The passage this week of the eighteen months draft extension bill which makes the army training period a total of thirty months is another emphasis of the serious condition which this country finds itself in. This training period together with all industries going full blast in defense work needs only the shooting to make war a reality. In spite of all of this the army of civilians apparently either do not realize the situation or are not interested. Pleasure seems to be on the increase and places that offer recreation are crowded. There appears to be plenty of spending money and it is certainly being spent. It is necessary during serious world conditions that the moral of the people be maintained at as near a normal level as possible. The high wages of defense industries have a tendency to create a splurge which is one of the direct roads toward inflation. If people will invest their excess earnings in defense bonds or some other method of systematic saving they will not only ease the demand on the already strained commodity market but will assure a nest egg when the present bubble bursts. Those who have near relatives in the military service must face the fact that at the end of thirty months of training the young men will need a help to get started. Defense bonds in their names will be welcomed at the time of discharge.

Recent tests conducted by the State Department of Health have lead to the belief that a colored woman living in Chestertown is a typhoid carrier. Under State regulations this person can be prevented from handling food consumed by the public and there is little question but that circumstances will prevent her from working at the trade of cooking. This particular person has cooked for private families over a long period of years during which time she has raised a large family of children who are respectable colored people in this community. If it is necessary for public health that this person shall give up the only work she knows then it appears to be only fair that the public should compensate her for the sacrifice. It appears to be a business proposition.

The recent meeting of the leaders of the United States and England has certainly established definite aims of the Allies in the present war. These eight points should mean a great deal to the conquered countries who are now under Nazi domination. They should also mean a great deal to the countries not now at war but whose sentiment can be swung either way. The new order, as outlined by the axis powers, is very vague and when one considers the lies and trickery resorted to thus far by those powers, there can be no confidence in any prospective setup that they may advocate. There is no question as to how the great majority of Americans not only feel about it but are ready to act should action be necessary.

Postoffice or railroad safes seem to be the height of accomplishment for all local robbers. Just why men will work for hours at as laborous a task as stealing a safe, carrying it to a secluded spot and then break it open when the history of such robberies show only a small cash loot. They generally rob a nearby hardware store to get the tools to handle the safe, which is typical of the robbery this week at Golts. It goes to show what work some people will do to get out of work.
