POULTRY SCHOOL TO BE HELD HERE

To Be Scene Of Upper Shore Gathering

To meet the demand in various parts of the state, seven Poultry Improvement Schools have been scheduled by the Poultry Department of the University of Maryland, it is announced by Wade H. Rice, extension poultry specialist.

Official poultry improvement work in Maryland increased substantially last year, as compared with the preceding year, he states. Last fall, more than 1,000 poultry raisers attended a series of meetings held in all counties and two judging and selection schools were held. Farmers and poultry raisers have asked that more of these schools be held this summer and fall.

The object of these schools, Mr. Rice states, is to provide an opportunity for greater participation in official breed improvement and pulorum disease control, through the qualification of hatcherymen and breeders as Flock-Selecting Agents under supervision of the Maryland Poultry Improvement Board.

The evening sessions will be devoted to various breeding and pulorum control subjects, with emphasis on systematic breeding. Poultry and egg marketing problems will also be considered. Demonstrations in culling and selection of the popular breeds of chickens will be the feature of the day sessions.

Shot Gun Discharge Fatal To 5 Year Old Colored Girl

Little three and a half year old Catherine Jones, colored, was killed Wednesday by a wound from a shot gun in the hands of her five year old brother at their home near Fairlee.

According to a statement from the children the boy had the empty gun and his older brother loaded it for him. He then started to chase the children out of the house and the gun hit a piece of furniture and discharged. The little girl ran into the yard and fell dead.

Dr. Frank Smith, Corcor, stated that he did not believe the child could have been killed instantly by the shot which grazed her body but that apparently the little girl was in poor health and the shock attributed to her death.

For Vegetable Plate Center Here Is A Four Decked Egg Plant

With nothing special in the house with which to prepare a hurried meal against unexpected company, necessity turned out once more to be able to produce inventiveness.

An egg plant was hanging plump and ripe within its little bush, (yours might be in the vegetable basket). A big fat onion rested cozily in a bag with his brothers. A huge tomato lay on the windowsill where it had ripened at leisure.

Each of the three was sliced into a convenient cart wheel collection, running about a quarter of an inch thick. The egg plant is soaked in salted water for 10 minutes. Then on top of a slice of egg plant went the slice of onion and on top of that the slice of tomato, then another slice of tomato, then another slice of egg plant. Salt and pepper were sprinkled on. A few slices of bacon were laid over the top. The whole thing, fastened together with tooth picks was set into a bak-

ing dish. And figuring one of these four deckers for each person to be served, into the oven they went, coming out in due time tender and delicious. A cream sauce and grated cheese were added. A can of baked beans was heated and opened and a spoonful added to each service plate. A can of asparagus tips lent a touch of cold vegetable. Luncheon was ready. Try it!

Anstole France had selected the best dishes for the luncheon in honor of Rodin. Previous to this luncheon they had not met for thirty years. It was not an easy matter to bring about this meeting.

"Rodin likes simplicity," I interposed. "Why this luxurious repast?"

"Who knows how often we can eat together? I'd like to give him the best as a compensation for not having offered him anything for so long."

"The air is as invigorating here as if you were living in a forest," said Rodin gaily, coming upstairs. We went toward the salon. While ascending the stairs I sized up the men, one of whom was acclaimed as the greatest writer and the other as the greatest sculptor or of contemporary France.

France was tall, broad-shouldered and slooped. He was so slender that one who did not see his white head would have taken him for a young man. He saw everything without looking at it and his glance, I could not help thinking, pierced the mystery of things others could not see. Rodin, on the other hand, was small, strong, and as solid as his marble statues. His chest, his back, his shoulders and hands were powerful and muscular. His Michel Angelo head sat erect on his strong neck.
