Records show marked decrease in auto deaths

114 Fewer Than Last Year's Report

The monthly report of the Safety Department of the Commissioner of Motor Vehicles discloses that the first nine (9) months of this year show (124) less deaths than the corresponding period of 1937, as the tabulation below will indicate, a decrease of 30 percent. The month of September had the highest number of deaths for any month so far this year. There was also so six (6) less deaths for the month of September, as compared with the same month of 1937:

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Total 413 289

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According to our summary (24) or 49% were pedestrians, (17) or 35% were passengers, and (2) or 16% were the operators themselves. Nearly all of the accidents occurred on clear days, straight, dry roads. No day of the week was free from fatal accidents with Sunday in lead. Passenger cars with apparently no defects head the list, with operating too fast for conditions by the operators, who in a majority were White, normal condition, between the ages of (20) to (29), with five years or more experience, and a resident of the Counties of this State. There were (3) Hit and Run cases during the month of September. Chestertown City is charged with (11) deaths, with (38) deaths in the Counties.
