THE WASHINGTON PLAYERS PRESENT LABURNUM GROVE

Second Major Production Of The Year

The Washington Players, dramatic organization of the local college, will present on March 10, at William Smith Hall, as their second major production of the year, the comedy-drama "Laburnum Grove", by the well known English playwright and novelist, J. B. Priestley. Laburnum Grove, a success on both the London and New York stages, is an entertaining play. Exciting but not melodramatic, humorous but not ridiculous, clever but not eccentric, the piece judiciously combines effective characterization, an interesting plot, and delightful humor. The story is concerned with George Radfern, a prosperous resident of a respectable London suburb. The quiet life enjoyed by himself and his wife is somewhat disrupted by the appearance of a brother-in-law and his wife. Radfern's daughter, Elsie, is somewhat bored by the monotony of her existence at Laburnum Grove and welcomes the attentions of a none too promising suitor. All the visitors are eager to borrow money from Radfern at the same time that they ridicule his dull, humdrum manner of existence. Radfern tosses a bombshell of surprise among them when he calmly announces that he is a key member in an organization of counterfeiters who have given Scotland Yard its biggest case in years. From this point on the audience has a double source of enjoyment in observing the reactions of the various characters to Radfern's amazing announcement and in watching down the supposed criminal. Whether or not Radfern is actually a counterfeiter, or whether he has been "pulling the legs" of the others is left in doubt until the last moment when the climax comes with a smashing surprise.

The play is particularly well adapted for presentation by amateurs as it scrupulously avoids the love scenes and excessively dramatic passages which are generally beyond the reach of any but professionals. Chestertown students in the cast include Frieda Dorf as Elsie, and Henry van der Goes as the pompous brother-in-law. Other actors will be John Stack, President of the Players, Bernice Smith, Jesse Johnson, Harry Hoppe, Lloyd Davis, and Henry Magurie. Milton Glock will have charge of stage settings and Evelyn White of properties.

The Washington College Orchestra will play between acts. The production is being directed by Professor Winton Tolles of the English department.
