time was threatened with extinction among the agricultural interests in the county. Kent county horses have been in demand for show purposes, hunters and police duty.

ASKS FOR TWO NEW HIGH SCHOOLS FOR CHESTERTOWN

School Board Asks County Commissioners To Apply For Loan

The Kent County Board of Education presented a petition to the County Commissioners on Tuesday requesting that they make an application to the Federal Public Works Administration for a loan of \$250,000 for two new high schools in Chestertown. The petition requested that a loan of \$200,000 be requested for a new white high school and \$50,000 for a new colored school.

The Commissioners took no action on the matter at Tuesday's meeting.

TWO ARRESTS MADE FOR ROBBERY OF BORDLEY'S STORE

Pair Held In Cecil County For Possessing Stolen Goods

Mrs. Carl N. Bordley on Sunday identified James Bruscoe, of Philadelphia and Cecil County as the man who went into Bordley's store on a pretense of buying a suit of clothes shortly before that store was robbed of 300 suits of clothing, some overcoats and shoes.

Bruscoe and his wife were arrested at Town Point on the Elk River following a chain of events that led officers to the cottage where Bruscoe and his wife lived.

A tip from a man who had been held as a vagrant at the Bel Air jail, involved Carl Nagle, now held at that jail as a suspicious character following a hardware store robbery, Lain Kuhn, arrested at Williamsport when caught prying open a window, and Warren Cohen who is still at large.

Close questioning of the men by police officers led to the Cecil County hideout. At the cottage was found some of the merchandise taken from the hardware store, and three overcoats, one suit and a pair of shoes taken from Bordley's Store. In Bruscoe's pocket was found an unsigned receipt for a long list of clothing which he denied knowledge of where it came from. He claimed that he was merely employed as a caretaker, and his family have been on relief in Philadelphia for the past six years and the other men involved in the robbery are paroled ex-convicts.

The result of the arrests are that this gang will not commit any robberies in the near future although little of the stolen goods were recovered.

Bruscoe was brought to the Kent County jail for identification by Mrs. Bordley and then taken back to the Cecil County jail.

MACHINERY BEING INSTALLED IN NEW HOSIERY FACTORY

Applicants For Jobs Urged To File With Re-employment Service

Work started Tuesday installing machinery in the new silk hosiery factory in Chestertown and present indications are that one machine will be in operation next week.

A force of eight men are working on the installation and as a machine is completed it will be put in operation to fill a large order which the hosiery company already has on its books.

Employment of help by the hosiery company will be through the office of the National Re-employment Service located in the Voshel Hotel. This office is open each week-day except Tuesday when the staff goes to Elkton. This method was adopted so as to simplify the work of company officials.

A number of the families of the men who are to be the skilled machine operators have rented homes here and employment will be given to approximately twenty young men and women.

The factory building was constructed by Chestertown business men who saw the need of a small industry here.

ELECTRIC RATES REDUCED HERE

New Schedule In Effect July 1st

The Chestertown Electric Light & Power Company has filed with the Public Service Commission of Maryland a new tariff, effective July 1st, 1938. In this tariff the Domestic One Meter Lighting rate has been reduced from 11 cents net for the first 25 Kilowatt Hours to 10 cents net for a similar consumption, with a resultant reduction in the remaining blocks.

This new schedule will apply to all of our service territory and will be applicable to all domestic lighting consumers using current through a single meter installation.

It is the sincere hope of the company that this reduction will result in a more general use of electricity in all homes.

The result of this application means that the new rate, which amount to approximately a ten per cent reduction, went into effect July 1st.

HEALTHMOBILE COMPLETES WORK IN KENT COUNTY

Over Three Hundred Children Examined By Health Officials

The Healthmobile of the Bureau of Child Hygiene of the State Department of Health had its most successful visit in Kent County for the past four years. Fourteen infant and child health conferences were held throughout the county. 149 white children and 160 colored children were given complete physical and dental examinations during the period from June 27 to July 6. All children were given toxoid for the prevention of diphtheria when the parents requested it. Vaccinations for smallpox were offered to all colored children who had not been previously vaccinated.

We were very happy over the fact that Dr. Sherman could be with us again this year. This was the seventh consecutive visit that she has made to Kent County in charge of the Healthmobile, which travels all over the State of Maryland.

Dr. Baker, our own school dentist is traveling with the Healthmobile this year and he has exceptional skill in handling children. Miss Gillespie, nurse is spending her first year on the Healthmobile and is very efficient in carrying out her part of the program.

This is the first year that the parent-teacher group in the various communities has taken a very active part in the summer round-up campaign. They visited the parents of each child that is to enter school this fall, and impressed them with the desirability of a complete physical and dental examination at this time of the year so that they can get all physical defects attended to before the beginning of the next school year. I have always believed the health department can render the community valuable service only when it has intelligent lay cooperation, as we have had in this campaign. This is demonstrated by the fact that over 44 children were examined every day that the Healthmobile was with us in this county.

Due to the fact that we had so much rainy weather we were unable to show all the health pictures. However, pictures were shown at Millington, Still Pond, Edesville, and Chestertown. These talks were well-attended, but we only wish that the weather had been better so that more people could have taken advantage of them. Since so many were unable to see the pictures, it may be possible for us to get the pictures again and show them in the schools next year. One elderly Gentleman remarked to me in the Chestertown park, "You know what, everybody in the whole county ought to see these pictures;" and I feel the same way about it.

Old Timer Comments On Politics

For the Orphans' Court they say that Dick Rasin from the Second and Harry Stavelly from the Sixth is going to be two candidates for the Orphans' Court and while I did hear some other names mentioned for the other Judge, and the other County Commissioner the boys still seem to be in the dark as to who has got the most strength to make the run. That about seems the ticket we ought to watch for.
