STATE CARING FOR 1637 COUNTY CRIPPLE CHILDREN

Number Of Clinics Being Increased

A report recently issued by the State Department of Health, on the Services for Crippled Children in the Counties of Maryland shows that 1,637 children and young people living in the counties, all of whom suffering from some crippling disability, are under supervision at present. Children in Baltimore City, who are similarly handicapped, are under the supervision of the Maryland League for Crippled Children, the pioneer organization by which State-wide clinics and follow-up care were started over ten years ago, which continues its cooperative connection with the Services for Crippled Children.

The expansion of the services for crippled children in the counties of Maryland was made possible by State appropriations matched by funds from the Social Security Act under the Children's Bureau, U. S. Department of Labor. The services were administered at first by the Board of State Aid and Charities and were transferred to the State Department of Health by an Act of Legislature in 1937. Under the terms of the law, the activities are limited to those under twenty-one years of age and do not include services to the deaf and the blind. The present program is a continuation and extension of the plans originally developed by the League for Crippled Children. A special effort is made to locate children suffering from any crippling disability in need of surgical, hospital, or follow-up care, clinics at which the children are examined by physicians with special training in this particular field, are arranged through the County Health Departments. Provision is made for hospital care, if necessary, or for other care or treatment. Braces, shoes and other appliances, are obtained for those unable to pay for them.

The number of clinics has gradually been increased. Sixty have been held within the last year. The staff has been enlarged to include three nurses and seven other workers with special training in the care and treatment of those with bone or joint diseases or who are crippled from other causes.

Of the 1,637 children and young people under supervision and treatment at present, 886 are boys and 751 girls. Fourteen are under a year old, 302 from 1 to 4 years old; 447 from 5 to 9; 529 from 10 to 14; 315 from 15 to 19, and 30 are 20 years old. About one fifth of the total are crippled through infantile paralysis. In other cases the disability is due to injury at birth; to rickets; to tuberculosis, to some other disease, or to accident.

Transportation to the clinics is one of the most difficult problems of the Service. It is made possible largely through the volunteer aid of the American Legion, civic and other service clubs, and interested individuals. But no child recommended for clinic care has gone without the necessary attention. If the parents have found it impossible to get the child to the clinic, one of the clinic surgeons has visited the child in his own home. In Kent County the Chestertown Rotary Club has helped with the transportation problem for the past two years.
