A thrilling rescue in the Potomac River floods of a year ago had its sequel Saturday when rescuer and rescued embarked on the sea of matrimony.

Mrs. Eva Dell Myers, 52 year old widow of an army officer and physical instructor in Washington schools, was married at Frederick, Md., to William E. Swainson, 48 year old public accountant of Cabin John, by the Rev. B. J. Meeks in the parsonage of the Calvary M. E. Church.

Flood waters had covered the island of Glen Echo where Mrs. Myers had her home and she was stranded in a tree top. She clung desperately to her precarious perch for a day and a night while roaring waters kept back would-be rescuers. Finally, Swainson and John McCann, 23, of Washington, managed to get a boat to the island and bring the widow to safety.
