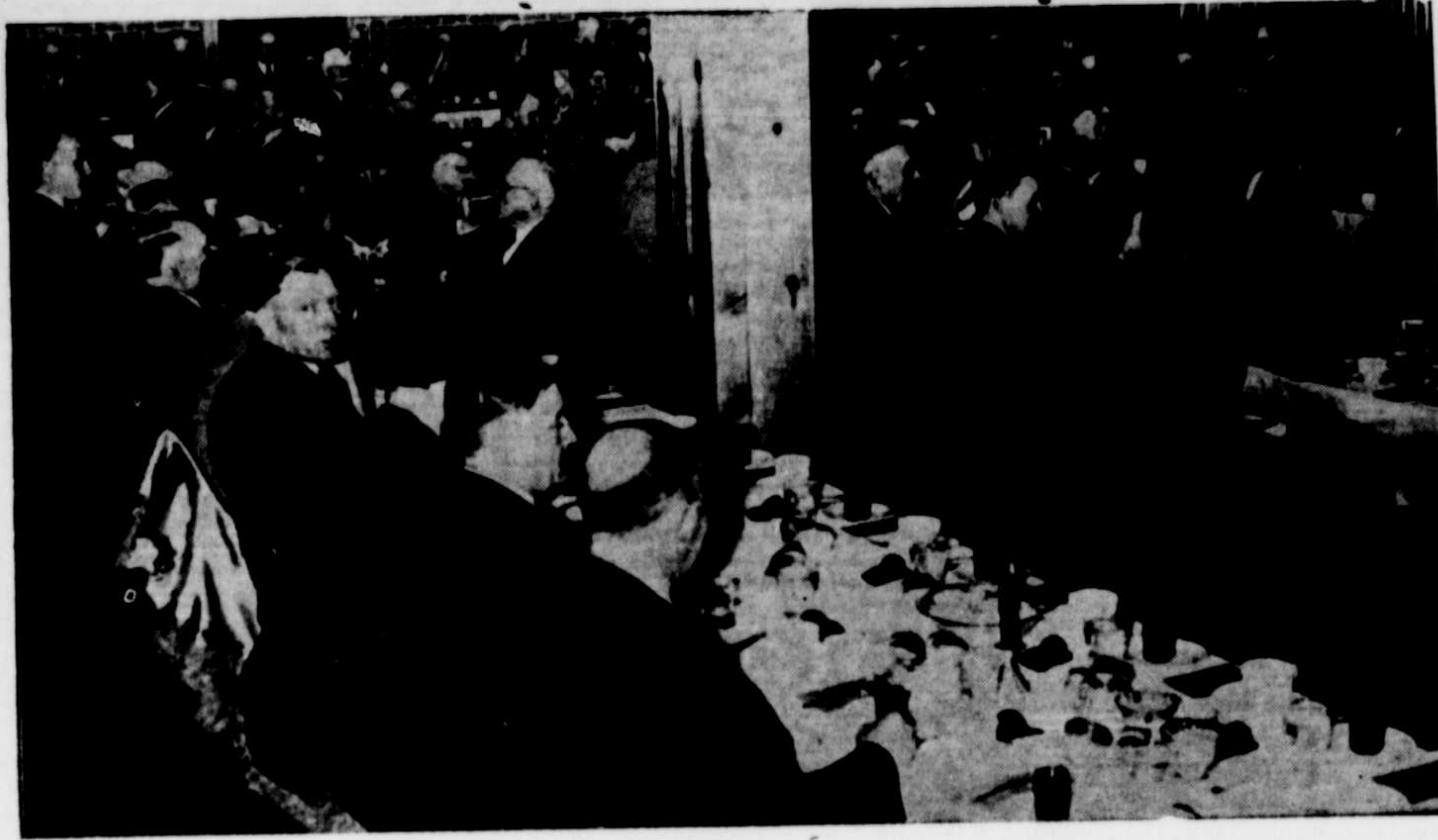


BOOSTERS OF FIRE COMPANY DINE AT BANQUET HERE

Chiropractors of Shore Meet

A meeting of the members of the Eastern Shore Chiropractic Association was held in the Columbia House, Bridgeville, Delaware, Wednesday night. After the dinner meeting, the program was turned over to Dr. T. A. Tobin, Association President. National Child Health Day was discussed and the members of the Association agreed to cooperate with this nation wide program. Child Health Day was instituted in 1916 by Miss Julia C. Lathrop, the First Chief of the U. S. Children's Bureau. As part of the program, each Chiropractor agreed to give free examinations to children during the week of May 1st, for the early detection of Spinal and Postural defects. It is now generally agreed that many diseases and functional disturbances can be prevented by the early detection of abnormal involvements of the spine and the body posture. The plan will be carried out in this section by Dr. W. H. Moyer. Several papers of interest to the group were presented and cases of unusual interest studied. The next meeting will be held early in May, when the members of the Association will be guests of Dr. J. C. Wood, Salisbury, Maryland.

NO MONEY FOR LIBRARIES

To have a good free library system is to have an insurance policy on democracy. Yet our libraries, even in wealthy communities, find it hard to get enough new books and to replace old ones as they wear out. In some small communities, especially in rural areas, public libraries simply don't exist. Following are facts to illustrate the situation: Forty-five million Americans have no public libraries within their reach. Of the 3,100 counties in the United States, less than 300 have county-wide library service. As a whole the country spends 37 cents a year per capita for library service. Two states at the bottom of the list spend 2 cents a year per capita; the top state, Massachusetts, spends \$1.08; while New York, one of the richest, spends only about 62 cents. In twenty-two states half or more of the population are without free library service. —The Commentator Magazine

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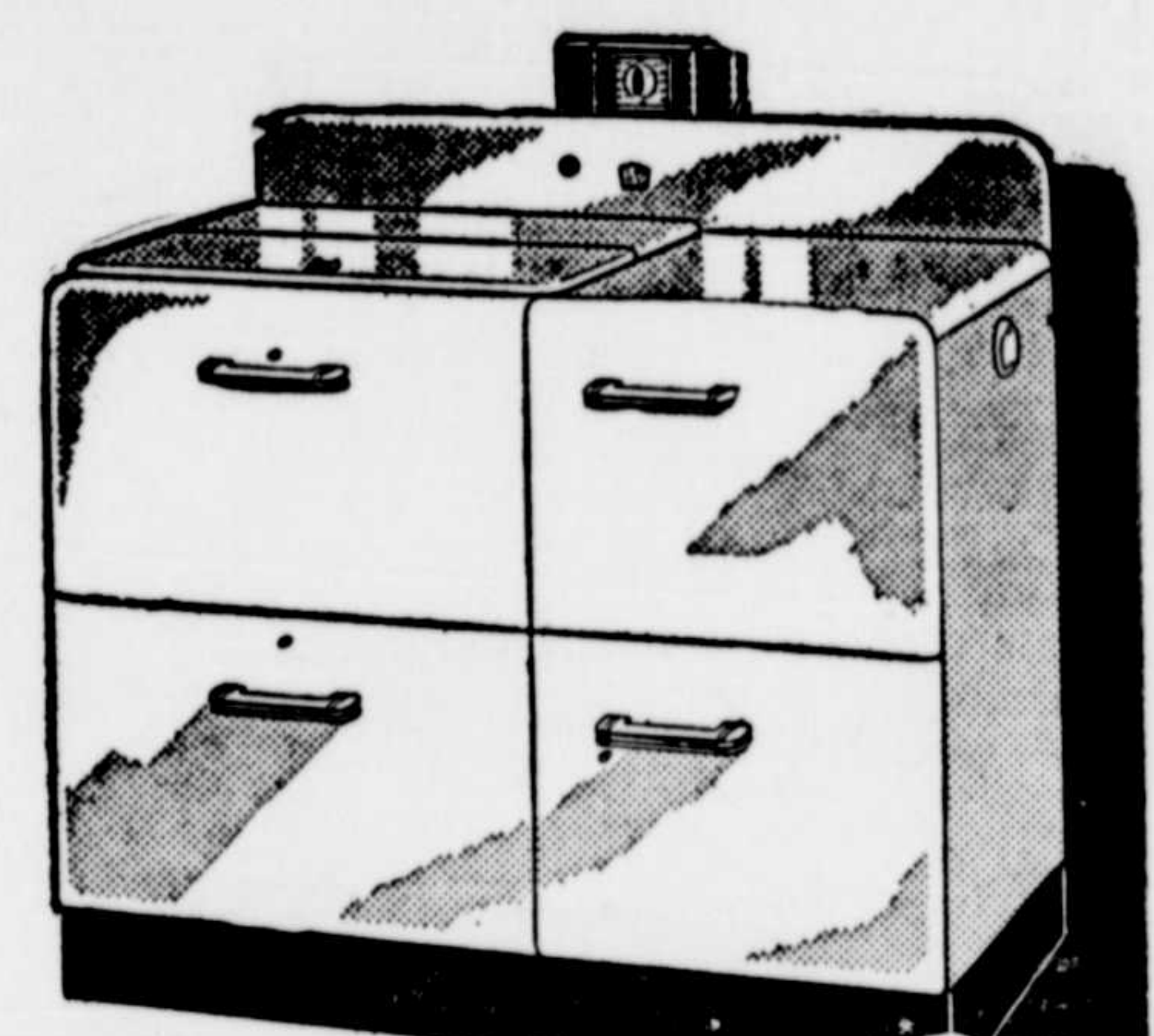
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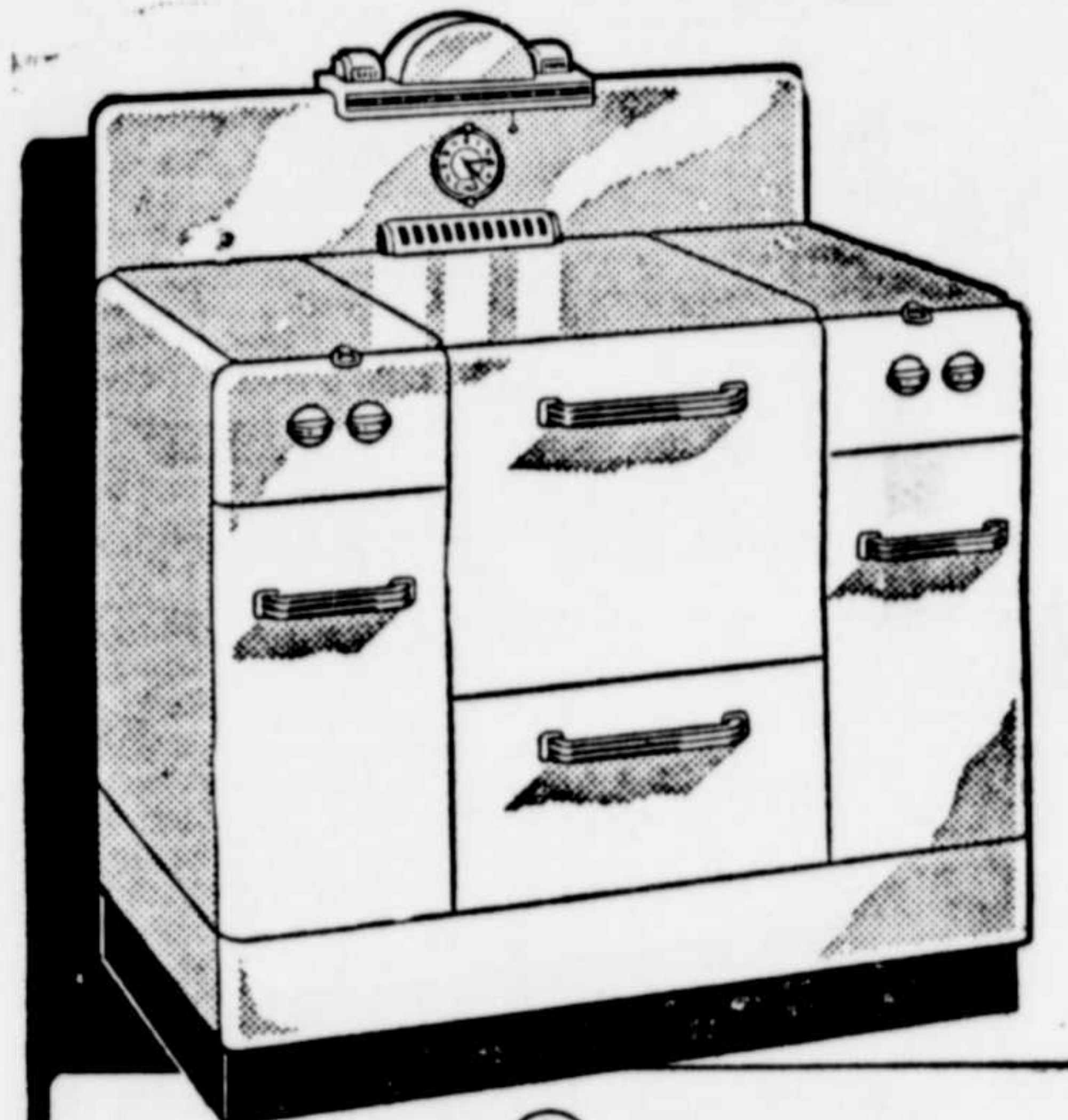
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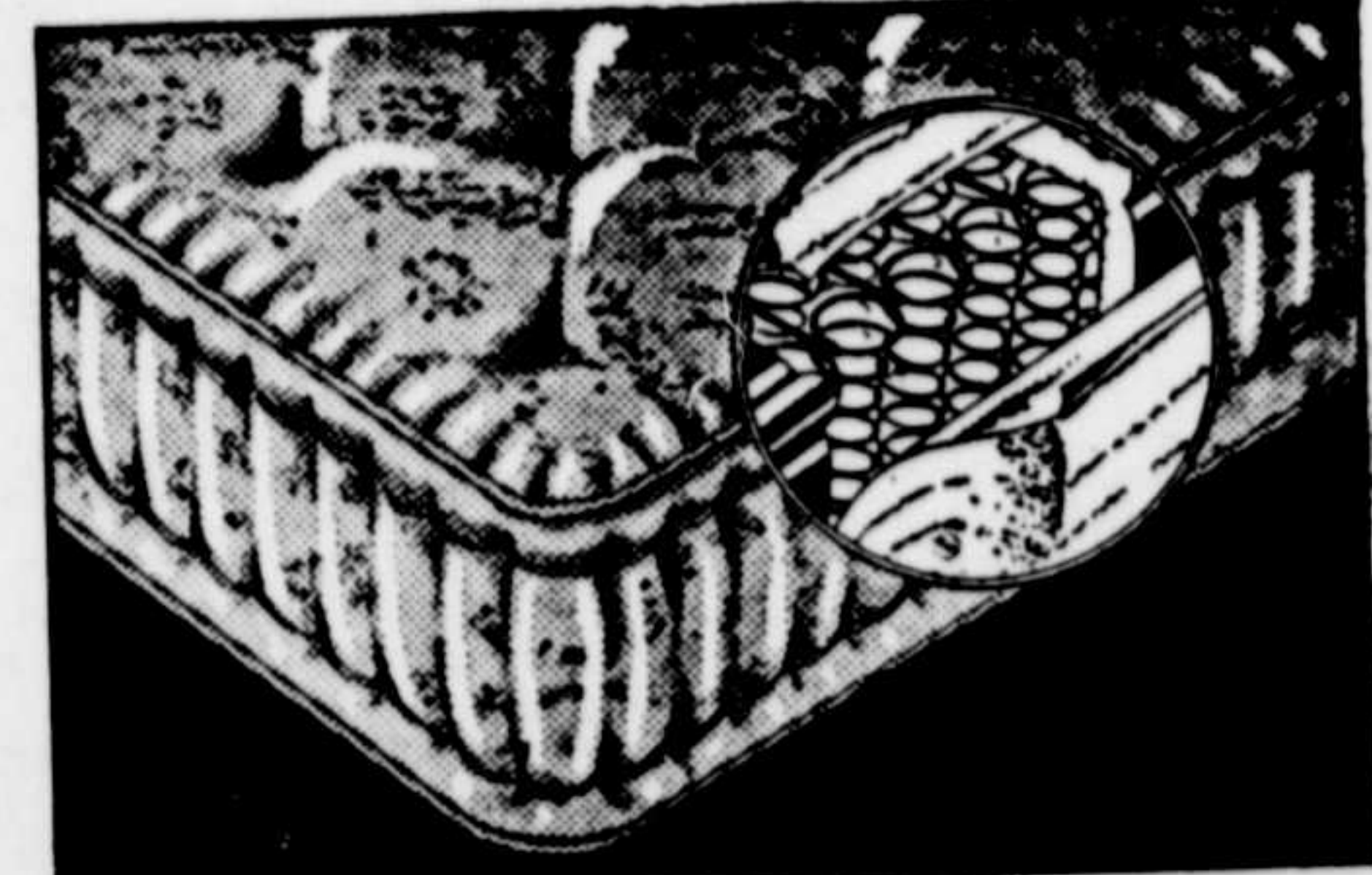


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
