## QUAKER NECK HORSE SHOW WILL BE HELD IN AUGUST

### Riding Association Sets Date Of August 21st

The Quaker Neck Riding Association has announced Sunday, August 21, as the date for the seventh annual Quaker Neck Horse Show, to be held at the Brick House farm of Mrs. Charles Hullett in Pomona, at one o'clock.

This year's program features several changes from the original plan of a Horsemanship show, originated by the Association seven years ago. The aim was to foster encouragement in riding and to improve the general riding skill of local equestrians; now the Association feels that this has been accomplished and the present goal is to breed and raise a better type of horse. For this reason, although several classes will still be judged solely on horsemanship, this year's show will tend towards the regular type of horse show. Classes will range from a colt class, to be judged on suitability to develop into hunters, to a special hunter class.

The classes, in order of presentation will be as follows:

1. Colt Class—two years old and under, suitable to become hunters.
2. Pony Saddle Class—To be judged on horsemanship.
3. Green Hunters—Jumps 3 1/2 feet horses in this class not eligible for class No. 6.
4. Pair Jump—3 1/2 feet, judged on performance.
5. Novice Saddle Class—Judged on horsemanship and good hands.
6. Hunter Class—Special jumps as found in the hunting field, judged on manners and performance.
7. Open Saddle Class—75% Manners and performance. 25% conformation.
8. Pair Jump—3 1/2 feet, judged on performance.
9. Novice Saddle Class—Judged on horsemanship and good hands.
10. Hunter Class—Special jumps as found in the hunting field, judged on manners and performance.
11. Open Saddle Class—75% Manners and performance. 25% conformation.
12. Knock-down and Out—Jumps to start at four feet.
13. Barback Jump—3 1/2 feet—50% horsemanship. 50% manners and performance.

## EMORY HOGANS TO REBUILD GARAGE AT ROCK HALL

### Saturday Morning Blaze Destroys Building And Contents

Mr. Emory Hogans, of Rock Hall, is making plans to rebuild the garage of Hogans Motor Company which was destroyed by fire early Saturday morning of last week. Temporary quarters were fixed up this week and the garage business is being carried on as usual.

The fire started with a terrific explosion at 5 a. m. and the entire structure burst into flames. The fire was so quick that the Rock Hall Fire Company, which responded immediately succeeded in saving nearby residences. The Chestertown Fire Company responded and assisted the home of the garage business when the fire control the fire although one of the main pumps, which is electric, was put out of commission when the fire parted the main electric line to the water works.

Mr. Lucine Thomas, who with his wife and four children occupy the apartment over the garage was blown out of bed by the explosion and was barely able to get out of the building. The kitchen of the apartment was wrecked by the explosion. Fortunately Mrs. Thomas and her children were away on a visit at the time of the fire which averted what might have been a loss of life.

Included in the loss due to the fire was the garage building, four new automobiles, eighteen used cars, gas and oil, and other equipment. The loss is estimated at approximately \$35,000 part of which was covered by insurance.

## WHEAT LOANS NOW AVAILABLE TO KENT COUNTY FARMERS

### Money May Be Borrowed On Wheat In Storage

Loans on wheat in storage will be made available to Maryland wheat growers who are cooperating in the 1938 agricultural conservation program, according to information received from Secretary of Agriculture, H. A. Wallace by Dr. T. B. Symons, director of the University of Maryland extension service.

The rate of 70 cents per bushel will be loaned on wheat grading No. 2 Red Winter. The rate for No. 3 wheat is 67 cents per bushel. Discounts for garlic and smut will be made at the prevailing commercial rates of discount. Wheat to be eligible for a loan must not contain more than 14 or 14 1/2 percent of moisture.

The loans will be made for a period of seven months and will bear a percent interest. They will be made only on wheat stored in approved elevators and repaid by negotiable warehouse receipts.

To obtain a loan, a farmer, after delivering his wheat to an approved elevator, must first apply for a loan to the county A.A. committee located at the county agent's office. If he can qualify, the committee will certify him as eligible for a loan.

Kent County is included among the counties in the State in which loans are available.

### Regatta Information

Race Headquarters—The race committee headquarters and registration booth will be located on the club house pier during the regatta. Address correspondence to Commodore Philip G. Wilmer, Chestertown, Md.

Inspection—Boat and motor inspections must be made prior to the start of the race. The pits, in accordance with A. P. B. A. rules. Boats and motors winning prizes will be inspected after the final race.

Racing Instructions—Available at time of registration.

Pits—The outboard racing pits are located in front of the club house, opposite the course and dock of boats. The course and dock of boats will be provided by the club. The crane is located at the foot of Cannon Street in Chestertown. Owners or operators of racing boats are required to supervise and assume responsibility for loading and unloading their boats.

Fuel and Oil—Fuel and oil are available at the pits and also at the club house pier.

Numbers—Numbers must be either painted on each side and deck of boat or obtained from the race committee at the time of registration. Be sure to show your boat number on entry blank.

Entrance Fee—No entrance fee.

Broadcast Service—Amplifying broadcast system will announce each race, results and supply other information. Races will be broadcast on W F B R Baltimore.

## COMMISSIONERS TO REFER SCHOOL PROPOSAL TO REFERENDUM IN NOV.

### School Board Resolution Turned Down Following Public Meeting Held Tuesday Night

### 1st DISTRICT SHOWS STRONG OPPOSITION

The Commissioners of Kent County in special session on Wednesday of this week turned down the resolution of the School Board which requested the Commissioners to make application to the W. P. A. for a \$230,000 school building project for Chestertown. The application would have included \$200,000 for a new white high school and \$30,000 for a new colored school.

A public meeting was called by the Commissioners for last Tuesday evening for the purpose of giving the public an opportunity to express sentiment for or against the projects. Of the 150 people in attendance all but approximately fifteen were from the area served by the present Chestertown School.

After much discussion of the project including both the construction of a new school and the remodeling of the present building, a vote favoring a correction of the present conditions was taken showing a large majority in favor, there being only eight opposed.

The motion, made by Mr. John Jones and amended by Mr. Clinton Jones, that the group favor a new or remodeled building at the discretion of the Commissioners and School Board.

The opposition to the construction project was led by representatives of the First District who objected to any raise in taxes at this time. They stated that those in attendance were not representative of the whole county. A statement relative to letters being sent out calling attention to the meeting brought forth the response from the First District Delegation that no letters had been received in that District. It seems that 1000 letters were sent out, not by the County Commissioners but by interested parties, to people living in the area served by the Chestertown School. Included in the assembly at the meeting was a group from the Fifth District, who took no part in the discussion. The meeting was presided over by Mr. Simon W. Westcott and Dr. Frederick G. Livingood was named secretary of the meeting.

## P. W. A. DEADLINE IS OCTOBER FIRST

### Is Not August 2nd As Previously Stated

Mr. Henry S. Shryock, Project Engineer of the Public Works Administration was in the Transcript office on Thursday afternoon to correct an impression that the deadline for filing applications for P. W. A. grants was August 2nd. Mr. Shryock stated that the deadline for filing applications for P. W. A. grants was September 30th. His visit followed a report of the meeting held at the High School this week with reference to a project for a new or enlarged Chestertown High School.

Mr. Shryock, who is from the Baltimore office, further stated that it is still possible to have a referendum of the voters of the county and profit by the W. P. A. grant. He stated that the application could be made at any time before September 30th, the sooner the better, subject to the result of a referendum to be held in November. Such an application is frequently made and is not binding in any way on the part of those making the application.

In order to avoid any confusion that might be in the minds of the public as to the P. W. A. Grant, Mr. Shryock stated that there is no connection between that branch and relief labor. An application approved by the P. W. A. means that that branch of the Federal Government pays 45 percent of all costs. Contractors are let for the project and the government pays 45 percent of all pocket costs such as architect fees, building material, labor and land if lands not owned by the applicant. The contractor makes his own labor arrangements subject to certain minimum requirements.

In other words the High School Project is not paid and can be made to rest with the wishes of the voters.

### Commissioners Divide In Opinion

At the special meeting of the County Commissioners on Wednesday, at which Mr. L. Bates Russell, President of the School Board, was present, it is understood that Mr. G. E. Leary favored an application for \$75,000 for enlarging the Chestertown High School building and that Mr. Andrew Wilson and Mr. George Williams opposed any application without a referendum to the voters of the county. Mr. Wilson before coming to the meeting was presented with a petition from residents from the First District requesting that no action be taken without a referendum to the people. This petition was signed by 234 people of the First District.

## DUCKING SEASON EXTENDED TO DECEMBER - NINTH

### Permits Taking Red Heads And Canvasback

Maryland wildfowl shooters may enjoy a 45-day open season this year and will be permitted to kill a limited number of canvasbacks, redheads and other formerly "banned" ducks, according to Federal wildfowl shooting regulations which were announced yesterday by the United States Biological Survey.

After three years of stringent regulations and a season that was curtailed to 30 days, the longer season and more liberal laws, which State Game Warden E. Lee LeCompte has long contended, will be welcomed by wildfowl hunters.

Maryland's open season, along with that of other Southern States, opens on November 15 and closes on December 29.

The daily bag limit of ducks remains at ten, under the new regulations, but duckers will be allowed to have two days' bag limits, or twenty ducks, instead of one as allowed last year. This means that duckers this year can take a two-day trip and bring back twenty ducks instead of ten.

Included in the daily bag limit may be three canvasbacks, redheads, buff-breasted, or ruddy ducks or a total of 20 ducks, of which the maximum of the three species in aggregate, must be made up of mallards, blackheads, widgones and other species. Over a two-day trip ducks would be permitted to the numbers of six of any one of the formerly banned species or six in the aggregate.

The bag limit on geese has been increased from three to five per day, and the number of geese being allowed in possession.

Restrictions in this year's regulations which have been continued from last year are summarized as follows:

Baiting of waterfowl and doves and the use of live duck and goose decoys are not authorized, regardless of the distance between the bait or decoys and the shooter.

The three-shell limit on repeating shotguns, either hand-operated or automatic, in effect the last three seasons is continued. Hunters may not use shotguns larger than No. 10 gauge.

## KENT FARMERS NOW ELIGIBLE FOR CROP INSURANCE

### Premium May Be Paid With Crops

For example, if the normal yield of wheat on a farm is 20 bushels per acre, the farmer would be insured for three-fourths of that amount, or 15 bushels per acre. If he seeds 40 acres of wheat, the total amount of insurance would be 600 bushels. If his yield in 1939, because of one of the unavoidable causes listed above falls to 10 bushels per acre, or a total of 400 bushels, he would receive 200 bushels, or the equivalent amount in cash. Thus, for a small insurance cost, the farmer is assured of at least three-fourths of his normal crop. In the above case, he will have at least 600 bushels to sell.

The crop insurance program will be limited to the following counties of Maryland, where wheat growing is of major importance: Baltimore, Carroll, Cecil, Dorchester, Frederick, Harford, Howard, Kent, Montgomery, Queen Anne's, Talbot and Wicomico.

Wheat Crop Insurance

Insurance on the wheat crop to be seeded this fall will be offered Maryland growers, according to J. D. McVein, County Agent.

For a small cost, amounting to one-half to one bushel per acre, or its equivalent in cash, wheat growers will be insured up to three-fourths of their normal yield. The hazards of drought, flood, hail, winter-kill, pests, diseases, fire, etc. that occur prior to threshing wheat in 1939.

## COMMISSIONERS LET CONTRACT FOR BASIN BULK HEAD

### Work To Start At Rock Hall Next Month

The Commissioners of Kent County, at their regular meeting on Tuesday of this week, let the contract for the bulkhead at Rock Hall to Brundage & Crandall Co., of Sudley, Md., at a bid of \$7,770.00. Other bidders were John H. Bailey, of Easton, whose bid was \$9,300 and Andrew J. Stevens, of Rock Hall whose bid was \$8,978.20.

This bulkhead, which is to be 500 feet long will form the shore end of the new yacht basin which will be dredged by the army engineering department. In addition to the yacht basin, the project includes dredging a channel into the harbor and the construction of breakwaters at the harbor entrance.

The work on the bulkhead is expected to start next month and the Federal project will follow its completion. The project at Rock Hall harbor was approved by Federal authorities last year but due to a change in the P. W. A. allotments the appropriation was not made available until shortly before Congress adjourned in June.
