

### NEWS GATHERED ON PENINSULA

Eastern Shoremen have turned out quietly for the national emergency. Sportsmen find their favorite fishing guides have vanished, their sleek and colorful fishing cruisers gone. The guides and skippers today are sporting gold braid in the Coast Guard's baby navy—the Coast Guard inshore patrol—aboard their own craft, now repainted drab battle gray. The boats are volunteered to the Coast Guard for the duration and are maintained by the Government. The skipper becomes a commissioned officer and the crew, seamen. The flotillas of little boats patrol the bays, rivers and ocean front, relieving larger Coast Guard vessels for duty with the Navy.

Estimating a shortage in Wicomico county funds at more than \$65,000, Chief Judge Benjamin A. Johnson today charged the Wicomico county grand jury to "fearlessly and courageously" investigate the defalcations and to "accuse all whom the evidence before you indicates are involved."

Judge Johnson declared checks had been issued on fictitious bills presented to the County Commissioners' clerk.

Mrs. Rachel W. Day, former clerk to the Board of County Commissioners, is under \$5,000 bail pending grand jury action. She is charged with forgery and larceny of county funds.

At a meeting of the Hartford County School Board in Bel Air on Monday a further study was made of the acute school condition which has resulted from the influx of Army officials and defense workers with their families. As a result a plan has been worked out whereby a large number of the schoolless students of high school age may be accommodated during the coming term, thus somewhat easing the situation.

Gratifying response has been received in Cecil County to the appeal to the public to list available rooms and houses for defense workers in our local defense industries, it was announced by Margaret E. Cronin, of the new Homes Registration Office of the Division of Defense Housing Coordination, recently opened by the Defense Council in the Court House.

However, despite the many persons who have listed rooms with the office, the number available will be amazingly inadequate when workers begin seeking accommodations closer to the plants in which they are employed and additional workers move into the County.

John R. Chew, former bartender at the Post Exchange, Cantonment No. 1, Edgewood Arsenal, Wednesday was held under \$1,500 bail for action of the federal grand jury on a charge of embezzling about \$1,400 from fund taken in on beer sales over a period of about a month.

The St. George's bridge over the Chesapeake and Delaware Canal is now approximately 75 per cent completed. H. N. Crichton, Chesapeake City, resident engineer for the canal, said Mr. Crichton said the false work for the making of the main span is now underway by the actual spanning of the channel has not been undertaken by the Phoenix Bridge Company. 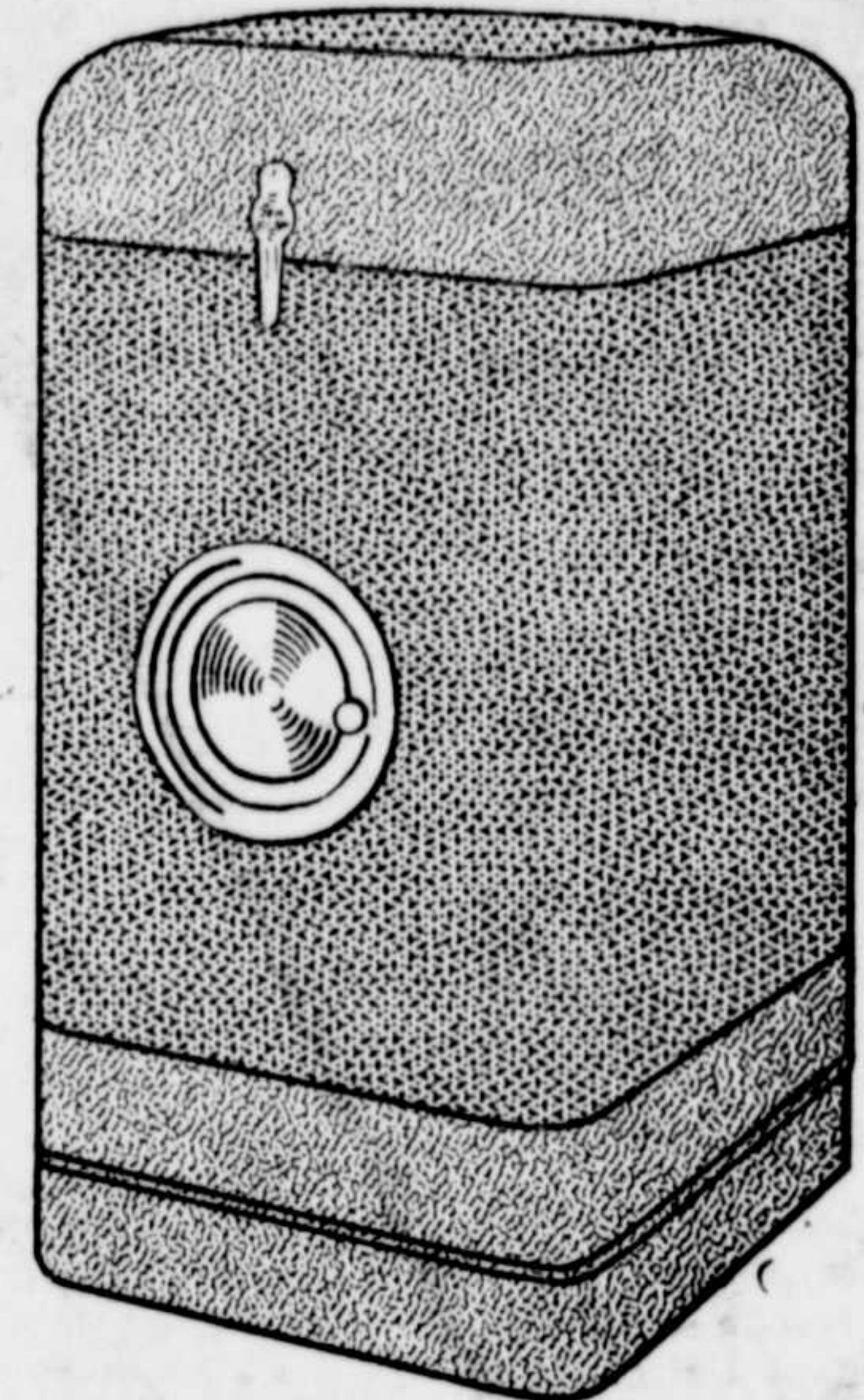

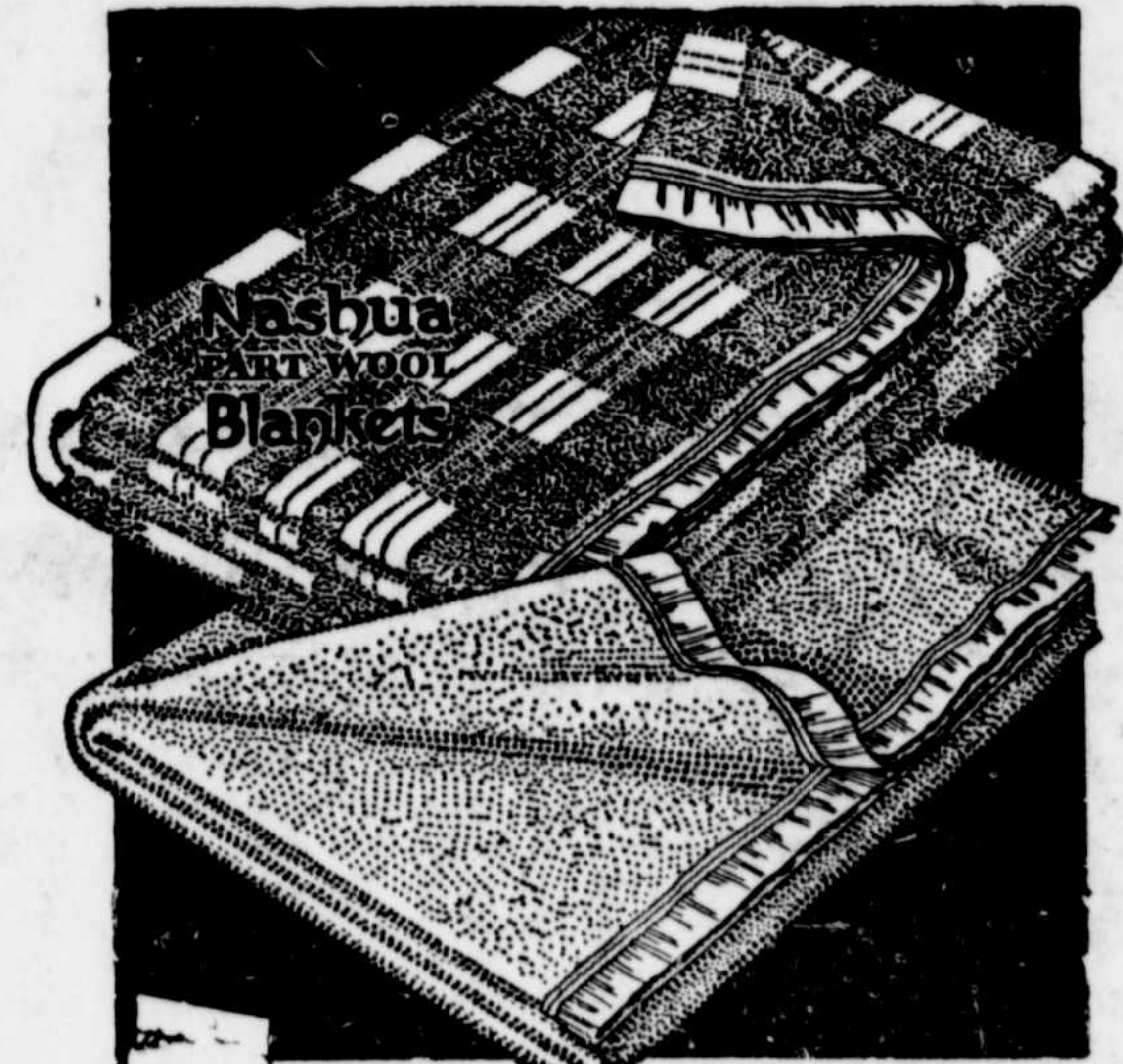

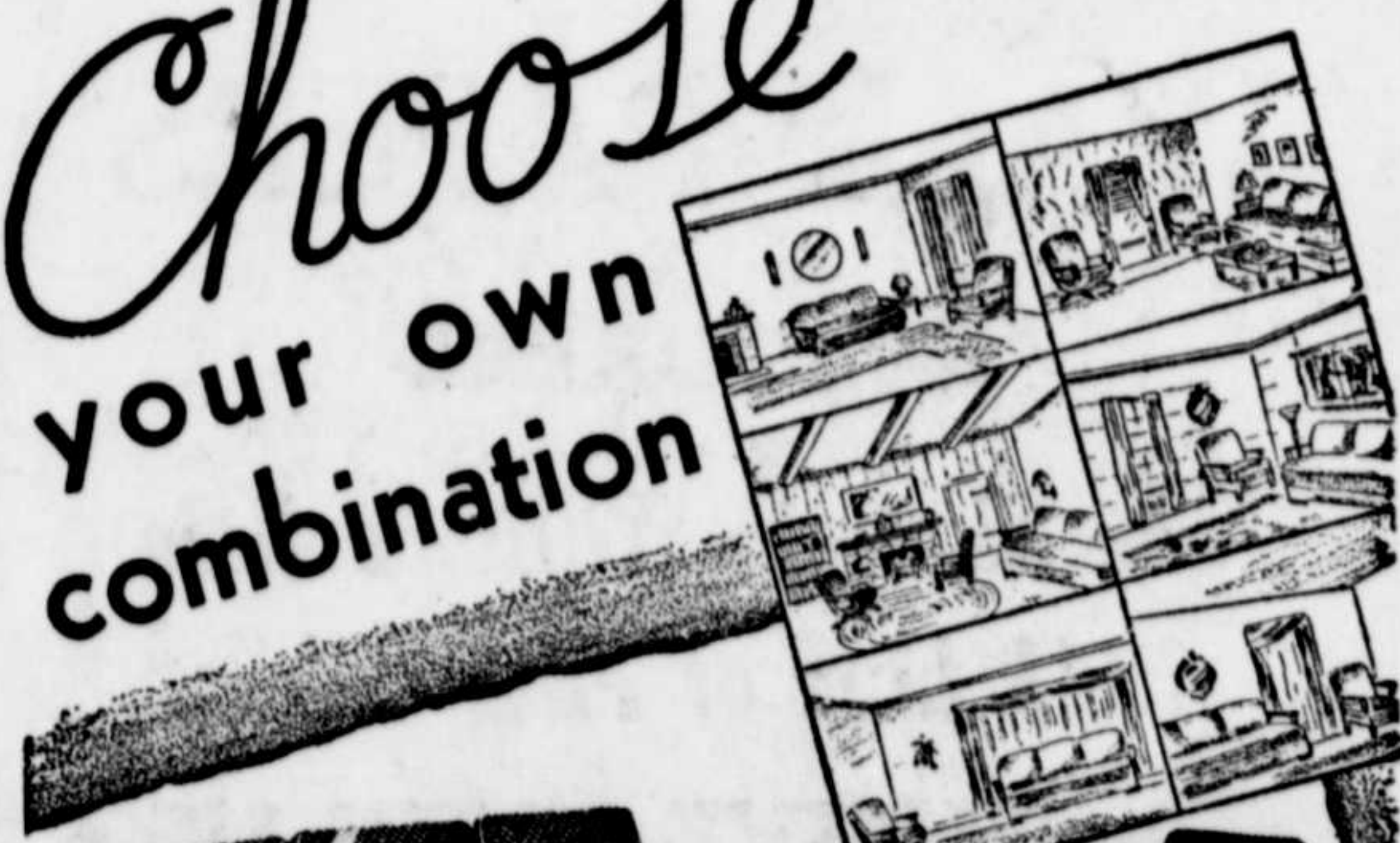
