AMERICANS ON GUARD

Speaking before a farm audience in Richmond Monday night, Secretary of Agriculture Wallace charged the Supreme Court with having blocked attempts of the Roosevelt Administration to "erect necessary safeguards for agriculture, labor and industry."

It will be noticed that "industry" is included in the safeguards which the President seeks to obtain by "packing" the Supreme Court. Yet he has permitted the sit-down strikers of Lewis to throttle industry and cause turmoil and class strife on the threshold of business recovery.

During the last election campaign "industry" was classed as hostile to President Roosevelt. Industry contributed money toward the campaign of Alf. M. Landon. Industry built up the Liberty League, according to Roosevelt orators, and the Liberty League was anathema.

It has been the habit of labor leaders of the Lewis strike to call "industry" the "interests." The "interests" always ground down labor. The "interests" must be brought under control. The "interests" were identified in the campaign as "industry."

An Associated Press dispatch says: "Wallace said the court proposals had stirred a commotion because the interests which opposed the President in the last election do not want a workable solution to problems now facing the nation."

"The present unconstitutional attitude of the Supreme Court is the last barrier between them and the people," Wallace said. "These interests feel they must keep the barrier at all costs."

Wallace's voiced concern about safeguards for industry and his untrue charges that the "interests" always linked in subversive minds as "industry," do not want a workable solution, would be laughable if it were not for his too obvious effort to throw dust in the eyes of the people.

And suppose the Supreme Court is the last barrier protecting industry. Isn't that just what the Supreme Court should be—protector of the life and property of the people, a protector against fascism and communism?

As the Press has stated before, if the people of the United States want a change in the laws or method of administering them for their welfare and protection, there is a straight and narrow path of honesty to the attainment of their desire. That path is plainly written in the Constitution itself, and only by amendment to the Constitution should there be a change in the Supreme Court. Certainly not by the dictates of a President nor packing the court with appointees selected to carry out a President's will, no matter what President is in the White House.

After all, the American people are not easily bamboozled and there are sound and patriotic men in Congress who are not the President's poodle dogs.

It is our firm prediction that Congress will turn down the President's proposed change in the Supreme Court, showing that, after all, "Americans are still on guard."

Candidates for the post of mayor and councilmen of Kensington must have resided in the town for at least one year prior to the election and must be a registered voter and property holder and in addition the mayor must be 30 years of age and councilmen at least 25 under terms of a bill which has been introduced into the House of Delegates.

The bill also empowers the town council to fix and enforce "reasonable building regulations" and to control or prohibit the disposal of refuse and dumps.

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
