**CIRCUS**

The world's mightiest amusement enterprise on tour—the Ringling Bros. and Barnum and Bailey combined circus—with its 1937 seven-ring-and-stage program, star-studded and liberally interspersed with new thrillers from Europe and Asia, featuring among its array of new wonders the most gorgeous introductory spectacle in its brilliant history, India, is definitely scheduled to exhibit in Washington, May 17-18-19.

**BEAUTY AND LAUGHTER CONTROL**  
**1937 EDITION OF THE GREAT FOLLIES**

Ziegfeld Follies, as ever rich in feminine pulchritude, color, luxurious atmosphere and exotic charm, and boasting more laughing material than ever before characterized the famous institution dedicated to glorifying the American girl, will disclose its 1937 joys for eye and ear at the National Theatre, Washington, throughout the week beginning Monday night, May 10.

Direct from Broadway and Chicago runs, where the revue was hailed as the greatest in its history-making series, the "Follies" comes with Fannie Brice and Bobby Clark as its outstanding stars. This is the eighth of the famous Ziegfeld series in which Miss Brice has been identified. Bobby Clark, the frantic comedian with the hand-painted spectacles and the billowing cigar, is making his initial solo appearances in this revue after many years as the funster of the famous Clark and McCullough team. The personnel, of course, includes an overflowing complement of "glorified girls," headed by Marion Martin, glamorous platinum blonde whose title, "Queen of Beauty," bestowed upon her by Flo Ziegfeld five years ago remains unchallenged, and whose demonstration of the strip-tease as a decorous art form created the current vogue, recently a subject of discussion before a Congressional committee.

The grand comedienne, Fannie Brice, is in top form in this show. The records show she has been a "Follies" star since 1917, but here she is, as youthful and fresh as ever, cavorting indefatigably in irresistible new songs and comedy sketches. Broadway found the Ziegfeld Follies of 1937 a gay, glittering, laugh and lass show, with entertainment wholly in keeping with the Ziegfeldian traditions.

Ira Gershwin and Vernon Duke are the happy lyrical combination that evolved the song hits. Vincente Minnelli designed the scenery and costumes. Most of the sketches were written by David Freedman, and Robert Alton staged the dances. John Murray Anderson staged the entire production which embraces 18 scenes, requiring four baggage cars for transport.
