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
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OLD ST. PAUL'S CHURCH REOPENED



Complete renovation made possible by liberal donation.

Old St. Paul's Church, nestled among the giant oaks and surrounded by the last resting places of many of Kent County's outstanding citizens, was formally reopened last Sunday.

This historic church established in 1692 and the old vestry house which boasts the date of 1766 have been completely renovated at a cost estimated at \$16,000 through a liberal donation by Mr. Glenn L. Martin, of Baltimore.

The church proper was refinished inside and now has an ecclesiastic ceiling, new walls, sills, floors and a new central heating plant, is wired for electricity, all of which has meant practically a new church without spoiling the charm of the old.

The vestry house or Sunday school room, has also shared in the restoration work.

The re-establishing by Mr. Martin of the old mill pond adjoining the church property adds greatly to the scenic beauty. This promises to be the most beautiful spot in the county.

Pulled Peppermint Creams

A nice dish of home made candy is always pleasing to have on hand just for a nibble now and then. Here is one candy that is a little unusual and very delicious:

PULLED PEPPERMINT CREAMS  
4 cups granulated sugar  
1 cup water  
1 cup butter

15 drops oil of peppermint  
Boil together the sugar, water and butter, stirring gently until the butter and sugar are melted, then allowing to boil without stirring until it hardens when a spoonful is dropped in cold water. This should be about 248 F. Remove from fire and drop in the oil of peppermint, pull like taffy until it begins to harden, then pull in one long, even string, cut in inch or half-inch lengths with a sharp scissors, and when cold, store in a tin box or cream. It should be creamy in a day or two.

To make gingered figs: Wash 1 pound dried figs and remove stems. Add cold water to cover and juice and rind of 1/2 lemon, and 1 large piece ginger root. Stew until the figs are puffed and soft. Remove figs to dish. Measure syrup and add one-half as much sugar, simmer until thick and add 1 tablespoon lemon juice. Serve with whipped cream.

To egg and crumb croquettes: Break an egg in a plate, beat slightly with a fork and add 1 tablespoon of water. Fill another plate with crumbs. Roll croquettes in crumbs and place on board, let stand five minutes. Dip in egg mixture, let drain, then roll in crumbs again. Place on board, let stand 1/2-hour or longer and then fry in hot deep fat.
