EGBERT OF BALTO. BAWLS OUT JUDGE GETS ARRESTED

From complaining witness to defendant in the same day was the experience George L. Egbert, Baltimore, met in Police Court this week.

Egbert indicated his displeasure with Judge Harold C. Smith dismissed a charge of larceny of a fishing rod which Egbert had preferred against Thomas Norris, Seneca. Encountering the judge in a restaurant during the noon hour, he gave voice to his disapproval of the court's action in no uncertain terms.

Returning later to his car in front of the court house, Egbert was met by Sgt. Earl Burdine, who meanwhile had been instructed to bring him back into court. He objected strenuously and clung so tenaciously to the steering wheel that Sgt. Burdine had to call Officer James E. Shoemaker and Detective Sgt. Ted Volten before he could be dislodged. He was released on \$50 collateral on a charge of disorderly conduct. At his request, Judge Smith continued his case for two weeks. He departed without comment.

The board approved use of Key's warehouse in Linden by Fling, following a ruling by Attorney General Herbert R. O'Connor that the rule against more than one license in a building did not apply to warehouse permits.

The board announced opposition to any amplified music at open air beer gardens and announced its decision denying a license to Willie Smith, colored, of River road, had been reversed by the State license board.

Rozzelle Cleared In Auto Death

Charges of manslaughter against Dowd C. Rozzelle, 19, Alta Vista, driver of the car in which his schoolmate, George B. Gummell, Jr., 20, of 4210 Leland street, Chevy Chase, was fatally injured May 4, were dismissed by Judge Harold C. Smith in the Rockville Police Court Monday.

Rozzelle testified he ran off the road to avoid another car on Connecticut avenue near Sauls road, near Kensington. Both he and Gummell were thrown out of his car when it overturned in the ditch, but he escaped without serious injuries. Gummell's skull was fractured and he died en route to Georgetown hospital.

Rozzelle said he was taking his friend to the Kensington Armory so he might collect his monthly check from the National Guard office when the accident occurred.

Records Broken In County School Meet

Kensington, Glenmont and Montrose shared track and field championship honors Tuesday following their triumphs in the annual games of Montgomery County's elementary schools on the old Fair Grounds.

The title in the large elementary school division was won easily by Kensington with 65 points, Glenmont defeated its rivals in the small elementary school section in even more impressive fashion by counting 128 1/2 points and Montrose gathered 72 points to win the division for one and two room schools.
