NEWS OF THE BOYS AT CAMP MEAD

According to the latest reports, the 29th Division will "pull out" for maneuvers on September 13. On this date the division will move by motor convoy to A. P. Hill Military Reservation, Va., to maneuver until the first of October when they will start for the Carolinas in conjunction with the largest motorized troop movement on the Atlantic Seaboard since World War I. In addition to the 29th, the 28th Division of Indiantown Gap, Pa., and the 44th Division, Fort Dix, N. J., will be moving southward. Being the first time to reach the training area in the Carolinas, the 29th will be stationed between Rockingham and Wadesboro, N. C. It is expected that by the first of December the men will be back at Meade again.

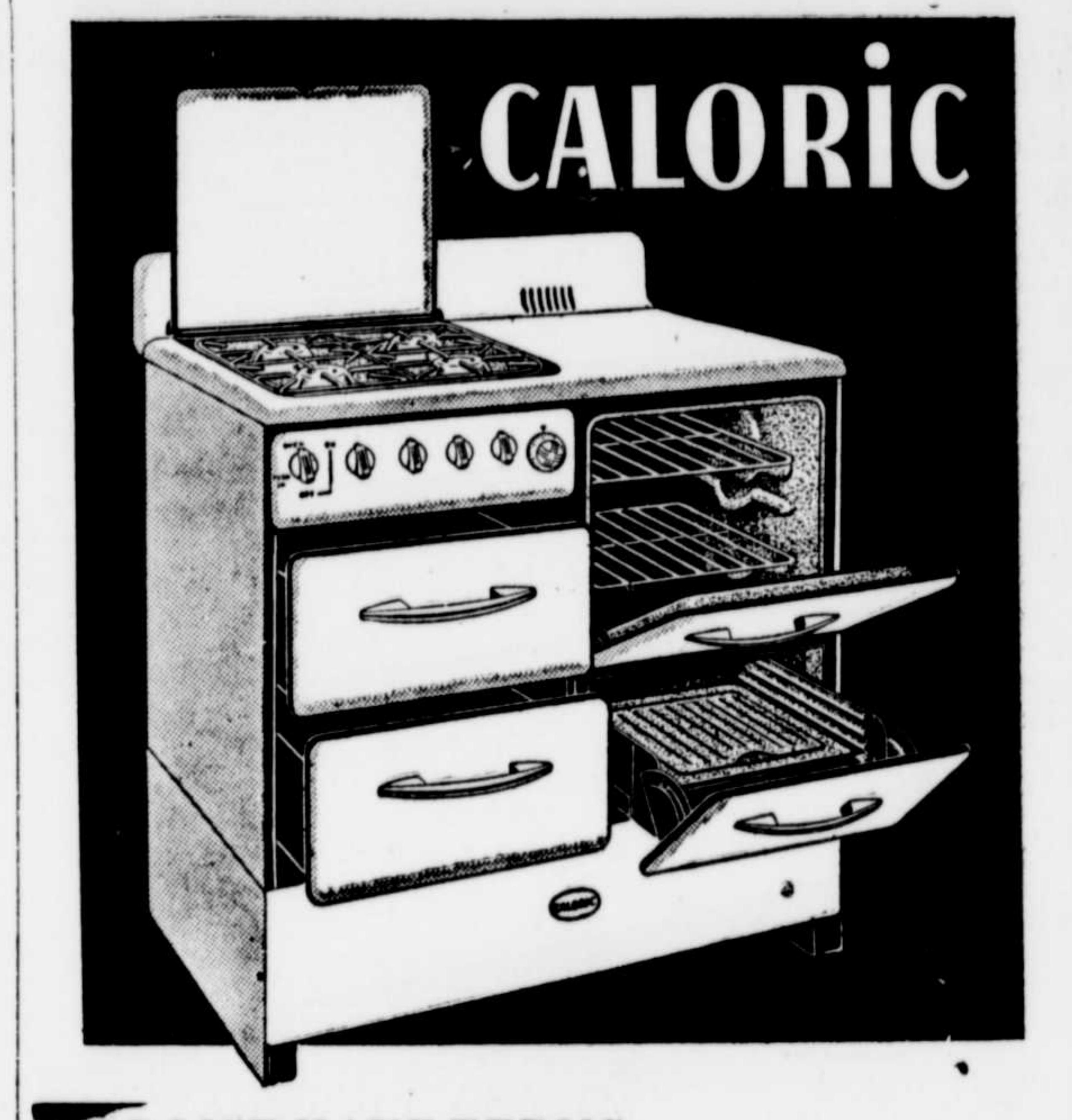

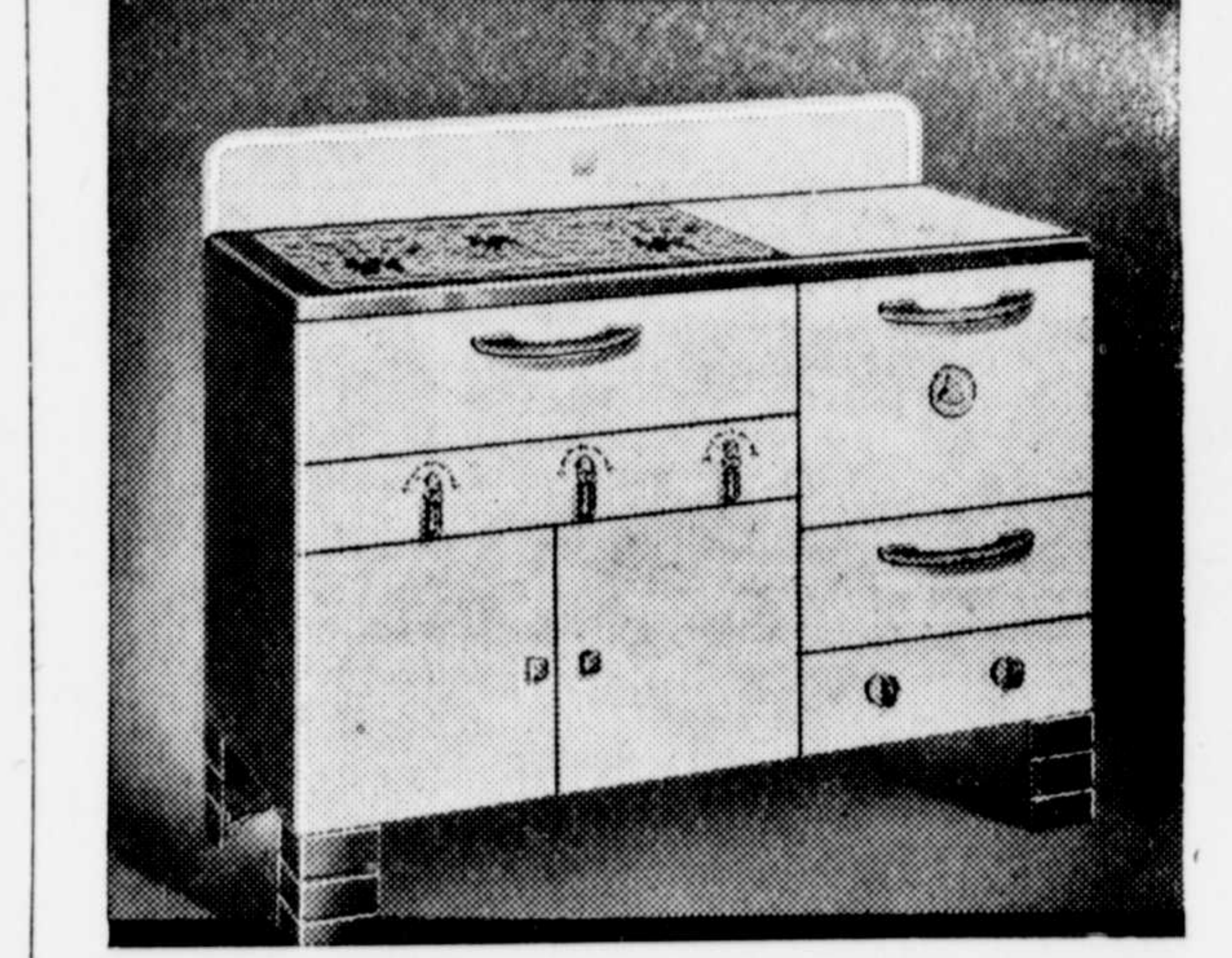

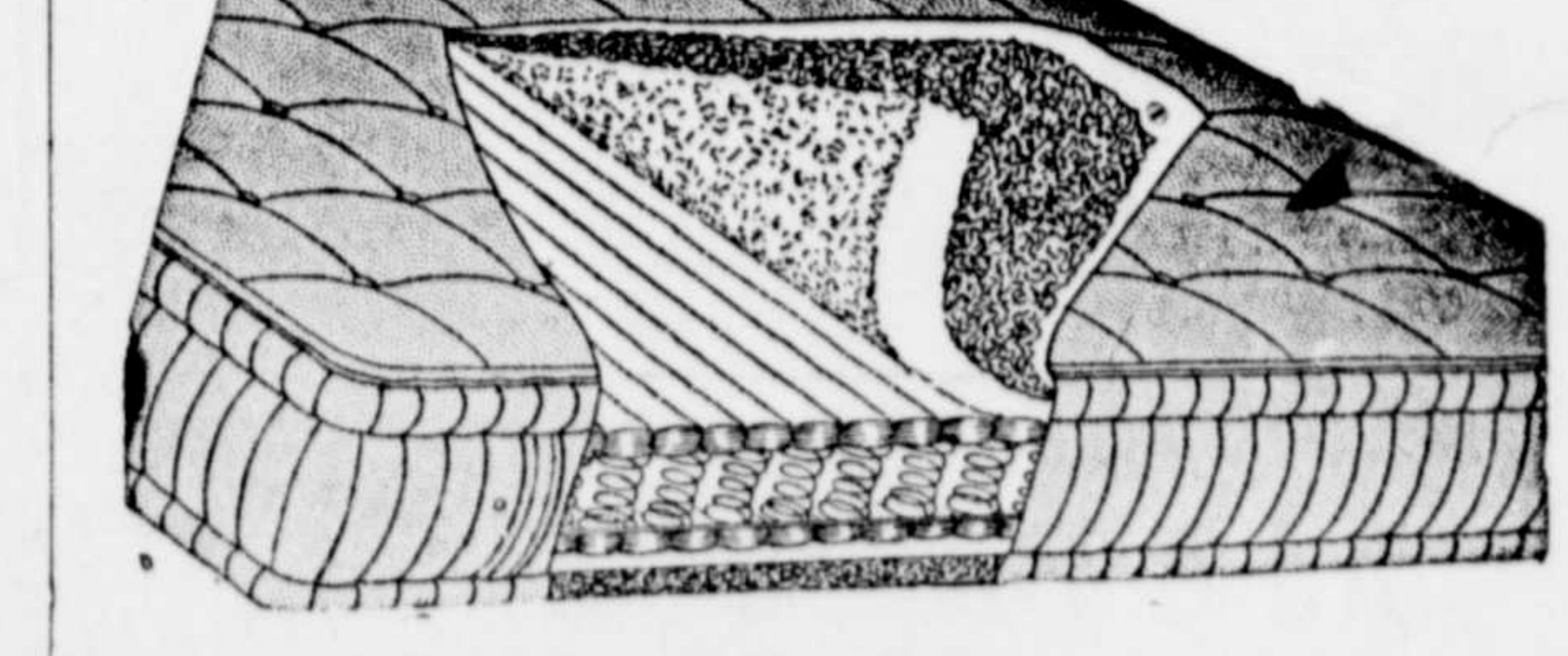
