LOCAL CHURCH TO UNVEIL MEMORIAL TO FORMER PASTOR

Rendered Heroic Service In Disease Epidemic

Kennedyville M. P. Church will honor the memory of a former pastor Rev. Henry C. Haythe tomorrow during a ceremony in which a tombstone will be unveiled.

He was ordained in 1869 and in 1871, during a smallpox epidemic in the vicinity of Kennedyville he rendered heroic service by visiting and nursing those ill with the disease. While doing this work he contracted the disease and died.

A visitor at that church last summer made a substantial contribution toward the stone and the balance was raised by the congregation of the church.

Telephone Bill Goes

For Taxes

Operating revenues in November for The Chesapeake and Potomac Telephone Company of Baltimore City serving the State of Maryland, amounted to \$1,296,117 as compared with \$1,238,003 for the same month of 1937, according to the report of operations just filed with the Maryland Public Service Commission.

Operating expenses, including taxes, amounted to \$1,045,368, which was \$85,515 more than for the same month last year. Net income for the month of November was \$250,749.

Taxes for November amounted to \$104,405, or about 15 per cent of the customer's telephone bills. For 11 months of 1938, taxes amounted to \$1,997,122 which is 382,194 or about 4 per cent more than for the same period in 1937.

Maryland was served by 261,003 telephones on November 30, 1938, which was an increase of 12,969 over the number in operation on November 30, 1937.

Telephone users made more than 33,616,500 calls during the month, which was an increase of 2,900,000 over those made during November of last year.

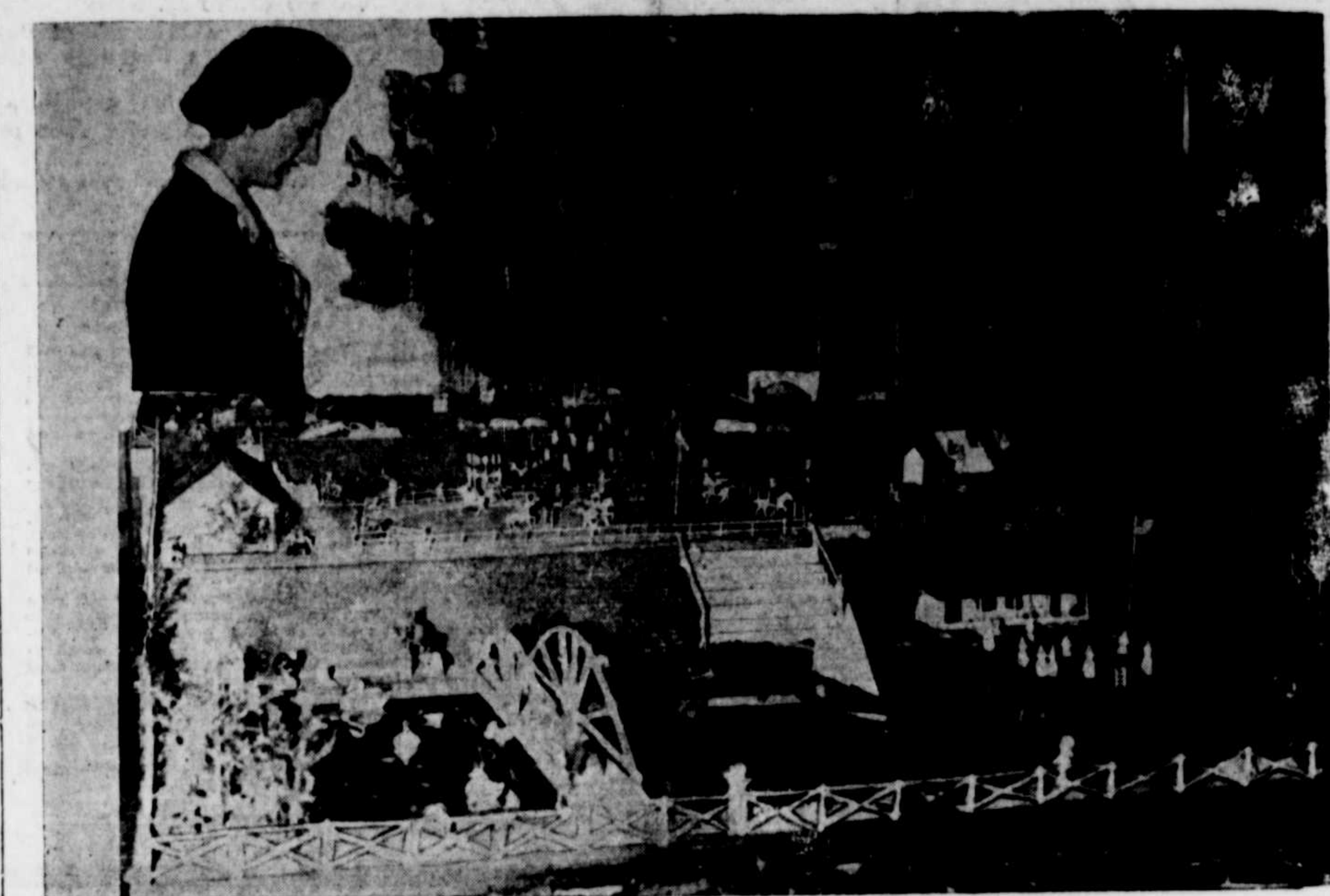

IMPROVEMENTS TO MACUM CREEK REJECTED BY ARMY

Advantages Do Not Justify Cost

The proposed improvement of Macum Creek on Kent Island long advocated by watermen as an intermediate harbor between Love Point and Kent Island Narrows, has been turned down by the U. S. Department of Army following a hearing on the question held at Chestertown last fall. An unfavorable report was submitted by the office of Colonel Jarvis J. Bain, division engineer for the South Atlantic division.

According to the report the principal grounds for rejecting the request for improvements were that the existing harbor and market facilities at Kent Island Narrows are reasonably adequate for boat owners residing in the vicinity of Macum Creek; that the benefits from the desired improvement would be almost entirely local; and that these benefits would be small and insufficient to justify the cost of the improvement.

\$177 Yet To Be Raised

Mrs. Nora Marwell, Chairman of Kent County Seals Sale Committee, announces that \$523.04 has been received from the sale of Tuberculosis Seals that were overlooked in the excitement of the Christmas festivities. If people will hunt these up and make returns on them, the work of the Maryland Tuberculosis Association can be continued without curtailment," said William B. Matthews, managing director, of the association.

"During the last year from which there are accurate figures available, the tuberculosis death rate in Maryland was reduced from 81.9 per 100,000 persons to 78.6 per 100,000.

"With continued effort on the part of health authorities and agencies, and continued cooperation from the people, further reductions should be possible," he said.

"It is still not too late to use the Christmas Seals," Mr. Matthews explained. "If they have not yet been used or there are some left over from Christmas, use them on your mail. It is never too late to spread a message of good health and hope to those who are unfortunate."

STATE SENATE NAMES ARTHUR H. BRICE LIEUTENANT GOVERNOR OF MARYLAND

As President Of Senate He Is Second In Line Of Governorship Of State

Dudley G. Roe In Fight For Floor Leader

GOLDSBOROUGH TO RECEIVE BENCH APPOINTMENT

Congressional Approval Expected Today



The Maryland Legislature, which convened on Tuesday of this week, appointed Senator Arthur H. Brice, of Kent County, President of the Senate which also carries with it the title of Lieutenant Governor of Maryland.

Senator Brice's appointment was practically assured when the Senators of the various counties of the Eastern Shore agreed unanimously last week that he should be the candidate from the Shore after it was generally understood that the Shore should have this responsible position if they could agree to a candidate.

Senator Brice is serving his second term as Senator from Kent County, having previously been in the House of Delegates. His appointment makes him the first representative from this county who has held that office for more than a hundred years, the late William Spencer having served as President of the Senate from 1816 to 1820. Senator Brice succeeds Senator Lagdale Sasser, of Prince George County who served during the past four years, he having been a candidate for Governor, did not seek re-election.

At the present time there is a political battle under way between the supporters of Senator Dudley G. Roe and Senator Lindsay for the chairmanship of the powerful Finance Committee which office carries with it the Floor Leader of the Senate. While this appointment has not been made until the Senate meets, it is favored for the appointment. Should he receive it, Kent and Queen Annes will hold the two most important offices in the Senate.

The names of those Legislators who will serve on the various committees will probably not be known until the latter part of next week. Nothing definite has been decided as to what committees Kent County's representatives to the House of Delegates, Messrs. Roy Strong and Roger Harris will be named. Mr. Strong, who has previously served in the Legislature is a suitable candidate for the chairmanship of the Fish and Game Committee. This is an important committee in the House and for which he is particularly suited. His legislative experience and contact at his home in Rock Hall with the resources of the Chesapeake Bay particularly fits him for this appointment. Mr. Harris, who is serving his first term in the Legislature will probably receive consideration for membership on the agriculture committee and the Chesapeake Bay and Tributary Committee. His experience over a period of years as a farmer and his familiarity with the upper part of the Bay has made him familiar with the work of these committees.

Many Preparing To Attend Inauguration

A large group of people from Kent County are preparing to attend the inauguration of Governor Herbert R. O'Connor next Wednesday.

The program for the inauguration includes Governor O'Connor and his party leaving the mansion at 11:30 a. m. for the State House where he will take the oath of office at 12:00 noon. Following an address by Governor O'Connor from a special built platform, the parade through the streets of Annapolis, will start.

The parade will include the First and Fifth Maryland Regiments, and twenty three bands including the Naval Academy band.

A banquet for a limited number of guests will be held at the ball room from 4 to 6. A dinner and ball will be held at Carvel Hall that evening.

URGES INVENTORY BY HEALTH CHECK AT THIS SEASON

"Take a leaf from the custom of the financial concerns at this season and the year by having your health account balanced," Dr. R. H. Riley, Director of the State Department of Health advises Marylanders, particularly grown-ups, as 1939 opens.

"In the reports of the recent surveys of health conditions throughout the country by the U. S. Public Health Service and other national agencies, a particular emphasis is laid on the steady increase in illness and deaths from chronic diseases, particularly diseases of the heart and arteries; diseases of the kidneys; the mental and nervous diseases, rheumatism, cancer; tuberculosis; diabetes; chronic diseases of the gall bladder, and the complications of syphilis.

"We are inclined to associate most of these diseases—with the exception of tuberculosis—with persons beyond middle age, but the nation-wide surveys showed that a marked increase in illness from chronic ailments begins in those just reaching maturity—twenty men and young women of twenty or thereabouts—and reaches a maximum in old age. So the advice to check up on your physical resources applies to the young as well as to those farther on in life.

"If you haven't had it done recently," he continued, "go to your doctor for a complete checking up of your physical assets and liabilities. If his audit of your physical capital shows general or specific weakness, your doctor will tell you what you can do to conserve your resources to the best advantage. You may find that you need to slow up a bit, possibly make some change in your dietary habits or in your daily routine. If your doctor finds that your physical liabilities exceed your assets it is better for you to know about them so you can budget your resources intelligently.

"Nearly all of the chronic diseases have slow beginnings, but the majority may be detected by means of a careful medical examination. In most instances, early recognition, prompt attention and a readjustment of activities under the direction of the family physician will do much to check the advance of the disease, prevent suffering and prolong life and usefulness."
