**DEATHS FROM AUTO ACCIDENTS LOW**

Marked Decrease Over Last Year

The monthly report of the Safety Department of the Commissioner of Motor Vehicles discloses that the first ten (10) months of this year show (135) less deaths than the corresponding period of 1937, as the tabulation below will indicate, a decrease of 29 percent. There was also eleven (11) less deaths for the month of October, as compared with the same month of 1937:

There were 21 pedestrians killed during the month, three of which were children. Of this number (1) was playing in the road, and (2) stepped in front of a vehicle. (3) Adult pedestrians were walking in road left side, (8) walking in road right side, (1) stepped from behind a vehicle, (2) crossing at intersection no signal, (3) crossing not at intersection, and (1) person killed, when he was thrown from a scaffold, after a rope became entangled with the tailgate of a truck when in motion.  
According to our summary (21) or 49% pedestrians, (14) or 33% were passengers, (1) or 2% were riding a bicycle, and (7) or 16% were the operators themselves. A majority of accidents occurred on clear days, straight-dry roads. No day of the week was free from fatal accidents, with Saturday in the lead. Passengers with no defects, with operating too fast for conditions by the operators who in a large number were White, normal condition, between the ages of (30) to (45) with five years or more experience, and a resident of the counties of this State. There were (3) Hit and Run cases during the month of October.  
Baltimore City is charged with (8) deaths, with (35) deaths in the counties. Kent County experienced its first fatal accident since the first of this year, breaking an otherwise non-fatal record.

**SOIL EROSION MEETING TO BE HELD AT WORTON MON.**

Will Explain Kent's Program

According to an announcement made this week by J. D. McVean, County Agent, a meeting will be held in Worton Church Hall next Monday, November 14th at 7.40 p. m. The Chestertown Rotary Club will occupy the hall until 7.30 at a special rural meeting of that club.  
In a letter about the meeting sent out by Mr. McVean he calls attention to the following:
