Biggest Piece of Embroidery

The biggest piece of embroidery in the world is probably the Bayeux tapestry, which is literally an embroidery, and is 231 feet long and 20 inches wide. Tradition says that it was the work of Queen Matilda, wife of William the Conqueror, and her maids. It depicts scenes of the Norman conquest of England and William the Conqueror's victory at Hastings. The tapestry is housed in a special building near the Gothic cathedral of Bayeux, France. The embroidery is on a background of coarse linen and has preserved its tints of dark and light blue, red, green, gray, beige and brown.
