DUCKING SEASON ENDED THURSDAY OF THIS WEEK

Today Is Last For Shooting Upland Game

The season for shooting wild duck in Maryland ended on Thursday of this week after what was reported by hunters to have been a fair season. The mild weather in the early part of the season started shooting off at a slow pace but due to the lengthened time over last year, most blinds reported more game bagged. Today, Saturday, ends the Upland hunting season which in Kent County is practically confined to rabbits, partridge and squirrel. This wild life that escapes alive today will only have to guard against its natural enemies until next fall.

Three Local Negroes Charged With Carrying Guns

Three local negroes, Robert Robinson, William Brown and Peck Scott were on trial yesterday in connection with the shooting of 17 C. C. C. enrollees from the Kent County camp near Chestertown. The trial, which was before Judge Jewell, had not been concluded at the time of going to press which prohibited the publishing of the evidence brought out. The three negroes were arrested on warrants charging them with carrying shot guns that night.

COMMISSIONERS OF KENT OPPOSE RETURN OF ROADS

Hurt, Kennedy and Smith Attend Shore Meeting

County Commissioners, Julian Hurt and Lloyd Kennedy, representing Kent County at the winter meeting of the Eastern Shore Commissioners at Cambridge yesterday, joined with Somerset, Worcester and Wicomico in opposing the return of the road systems to the counties, Cecil, Queen Annes, Talbot and Caroline favored the return of the roads. It is interesting to note that at previous meetings the former board of County Commissioners alone opposed the return of the roads.

THREE CHANGES MADE IN TEACHERS IN KENT SCHOOLS

Miss Francis Taylor Granted Leave Of Absence

Mrs. Frances Orr Taylor, teacher of the primary grades at Worton School has asked for leave of absence effective January 2, 1939. The vacancy at this school will be filled by Miss Emily N. Skirven who taught the intermediate grades at the Millington School prior to the Christmas holidays. In this position, Miss Helen Shallcross will substitute until February 6, 1939, at which time the place will be filled by Miss Evelyn Peacock, of Massey, who is now completing the four years course at Towson Teachers College.

Easter Holiday Will Be Shortened

At the request of several teachers, the Board of Education has agreed to lengthen the Christmas holiday to include Monday, January 2, 1939. Schools then will reopen at 9 a. m. on Tuesday, January 3, 1939.

This makes it necessary to shorten the Easter holiday by one day or add a day at the end of the school year. Inasmuch as the latter would cause additional expense to a number of teachers, the Easter holiday will be shortened to include only Good Friday and Easter Monday.

COUNTY HUNTER DROWNED WHILE DUCKING THURS.

Ralph Cunningham Loses Life When Boat Upsets

Ralph Cunningham, of Kentmore Park, this county, was drowned Thursday afternoon while ducking in Turner's Creek when a small skiff upset 300 yards off shore. He, with George Pencost were breaking their way through the ice over a crippled duck when the boat upset. Pencost, also of Kentmore Park, clung to the ice and succeeded in getting ashore. Nearby hunters went to their assistance but Cunningham had disappeared when they arrived.

LOCAL TRAPPERS READY FOR OPEN SEASON TOMORROW

Frozen Marshes Will Be Handicap At Start Of Season

The season for trapping muskrats in Maryland will open tomorrow Sunday, January 1st and if the marshes continue frozen trappers will be handicapped during the opening days. Last season, with the marshes frozen only a few times during the winter it is estimated that more than one million rats were trapped making to a large State industry.

Watermen estimate the numbers of muskrats in the marshes by the number of conical-shaped houses visible. The rats have built extensively so far this season and "construction" is still progressing. Game Department officials explained. Muskrat houses are three or four-story affairs, with individual flats connected to a central lobby, called the "well" or "plunge-hole" by trappers. If danger threatens the home, its tenants dive into the "well" and swim to safety through shallow canals leading to deep water.
