### FRIENDSHIP HOUSE

Have you heard of Friendship House? It is literally a house by the side of the road. It was opened last May through the efforts of Mrs. Richard Washburn Child, the wife of one of our Ambassadors to Rome. Having spent much time in foreign lands, she realizes the difficulties of the many refugees who have been driven from their homes, almost penniless; people of culture and talent, strangers in a strange land. Mrs. Child's idea was to provide a social place where these people might meet and learn the customs and language of this country. So she went about trying to find such a place. The Federation of Churches in New York became interested and the Brick Presbyterian Church on Park Ave., that was going to move to their new church offered the old church, the rectory and the Parish building for that purpose. This gave them ample space for class rooms, entertainments, games and rooms where orchestra could meet for practice, and artists may display their pictures. There are English lessons where they may learn to speak without accent and where the foreigners are eager to teach their language in return. There are no charges here, organs, pianos, chess, checker boards and other games are here to use, and every body is made welcome. There is no food given nor any sleeping quarters but abundant of books and lounge rooms, large and airy in summer, and warm in winter. Mrs. Child has charge of the House and the new becomes the friend and confidant of the many who take advantage of its privileges. The place is surely worthy of its name, "Friendship House."
