A AND P ORANIZES TWO NEW DIVISIONS

Maryland Territory Included In New Organization

Oliver C. Adams, Chairman of the Board, announced today that due to the wide territorial expansion of the original Southern Division of the Great Atlantic & Pacific Tea Company, and to permit of closer contact between its member Units and organization personnel, he had decided to create two new and separate Divisions to be known as the Atlantic and Southern districts.

The new Atlantic Division which will comprise parts of the States of New York, New Jersey, Pennsylvania, all of Delaware, Maryland, the District of Columbia, Virginia, and portions of West Virginia and Tennessee will have as its President W. F. Leach, formerly Purchasing Director of the original Southern Division, whereas the new Southern Division which will have jurisdiction over the States of North and South Carolina, Georgia, Louisiana, Mississippi, Alabama, parts of Oklahoma and Arkansas, and all of Florida and Texas will be headed by R. M. Smith, formerly Vice President in charge of Company operations in the State of Florida.

In his announcement Chairman Adams stated that the formation of the new Division had been actuated by the principal view of effecting closer relations with the principal view of effecting closer relations with the personnel.

Headquarters of the newly formed Atlantic and Southern Divisions will be in Philadelphia, Pa., and Jacksonville, Fla., respectively.

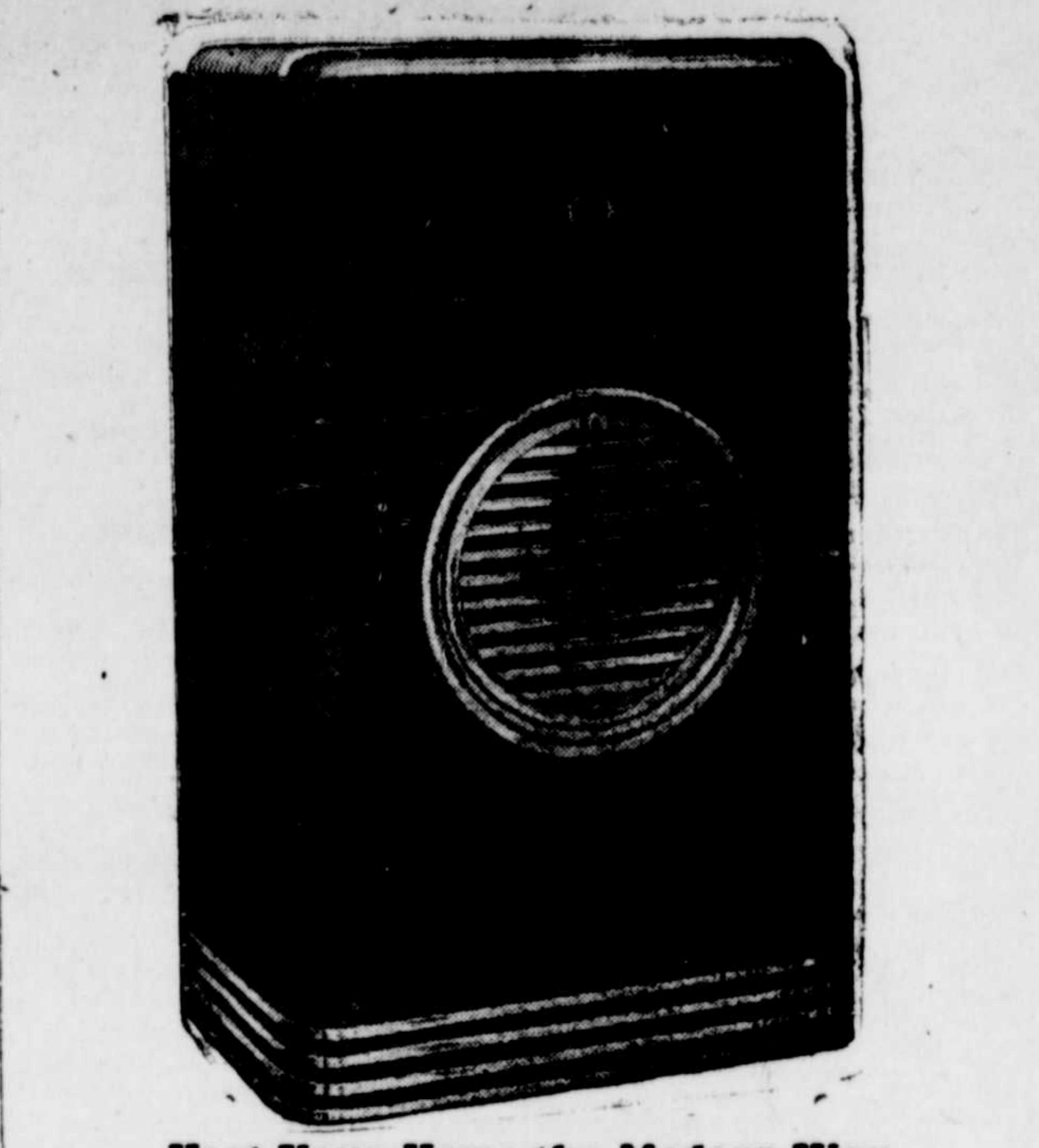

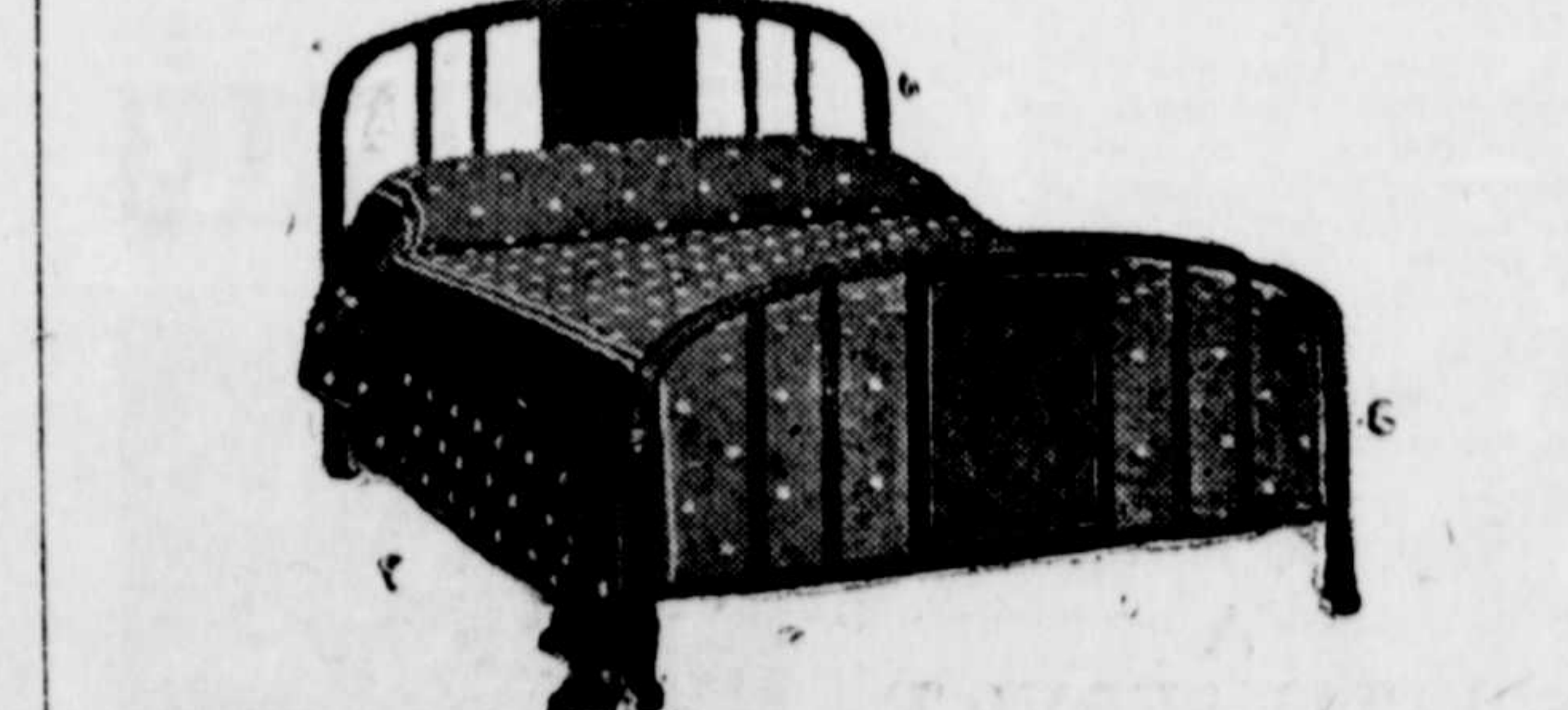
