THE VOTERS of the State of Maryland will be faced with the problem of voting for or against four amendments to the Constitution of Maryland. These amendments would: Repeal the present law and authorize the Maryland Legislature to permit lotteries in this State. We oppose the appeal of this law and suggest voting against this amendment.

Authorize the establishing of a Judgeship in Cecil County for the Second Judicial Circuit. This amendment would create another Judge in this Circuit who would necessarily be from Cecil County. We favor the passage of this amendment as an advantageous move. Although it would increase the cost of the Bench in this circuit the present condition renders a severe hardship to the administration of Justice in Cecil County due to the tremendous increase in legal work in that county and its remoteness from Centreville and Denton, the

homes of the present two Judges. Change the present marriage laws whereby application for marriage licenses would have to be made forty-eight hours before the license is issued. We favor the passage of this amendment due to the present condition which it creates in Cecil County. It would break up the present racket at Elkton whereby the religious part of the ceremony is made a joke of and would also prevent too hasty marriages which often prove unhappy ones.

THE NAMES at the top of this column represent the Democratic nominees for the various State and County offices. They have pledged themselves to an economical and just administration; they have voiced the fact that they will cooperate and work together in order to cure many of the ills that now exist in the State Government. A study of their records gives the Democrats, who are largely in the majority in the State, an opportunity to vote the Democratic ticket without any feeling of doubt.

ELABORATE PREPARATIONS are being made for the annual Country Fair which will be held in the armory, Chestertown November 17th, 18th, and 19th. The proceeds will be for the benefit of the hospital. In view of the fact that the stagnation of the fair requires a tremendous amount of work on the part of the group of ladies who are making arrangements and also that it promises a lot of entertainment, the public should give it every support possible. This effort by the committees is not for personal gain but for a worthy community project that benefits everyone living in it. A large attendance at the fair is all the reward that the workers ask.

A PUBLIC MEETING has been called for Tuesday evening for the purpose of discussing the proposed sewerage disposal plant for Chestertown. The meeting is called by the Mayor and Council who will lay before the taxpayers all the facts that have been gathered pertaining to the construction of the plant. Dr. Riley, of the State Board of Health, will explain the condition caused by the present system of disposal. By attending this meeting the tax-payers of Chestertown will be able to get an intelligent summary of the facts pertaining to the plant which at the present time are based mostly on opinions. The meeting will be held Tuesday evening in the new fire house.

Also at the said Election and on the same ballot with the names of the candidates for offices aforesaid there will be submitted for adoption or rejection certain proposed amendments to the Constitution of Maryland as authorized by Chapter 463 of the Acts of the General Assembly of Maryland of 1935, and Chapter 494 and 525 of the Acts of the General Assembly of Maryland of 1937, and also a Referendum against Chapter 91 of the Acts of that General Assembly of 1937.

CHAPTER 463 - 1935

Amendment to repeal Section 36 of Article III of the State Constitution, prohibiting the General Assembly from authorizing a lottery, the purpose of this amendment being to permit the General Assembly to authorize lotteries in the State.

CHAPTER 494 - 1937

Amendment to Section 21 of Article IV of the Constitution of the State of Maryland title "Judiciary Department," sub title "Part III Circuit Courts," providing for an additional Judge for the Second Judicial Circuit of Maryland, comprising Caroline, Cecil, Kent, Queen Anne's and Talbot Counties.

CHAPTER 525 - 1937

Amendment to Article XV of the Declaration of Rights of the State Constitution authorizing the General Assembly to enact a State income tax, which may be classified, graduated and progressive and which may provide exemption of a reasonable amount of income from taxation.

CHAPTER 91 - 1937

An Act to repeal and reenact with Amendments Section 5 of Article 62 of the Annotated Code of Maryland (1924 Edition), title "Marriages" to fix the time within which marriage licenses may be issued, the purpose being to require a forty-eight hour waiting period between the application for a marriage license and the performance of the ceremony.

The return judges shall make their return before twelve (12) o'clock noon the second day after the election, that is to say, before noon Thursday following the Tuesday of the election in the manner prescribed by law, to the Clerk of the Circuit Court to the County Commissioners, to the Board of Supervisors of Election and to the Register of Wills of the county aforesaid.
