

FEDERAL MILK HEARING ENDED LAST WEEK

Proposes Increased Prices

The Federal-State Hearing to consider joint regulation of the Philadelphia market by the Dairy Division of the U S D A and the Pennsylvania Milk Control Commission adjourned on December 5 after being in session 19 days. The hearing was originally called on October 23 and met intermittently until its closing last week. This hearing was held upon petition of Inter-State Milk Producers' Cooperative which asked for joint control in order to—(1) Secure uniform prices for milk used in the same classes whether produced within or outside Pennsylvania; (2) Increase prices to levels in line with present increased costs of production and (3) Obtain uniform and strict enforcement of prices set for producers.

Testimony placed upon the hearing record required approximately 3200 typewritten pages in addition to several hundred exhibits of charts, tabulations, maps and other supplementary material.

Inter-State, in its request to the Dairy Division for this hearing, proposed a Class I price of \$3.70 and formulae for Classes II and III which would return producers about \$2.55 and \$1.73, respectively, per hundred pounds. These prices are for 4 percent milk, f. o. b. the market, and were based upon a combination of the cost of producing milk as determined from extensive studies and surveys, and its present competitive value.

With the possibility that the proposed State order increasing the Class I price to producers by 28 cents may not immediately materialize, the hearing just closed becomes of even greater importance and makes prompt action on it more urgent than ever. A prelude to this proposed order of the Pennsylvania Milk Control Commission was held by Attorney General Reno on October 21 and following a conference on the subject with Governor James and Control officials, it was stated that no decision had been reached but further conferences would be held.

With the closing of the hearing, the next step is the preparation of a proposed Order by the Secretary of Agriculture which will then be submitted to interested parties, following which a final draft will be made and presented to producers for their approval. On this vote a 75 percent majority of the votes cast by eligible producers is necessary before the order may become effective.
