Next week is Home Coming up on the Hill, and big times are expected. East and West, North and South will meet again, rain or shine.

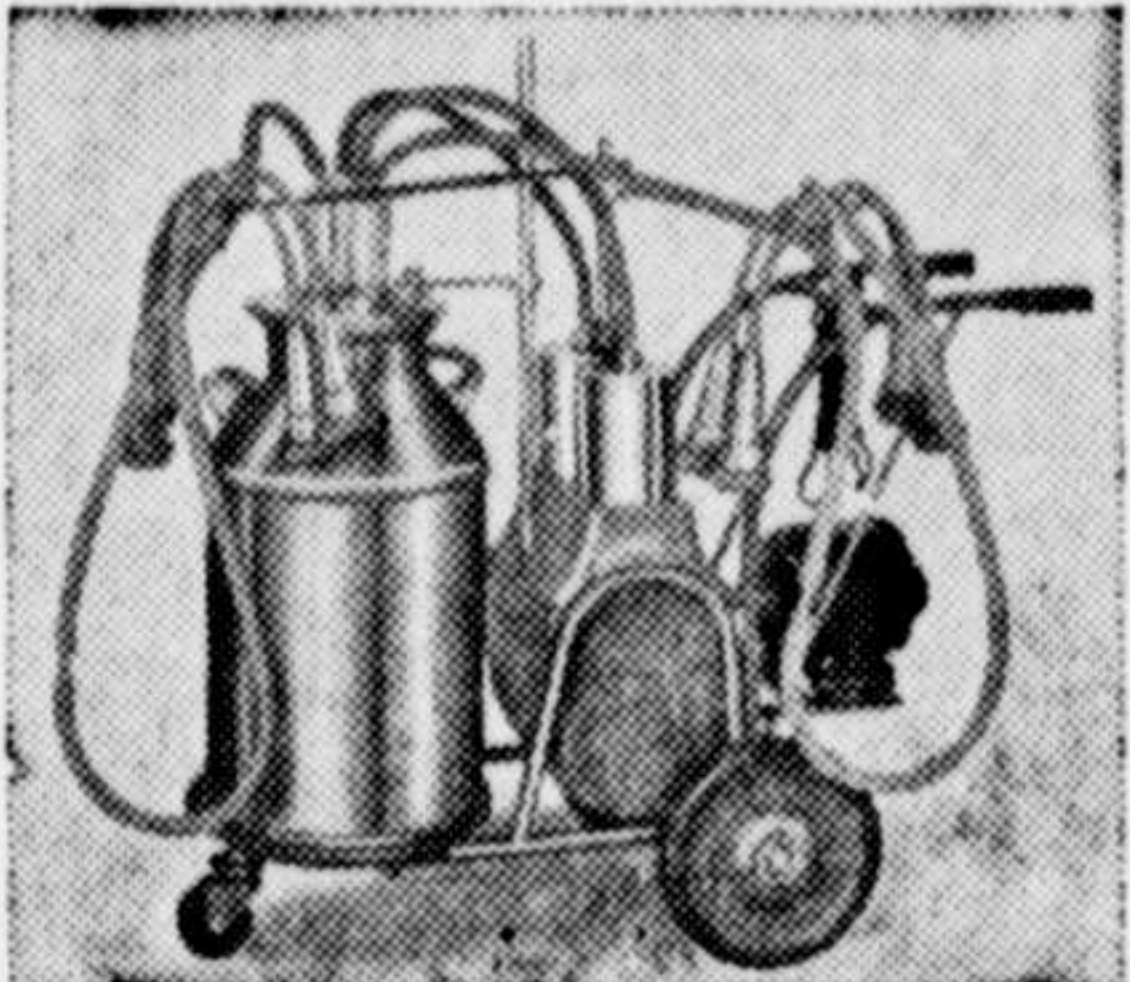
