



Cairo... Automatic telephone exchanges were first introduced in Cairo, Egypt, in 1932 and in subsequent years at Alexandria, Port Said, Tanta and a few other important provincial cities, including Guizhe, near Cairo. The policy is to extend gradually this system over the entire country, according to the American Commercial Attache at Cairo.

Hollywood... When Hollywood wants extras, it gets them by telephone. The switchboard of a central casting bureau handles as many as 30,000 calls a day, bringing actors and producers together.

Buenos Aires... Argentina's principal telephone company, the United River Telephone Company, in Buenos Aires, has just recently completed 51 years of existence. Starting in 1887 with a handful of employees, 11 years after Bell's invention, the company has grown as rapidly as the country until it now has 302,000 subscribers. Argentina has 48 per cent of all the telephones in South America. In the international field the company has made it possible for Argentine subscribers to be connected with 32,000-000 telephones in 45 countries.

Philadelphia... Telephone operators are less susceptible to throat ailments than are stenographers or almost any other type of woman employee, according to a noted Philadelphia surgeon. "I've never treated the throat of a telephone operator," he says, "because there is no need to shout into the telephone." Records of the telephone companies reveal that cases where it is necessary to relieve an operator from duty because of voice or throat ailments are extremely rare. This is attributed to the fact that each operator is given a course of training in the proper use of the voice and how to speak clearly and without strain.

Jerusalem... A dial telephone exchange with approximately 3,500 lines was recently inaugurated at Tel Aviv, Palestine, and it is reported that a similar type of exchange to serve the same number of subscribers and capable of ultimate extension to 8,000 lines has been ordered for Haifa. It is expected that the Jerusalem automatic exchange will also soon be ready for service, according to the American Consulate General there.

New York... Although the telephone is now sixty-two years old, more than two-thirds of the telephone plant in service in this country has been built since the Great War.

Delhi... That Delhi, India, is rapidly becoming more telephone-minded is borne out by reports that over 400 new subscriber lines were added during 1937, which necessitated the transfer of some lines to the Connaught Place system. The two existing Delhi exchanges, Lothian Road and New Delhi, are already overloaded due to the ever-increasing demand for service, and the third exchange at Connaught Circus, which is designed to care for 5,000 lines, will accordingly be increased to facilitate an additional 5,000, according to the American Trade Commissioner at Calcutta.

Queen Annes Bull Sells For \$9,000

Broadland Border King, 6-year-old sire of a herd of Guerneys at Thomas Marsalis' My Lord's Gift farm, was sold for \$9,000, it was reported this week, to the Thirstane ranch, Bar Harbor, Maine, a locality which the bulls and bears of Wall Street have made popular as a summer resort. He won the calf championship of Maryland in 1932, the yearling championship in 1933, the 2-year-old championship in 1934, and in the same year won the grand championship in Bryn Mawr, Pa., over aged bulls. In 1938 he took the grand championship at Pioneer Point.

Annual Pony Penning at Chincoteague

Chincoteague, picturesque island city of 5,000 inhabitants is putting final touches to plans for entertaining 10,000 visitors July 28. Its annual "Pony Penning Day," a colorful celebration which it has held for nearly a century on the last Friday in July. Former residents observe this as "Home-coming Day" and visitors flock from afar to what is probably the only observance of its kind in the world.

Caroline Farmers ask Power Extension

Maps of Caroline and Queen Anne's counties showing the proposed extension of electric lines and the location of homes of 270 farmers who have applied for current are in Washington today being checked by the Rural Electrification Administration engineers.

Woman Seeks Senatorship in Cecil

Mrs. Katherine Coburn, widow of State Senator Harold E. Coburn, of Cecil County, plans to run for State Senator in her husband's place. Mrs. Coburn will officially file for the office one day next week.

Race Tracks Get Increase On Take

Requests of four major tracks of Maryland for an increase of one per cent of the take from bets were granted Tuesday by the racing commission, which action increased the proportion of income to the tracks to seven and one-half per cent, plus breakage. The State continues to receive one per cent.

Have de Grace Opposes Bridge

A petition signed by Mayor George L. Pennington and about 200 of the leading residents and business men of Have de Grace has been sent to the War Department, protesting against permission being granted the State Roads Commission to erect another bridge across the Susquehanna river.

Found Guilty Of Murder

With a first degree murder verdict carrying no recommendation for mercy from the jury in hand, the Circuit Court of Dorchester county sentenced Fred L. Brown, 48-year-old farmer convicted in the brutal slaying of his 18-year-old wife, an expectant mother to be hanged. The jury held Brown was sane now and was sane when he strangled his wife and dumped her weighted body in the Nanticoke River on June 14th.

Alan Goldsborough.

Labor Board Stops Boys From Working

Sixteen boys, ranging in age from 10 to 15 years, lost their summer jobs in six boardwalk establishments at Ocean City last Saturday evening, following an investigation into child labor conditions at the Maryland seaport by Lewis B. Francis, investigator of the State Labor Department.

Cost Of Administering A. A. A.

The sum of \$21,103.98 was spent by the Agricultural Adjustment Administration to execute its program in the Eastern Shore of Maryland counties between July 1, 1936, and February 23, 1937, it was reported today.

At a meeting of the Princess Anne Business Men's Association, held a week ago, the organization took out papers of incorporation to make possible the financing of the construction of the new garment factory here.

The next step that confronted the Business Men was the task of borrowing \$8,500 for the actual construction of the building; \$6,500 of the amount to be used for the building alone and \$2,000 for the purchase of the land, installation of heating equipment and wiring.

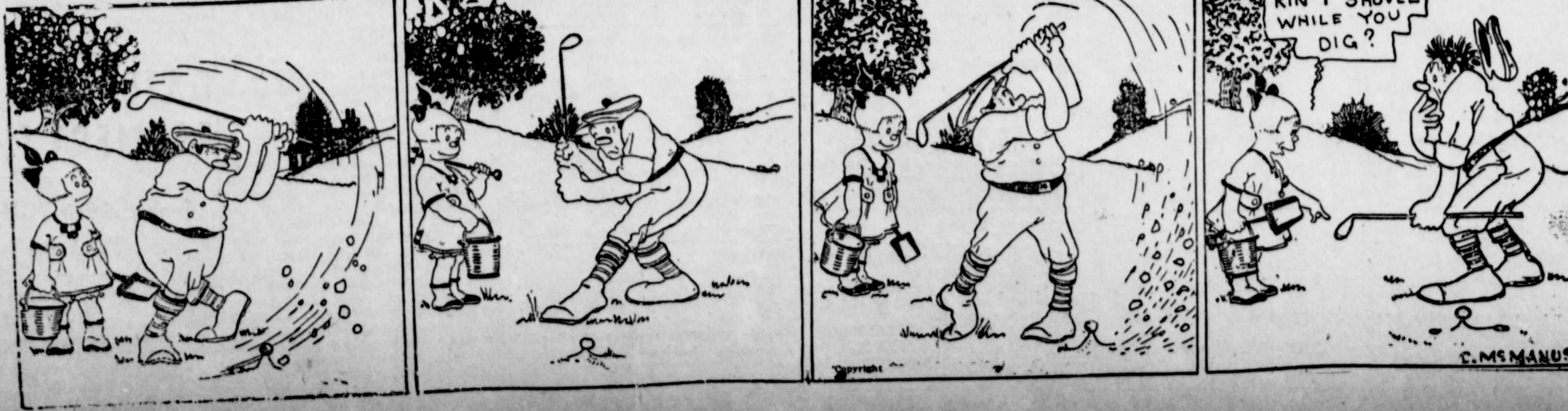
