LOCAL SCOUTS WILL COLLECT SCRAP PAPER

Will Be Part Of Defense Activity

It was announced this week by John Eliason, Scoutmaster of Troop No. 130, that both Chestertown Scout Troops combine in response to the governments call to collect waste paper. Scouts will visit every home in Chestertown and request that a saving program be started. Every Friday afternoon the Scouts will pick up the weeks collection.

It is imperative that every housewife, every businessman, cooperate in this National wastepaper salvage campaign.

This paper is very vital to National Defense. Millions of articles must be packaged and sent to assembly plants, millions of finished products must be packed and shipped.

Housewives and businessmen are asked to save all wastepaper, boxes, cardboard and Christmas wrappings. Tell your Scout collector where he will find your collection. Back porches are best or the cellar, but have it stored where he will find it without too much trouble or bother.

The drive will start immediately. If you haven't been visited as yet by a Scout call your nearest Scout or call Junior Assistant Scoutmaster John Fowler at 477 and a Scout will call.

In response to the call of the U. S. O., the Red Cross, and the American Library Association, Scouts will also request books of all types. Needed are fiction, history and up to date scientific and technical works.

This campaign will be conducted in order that library's may be established for men in training in U. S. Army camps, or community libraries in areas with greatly increased defense population, and for the Navy, Coast Guard and the American Marines.

The cooperation in both these drives will be greatly appreciated by the Scouts and also those who will benefit from the Scouts effort.

Why Collect Waste Paper
(1) It is vital to National Defense. In an effort to share Defense projects and not to interfere with the

absolutely necessary normal employment, many defense contracts are being manufactured by subcontractors. Literally millions of articles must be packaged and sent to assembly plants. A lack or means to do this might conceivably disrupt our entire program.

(2) Waste Paper Collection is Necessary Starting Today—Securing household waste paper is a part of the Nation's effort. It will be salvaged to help us do our bit. With the help of everyone there will be no waste.

(3) The Following Quotations are From Government Bulletins giving specific information concerning the need:

a. Paper and cardboard boxes provide food containers.

d. Only 28% of the nations paper is now being recovered. Most of it comes from large industries, department stores, large hotels, apartments and public buildings. About 50% of the paper is lost—going into furnaces, incinerators, and rubbish heaps. The remaining 22% goes now for permanent use as books, ledger, file paper and is not immediately destroyed.

c. Trade estimates that the average family may save a pound of paper a day.

d. A ton of paper board contains 1,906 pounds of wastepaper, card-

board and corrugated board.

c. Paper boxes are used for packing and transporting shirts and shoes for the armed forces, parts of planes, munitions, rifles, and chemicals.

f. Gypsum board is widely used in defense housing projects and in all building construction and is also made from wastepaper.

g. 90% of aid to Britain is packed in waterproof paperboard boxes.

h. 1,500 tons of paper board are required for 10,000,000 shirts bought for the Army this year.

i. Six dozen army shirts fill an eleven pound paper board container.

j. 1,000 tons needed for canned tomatoes alone used by Army.

k. Defense now takes one fourth of the more than 8 million tons of paper board manufactured in the U. S. this year. By the end of 1942 it will be utilizing two-thirds of an estimated 9 million tons.

l. Paper board is made from old newspaper, cheap fiction magazines, wrapping paper and used corrugated paper. Slick paper-magazines, books, letters, etc. are needed to make up a shortage of wood pulp from which finer grades of paper are manufactured.

(4) Housewives Should Not Be Content With Saving Wastepaper They Are Now Using but clear up

their attic, cellar, cupboards, storage places, garages etc.

Wastepaper includes all base waste material such as newspapers, magazines, pasteboard boxes, corrugated boxes, etc.

To measure granulated sugar, fill spoon or cup full, then level off with spatula or case knife. For cup measurements of brown sugar pack brown sugar into cup, pressing down firmly with back of spoon. Sift confectioners' sugar before measuring.

Season soup to taste before clearing. Cool soup mixture. Skim off fat. Add slightly beaten whites and crushed shells of two eggs. Heat slowly, beating constantly. Boil five minutes. Let stand about twenty minutes to settle. Strain through double thickness of cheesecloth. Reheat to serve. To remove any remaining fat draw strips of unglazed paper across the surface of the stock.

Throughout the entire mixing process when making sponge cakes, it should be remembered that air is the one and only leavening in true sponge cakes. The flour should be sifted several times in order to incorporate as much air as possible.
