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The fire prevention week proclamation was in line with one issued by President Roosevelt, setting aside the week for national observance to the end that fire hazards might be discovered and removed and the annual toll from fires lessened.

Young Hughes, whose father raised Sample Ballot on his breeding farm near Poolesville, won one of the most important classes of the afternoon when he rode his own Black Caddy to victory in the handy hunter competition. He beat off 22 rivals to score.

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Harry W. LeGore To Be Feted on Saturday

State Senator Harry W. LeGore, Republican candidate for the House, will be guest of honor at a picnic Saturday from 2:30 to 8 p. m. at the Kensington Log Cabin.

In his report to the board of a survey he had made of the State accounts, he said he had been advised by William A. Codd, chief auditor of the roads body, that Codd would not assume responsibility for accuracy of accounts prior to his assumption of office in 1929.

Approximately \$152,000 of the overdraft is represented by bills for work done prior to 1929, which led Wooden to believe that only by an audit of these records could the county satisfy itself as to the extent to which it is indebted to the State.

The commissioners deferred definite action on the audit until Tuesday, due to the absence from the county of Commissioner Coughlan, who recently was named to represent the county in the roads proceedings.

The commissioners recommended six candidates for appointment to two positions on the county welfare board, made vacant by expiration of the terms of Dr. Dexter M. Bullard, of Rockville, and Dr. Claude W. Mitchell, of Silver Spring.

Those recommended for the three-year terms were the two physicians and Mrs. R. Granville Curry, Bethesda; Canon Arthur B. Rudd, Rockville; G. Robert Gray, of Poolesville, and Mrs. Helen Etchison, Gaithersburg.

The names will be considered by the Board of State Aid and Charities, J. Milton Patterson, executive secretary of the State group, told the commissioners, and four will be referred back to the commissioners, who in turn will select two from that group.

The annual report of the county liquor control board was filed. It showed a net profit for the fiscal year ending June 30, 1936, of \$59,880.47.

At the request of the county welfare board, the commissioners authorized appointment of an investigator to handle PWA and CCC applications for a period of six months at a salary of \$100 a month plus \$35 a month traveling expenses.

Approval was given recent sale by the Washington Suburban Sanitary Commission of \$400,000 in 3 1/2 percent bonds, at a price of \$105.07. The board also granted permission to the Citizens' Committee of Section 4, Chevy Chase, to sell \$8,500 in local bonds to the Bank of Damascus.

Agencies Represented At Welfare Meeting. The first meeting of the year of the Council on Social Welfare was held last Friday in the Commissioners' hearing room, with Miss Ruth A. Bolton, chairman, presiding.

Other officers for the current year are: Vice-chairman, Miss Hermine Badenhop; secretary and treasurer, Miss Elizabeth Creighton Jones.

The following agencies were represented at the meeting and reported on recent developments in their work: The Social Service League, the Montgomery County Welfare Board, the Public Health Department and the Juvenile Court.

The county commissioners were informed Tuesday by E. E. Wooden, accountant retained by the county, that an audit of the county account with the State Roads Commission appeared advisable if the county is to challenge the \$227,000 so-called overdraft which the State commission contends is owed by the county.

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Plans for the year's activities were discussed. At some of the future meetings speakers will discuss subjects of vital interest to the groups. Miss Dorothy A. Everson, executive secretary of the Montgomery County Welfare Board, was appointed to follow developments in social legislation in Maryland and report to the group at succeeding meetings.
