Describes Trip To Mexico The following letter was received by Miss Phoebe Robinson who has been spending some time with her grandparents, Mr. and Mrs. William Medders at Still Pond. The letter was written by Mrs. O. Robinson, who was formerly Miss Dorothy Medders.

Being in Mexico is far more of an education than we ever dreamed it would be. As you know, I had read very little and what I had read had to do a great deal more with the current political and social conditions than with the history of the cultures which make up the traditions of these people.

Buying gas was interesting in Mexico, you do not buy the gallon but by the liter. It is much thicker than our gas and you are advised to buy something called Koto to put in the gas tank.

Monterey is surrounded by mountains, rather half of it is built on the mountain sides. At this time of year it is misty every morning until 9:30 or 10 o'clock consequently, we decided to wait until we came back to see it since we wanted to leave long before that.

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at the border, we went to the A. A. A. office at Laredo and Bob got preliminary cards containing our names and addresses which we were to exchange for passports on the other side of the Rio Grande. When we got there every thing was as much a confusion of tongues as you would have expected and the officer who took the cards from Bob got away from him.

The mountain shapes were fantastic, but far away, and the only growth was cactus, mesquite and a tree whose name I shall have to look up. The tree however gave no shade as the leaves were on the order of a willow.
