Tonight as we go out into the fields and look up into the sky we shall see another city, the "city of God"—God-made. This city also is all airt, with a flaming light in every window.

Does not the city of man look funny compared with the glorious city of God that fills the midnight heavens? Can you gaze thoughtfully at the stars without being impressed with the vastness of the universe and with the intelligence of the God that brought such a universe into existence? 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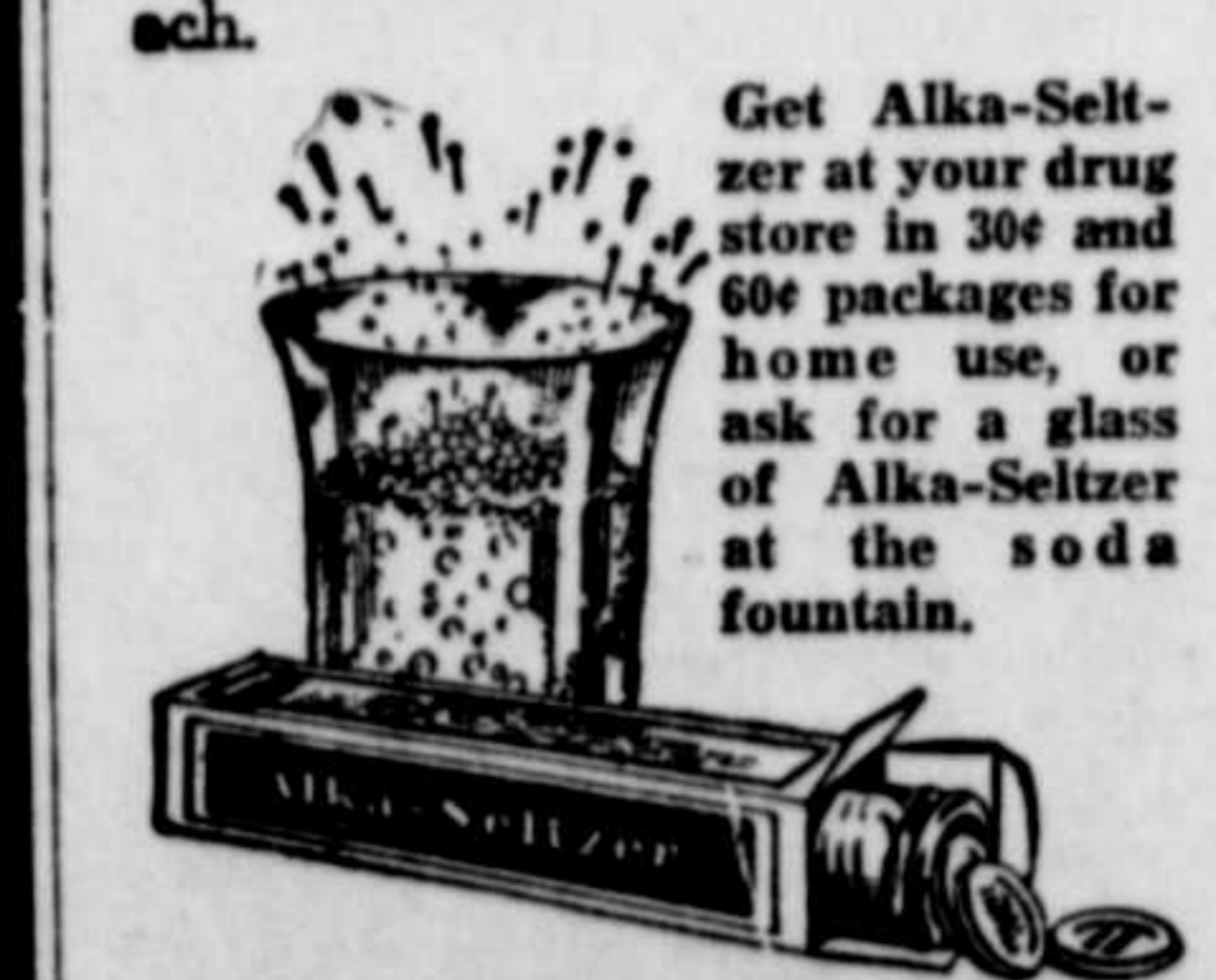
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THOSE WHO REMAIN
